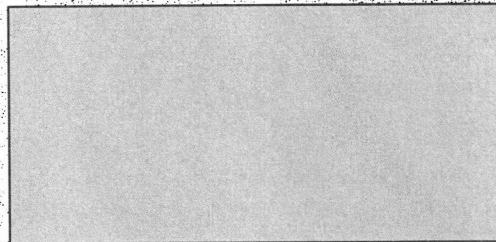

Following is the absolute happenings of 12-30-77 @ 1730, the date and time of my arrival at the Garfield County Jail.

Upon arrival the first thing I do is check the Lodging Book and then the Board, this took approximately 45 minutes. I then Headed for the kitchen, I stopped and talked to Mr. Bundy, on my way back to the Booking Room I stopped and talked to Mr. Bundy again, this all took place about 1900, it was just passing the time of day, Mr. Bundy said he wasn't feeling well and would turn in early.

At 2400 I made bed check again and saw that Mr. Bundy was sleeping, also at 0130 and again at 0300. The cell doors are equipped with heavy glass windows to bed check.

On 12-31-77 @ 0800 Delores served breakfast she called Mr. Bundy but no answer, she told me that sometimes he didn't eat because he hadn't felt well, I looked in to check and saw him on the bunk or (I assumed it was him), and told Delores to let him sleep, Delores also told me that she would serve his meals and immediately would hear the toilet flushing, as though to flush his food down the toilet, in order to lose weight.

I looked in after breakfast and still saw him there, the remark by Delores, "that no person sleeps in one position like that".

The mail came at around 0930, 1 letter for Mr. Bundy, and 2 letters for the jailer in the apartment, I gave the 2 letters for the jailer to Delores, she heard a commotion in the apartment, she knocked on the door but no answer, but heard the front door slam shut, this was about 1000, she no more about it until they came back. thought

She (Delores) served lunch about 1130 or 1200, she saw the letter I had left on Mr. Bundy's tray door, she then called me and said, "there must be something wrong with him", I then went in the cell, everything looked in place, he had the same shirt on that he had on the night before when we talked, I went to shake him but felt nothing but paper for an arm, wastebasket for shoulders, books for body and legs, I thought he was playing a joke off, I looked in the shower and under his bunk, that is when I thought it was time to call Under Sheriff Hart.

We got the step ladder, I climbed up, the light fixture was loose and moved easily, the light bulb moved over to the side, the hole in the ceiling was approximately 12"x 12", I looked through the hole found a blanket in the rafters and his transistor radio which he played very loud and had to be told by me to turn it down at lights out. I shot the beam of a flashlight all around the rafters with no luck.

Under Sheriff Hart then took pictures of the "dummy", plus other things in the room.

I swear that the above is the true story to my knowledge.

I came to work at 6:20 A.M. Saturday.

I parked my pickup in back. Came thru the back door with my key. Made Coffee and turned on the grill. I then went out thru the back door slamming and checking the door to make sure it was locked as I always do each time I use the back door.

I walked around the building to the dispatch office and talked to the dispatcher and the Jailer. Also a police officer. I came back to the Kitchen at 7:09 A.M. turning on the lights and on back to the Kitchen where I made Hash Browns, Bacon, Toast and Eggs. I served at 7:40 A.M. starting at Ted Bundy's Cell. I opened the Window and looked in telling Bundy, here's your Breakfast. He appeared to be sleeping with just one arm partly showing from his cot visible from the opening of the door. I then went to feed the other prisoners. At 8:20 A.M. I went to gather the dishes asking the Jailer about Bundy and the Juvenile both not eating their Breakfast. I then done dishes and started to bake a Cake. At about 8:45 A.M. the Jailer came into the Kitchen from his apartment to get a broom to go out and sweep snow. Between 9:30 and 10:00 A.M. I heard ruckus from the Apartment which was

like doors being slammed or things
 being dropped. I knocked on the
 apartment door as the Gailer on
 duty had brought mail for the
 Gailer living in the Apt. I called
 to Pat asking her if she wanted
 her mail. I heard the slamming
 of the front door so I took my
 key to the back door and opened
 it to see if I could catch the
 Gailer but his brown car was
 gone and I turned around and
 came back in closing the door. I
 then went and asked the Gailer
 on duty to check on Bundy because
 he hadn't picked up his mail from
 the door opening and had been ill.
 The Gailer opened the door stepped in
 turned around and said oh hell
 let him sleep he was probably up
 working all night. I served lunch
 at 12:40 A.M. picking up the dishes
 at 11:55 A.M. and I then told the
 Gailer to go in and check on Bundy.
 I watched from the hall outside of
 the door as I had earlier. Then
 I asked the Gailer to shake Bundy
 to make sure he was alright. He
 grabbed his sleeve and it was
 limp. He reached over and pulled
 the blanket back. From where I
 was I could see Brooks stacked
 under the blanket. The Gailer
 checked the shower and I saw

You better get ahold of someone.
We both walked up front and
he asked the dispatcher to call
Aspen to see if they had

Prisoner in the Bull Pen if there

office and within 5 minutes the
Undersheriff Mr. Hart came in.

On Friday 12-31-77 at 1645HRS I obtained keys from Mrs Gomez. At this time I asked Ted Bundy if he wanted to make a phone call before I went off duty. He had told me earlier he wanted to do so. I returned the keys to front office and retired to my apartment. I informed dispatcher on duty off same. While in my apartment I showered and had dinner. At about 1845HRS I left with my wife to see a movie and do some shopping. We arrived at the movie about 1900hrs. We however went to the movie first due to the line forming. We entered the movie at 1905 by there clock. The movie started about 1950. It was Smokey and the Bandit. We left at 2115hrs by there clock and arrived home about 2130hrs. We then went to bed. I awoke at 1200 midnight and was up till 0400 in the morning of 1-1-78. I read during this time, I then fell asleep about 0415 or 0430.

awoke about 0800 1-1-78. Myself and my wife showered, shaved, and dressed. I went to the hall closet several times for towel and underwear. I did not see any broken plaster or dust and my guns were there at the time. I then swept the snow off the front steps. There were no footprints or marks in the snow. I started my car and cleared the snow off it. We both left around 0900 to 0915.

We went to the Dinnell for breakfast. We then went to Seno's market and City Market for groceries. I then went home. At 1145 I arrived there and was informed that Bundy had escaped or was not in his cell by Mrs. Somy. I then checked for missing property and found two shirts, one black with brown short sleeves and pocket second mid night blue short sleeve. Also missing one muzzle loading rifle and deringer same type.

At 1330 hrs I went into the ceiling space. I worked my way to the opening in the apt. and found weapons hidden in the crawl space. I also found a flashlight next to the opening. It had not been there on a prior time I checked the heating duct.

Theodore Bundy— A man who insists he's innocent

SEATTLE (AP)—Ted Bundy, who eluded a nationwide FBI dragnet for a month and a half, is a former Republican Party worker who has steadfastly proclaimed his innocence of any crime.

Bundy, identified by fingerprint comparisons Thursday night, was arrested in Pensacola, Fla., while driving a stolen car, the FBI says.

The FBI announced after Bundy's second escape that he was wanted for questioning in 36 sex killings in the Rocky Mountain and western states.

He has been convicted of kidnapping in Utah and was facing trial in Colorado on a first-degree murder charge when he escaped on New Year's Eve from the Garfield County jail in Glenwood Springs. He escaped last June from the Pitkin County Courthouse in Aspen during his trial on charges of murdering a Michigan nurse, but was recaptured less than six days later.

After Bundy was arrested in Salt Lake in 1975 and charged with kidnapping, Seattle-area law enforcement agencies formed a special task force to develop a personality profile on him.

King County Police Capt. Nick Mackie said Bundy, who had lived in Tacoma, Seattle and Olympia, had not been considered an active suspect in the 1974 "Ted" slayings in the Pacific Northwest, but he was among 2,000 persons on file in the case.

Bundy's arrest in Utah stimulated new interest in his activities.

Mackie said Bundy first was investigated because an informant said he resembled a composite drawing and had the same first name as a man known only as "Ted," who was last seen with some of the victims in the Washington state slayings.

Bundy "has not been completely eliminated as a suspect," Mackie said in 1975. "On the other hand, if we really felt he was

"Ted," we would have charged him."

Witnesses at Lake Sammamish said a handsome, engaging young man, wearing a cast on one arm, used the name "Ted" as he approached young women in the crowd at the park east of Seattle one day in July, 1974.

Mackie says some women who reported seeing "Ted" at Lake Sammamish did not recognize photos of Bundy.

Two young women vanished that day—Denise Naslund, 19, and Janice Ott, 23.

They were then the newest victims in a series of disappearances. Among other young women who disappeared in mysterious circumstances from various parts of the state that year were: Lynda Ann Healey, 21, Donna Gail Manson, 19, Susan Rancourt, 18, Brenda Gail Ball, 22, Georgann Hawkins, 18.

But Mackie said there was no specific evidence to connect Bundy with those disappearances. Remains of seven of the young women were found in September, 1974, and March, 1975, at two sites in the mountains east of Seattle.

While jailed in Colorado, Bundy acted as his own lawyer.

"I'm not guilty of crimes—the crimes in Utah or Colorado," he said. "I'm innocent of kidnapping and I'm appealing it. And that's the long and short of it."

"Or in Washington. I don't care what state you're talking about."

"I'm not accused of anything in Washington...I'm just a citizen looking at a situation you have in Washington as far as I'm concerned," he said.

A 1972 psychology graduate of the University of Washington, Bundy later attended the University of Puget Sound Law School.

In late summer 1974, he moved to Salt Lake City to transfer to the University of Utah Law School.

He worked in the 1972 re-election campaign of former Republican Gov. Dan Evans and later worked for the Washington State

Republican Central Committee.

In the summer of 1974, he worked at the state Department of Emergency Services in Olympia.

Bundy grew up in a middle class home in Tacoma. While Louise Bundy, his mother, refused comment on his capture Thursday, she had this to say after

his escape last June:

"He's never harmed anyone and he's not going to do it now."

"Of course the one thing that runs through people's minds is that if he runs, he must be guilty," she said. "But I think that all the frustrations just piled up...and he just decided to go."

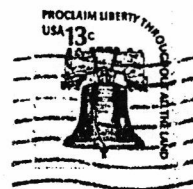

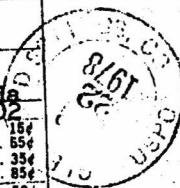

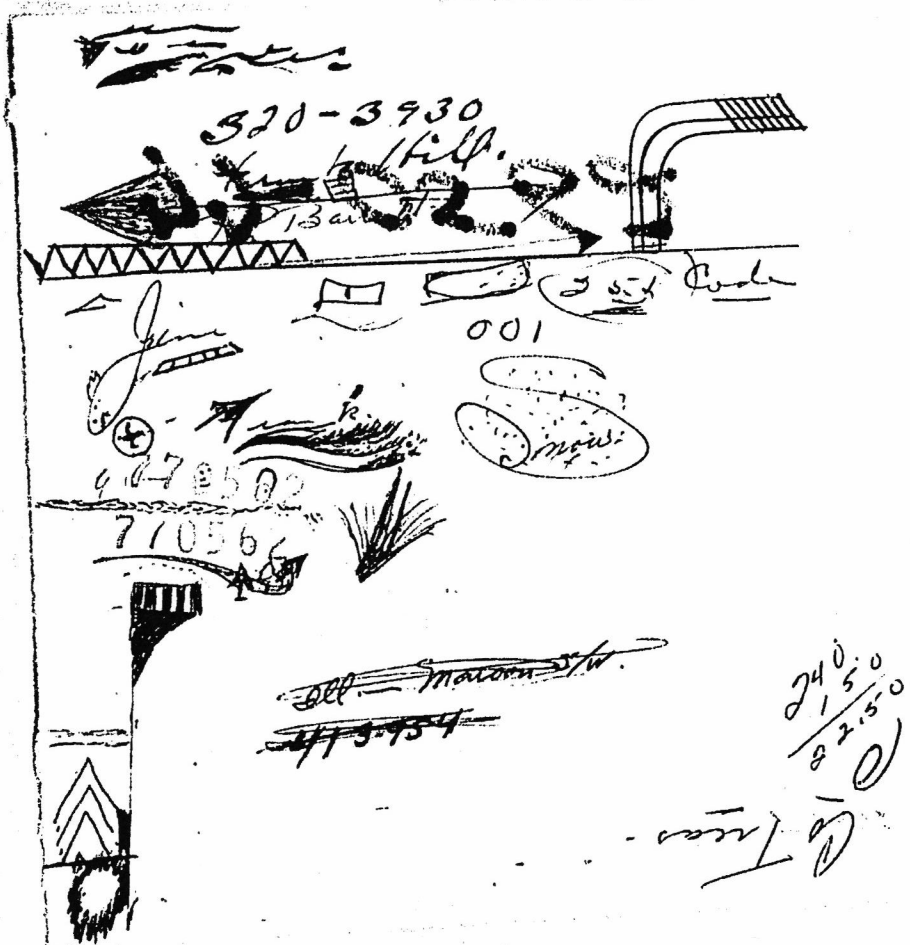

Where's Bundy? 'Nobody knows'

Theodore R. Bundy is going on the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Ten Most Wanted list because "nobody knows" where Theodore R. Bundy is.

That fact was acknowledged by FBI agents today as word went out that Bundy would at 6 a.m. Friday officially take a spot in what is perhaps the nation's most visible rogue's gallery.

The "identification order"—emblazoned with the headline "Wanted by FBI"—began circulating among agents early this week.

When Bundy's "Ten Most Wanted" status becomes official it will go to every FBI agent in the country and every law enforcement agency of every type.

It will of course be hung in all the nation's post offices.

The search for Bundy, 31, began in Glenwood Springs when he escaped from the Garfield County Jail New Year's Eve. He was

awaiting trial for the January, 1975, murder of a vacationing Michigan nurse at the Snowmass ski resort near Aspen.

Since then numerous sightings of Bundy "look alikes" have been checked out by FBI agents and local law agencies but none have panned out. "We do not know where he is. In fact nobody does, or there wouldn't be a need for this (placing him on the Ten Most Wanted list)," said Ted Rosack, Denver FBI special agent in charge.

Qualifications for FBI "Ten Most Wanted" status are being accused of a "notorious-type" crime and the suspicion the fugitive may be "dangerous," Rosack said. "Our recommendation was we feel very strongly he warrants this dubious distinction," Rosack said.

An FBI statement issued in Detroit said Bundy "also is wanted for questioning in 36 sexual slayings which began in California in 1969 and extended through the Pacific Northwest and into Utah and Colorado."

The FBI is describing Bundy as "a college

educated physical fitness enthusiast" whose former occupations are law school student, office worker, political campaign worker, psychiatric social worker and security guard.

The FBI description gives six aliases Bundy allegedly has used and states he has "worn glasses, false mustache and beard as disguise" and "can imitate a British accent."

According to a newspaper in Tacoma, where Bundy once lived, and where his parents still reside, the latest Bundy sightings haven't even been worth reporting. "It's incredible when you try to think about where the guy is. You're just reduced to speculation," said Dave Seago, an editor at a paper which follows the case closely.

In Glenwood Springs, Garfield County Undersheriff Jack McNeel said there hasn't been a local lead for weeks.

The same goes for the local FBI office, though agents help check out any of the Bundy sighting reports which come in from all around the country.

FBI Adds Bundy To 10-Most-Wanted

The FBI is planning to add Theodore Bundy, an escaped slaying suspect, to its list of 10 most-wanted criminals.

A spokesman for Ted Rosack, special agent in charge of the Denver FBI office, said wanted posters on Bundy probably would begin appearing early this week in law enforcement offices and post offices throughout the country.

Bundy, awaiting trial at Colorado Springs, in the slaying of Caryn Sue Campbell, a nurse from Dearborn, Mich., escaped from the Garfield County jail at Glenwood Springs Dec. 30.

Miss Campbell was slain while she was on a skiing vacation at Aspen with her fiance. Her nude body was found under a snowbank outside Aspen several weeks after her disappearance.

Bundy, a former law student at the University of Utah, had been granted a change of venue for his trial because of publicity stemming from his first escape last summer from the Pitkin County jail at Aspen. He was captured within a week.

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP)—Theodore Robert Bundy, a cunning fugitive accused of one murder and suspected in 35 others, has been tracked to a jail cell by FBI agents who used fingerprints to penetrate his latest guise—that of

a college track star. Bundy—who until late Thursday was simply a prisoner who had been held 40 hours in the Pensacola City Jail—was being questioned today by investigators in the Jan. 15 bludgeon murders

of two Chi Omega sorority sisters at Florida State University in Tallahassee.

"He is already cooperating and talking with investigators," said Wayne Smith, a spokesman for the Leon County sheriff's office in Tallahassee, 200 miles to the east.

Bundy, 31, escaped from jail Dec. 31 in Glenwood Springs, while waiting trial for the 1975 sex-slaying of Dearborn, Mich., nurse Caryn Campbell.

Acting FBI Director James Adams said in Washington, D.C., that Bundy was wanted for questioning in 35 other sex slayings that began in California in 1969, extended throughout the Pacific Northwest and into Utah and Colorado.

Bundy was arrested Wednesday at 1:30 a.m. when Pensacola patrolman David Lee stopped a man in a Volkswagen that had been reported stolen in Tallahassee earlier this month.

The man scuffled with the officer, who fired two shots before subduing the man. The man was charged with resisting arrest and possession of stolen property, including the car, a television set and charge cards reportedly belonging to Florida State women.

The prisoner gave his name as Kenneth Raymond Misner, 29, of Tallahassee. He carried Misner's identification papers, police said.

But the real Kenneth Misner, a former Florida State track star, soon came forward in Tallahassee, where he is attending graduate school.

Detective Norman Chapman said police developed a hunch

GLENWOOD SPRINGS—Garfield County Sheriff Bob Hart is one of many lawmen who would like to host a welcome-back party for accused murderer Theodore Bundy, but Hart holds out little hope that it will be held soon.

Other authorities from Florida to Washington State would like to talk to Bundy, too. A convicted kidnapper, he is considered a suspect in at least 43 slayings or disappearances of young women since 1974. He is accused so far of only one—the sex slaying of Caryn Campbell, the Michigan nurse vacationing in Snowmass when she was abducted.

Bundy has been placed in As-

pen on the day she disappeared by gasoline credit card receipts bearing the license number of his car. He has been similarly linked to the deaths or disappearances of at least 35 other young women in Colorado, Utah, California, Oregon and Washington.

Among those missing are Julie Cunningham, a 22-year-old Vail ski instructor, and Denise Oliverson, 24, of Grand Junction.

Miss Cunningham disappeared March 15, 1975—the same day Bundy is known to have been in Silverthorne and Dillon, only 30 miles away. Miss Oliverson's bicycle and

shoes were found beneath the Fifth Street Bridge in Grand Junction on April 6—again, on the same day Bundy is known to have purchased gasoline in Grand Junction. No trace has been found of either woman.

Authorities in other states have also linked Bundy's presence with the disappearance or known deaths of at least 33 other young women. An "MO sheet" (Modus Operandi) on the incidents has been circulated among law enforcement agencies. A striking similarity exists in all of the murders or presumed murders.

In every instance, the victim was a young woman. In the 43 cases are a girl of 12 and a

late Thursday afternoon their prisoner might be Bundy. They summoned FBI agents, who arrived two hours later with wanted posters and fingerprints.

Bundy's arrest came 30 days after the Chi Omega killings. Two other sorority sisters and another female student living nearby were badly beaten the same night.

"We know he was in Tallahassee during the month of January," said Smith. "But at this time we can't be sure he was in Tallahassee on Jan. 15 when the killings took place."

Some of the murders in which Bundy is a suspect involved blunt weapons, sexual assault and strangulation, Smith said. "Some of those factors were involved in the Florida State University tragedy," he said.

Investigators were searching an apartment where Bundy had lived in Tallahassee, Smith said.

Bundy's capture halted the flight of a man adept at disguises and mimicry, a student of psychology and the law, authorities said. He once feigned a British accent and sported a mustache, the FBI said.

"He's got a capacity of losing a lot of weight and combing his hair in different ways to avoid capture," Smith said, noting that Bundy lost 65 pounds while in custody in Colorado and escaped through a ceiling light fixture.

Bundy's only conviction has been in the November, 1974, kidnapping of Carol DaRonche in a Salt Lake City suburb.

woman 37, but nearly all the victims were 19 to 24 years of age. All had long, brown hair. Most of them parted their hair in the middle, and most were wearing small, pierced earrings. They even had similar facial characteristics.

Those whose bodies have been found were nude or mostly nude; they had been bludgeoned or strangled; they had been sexually assaulted; their bodies were dumped in a remote area.

And in 36 of 43 possible cases, Bundy is known to have been in the area at the time the women disappeared.

"Well, sure we'd like to have a party," the 72-year-old Hart

said with a hint of acid in his voice this morning. "But we can't go into that yet."

Hart was the undersheriff until Jan. 14 here and nominally not responsible for Bundy's escape New Year's Eve from the Garfield County Jail.

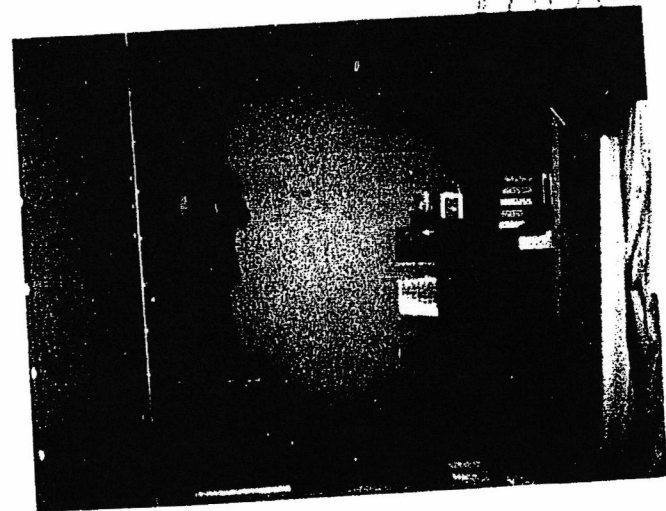
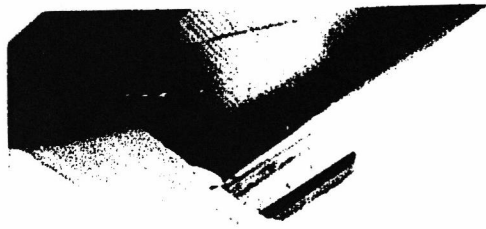
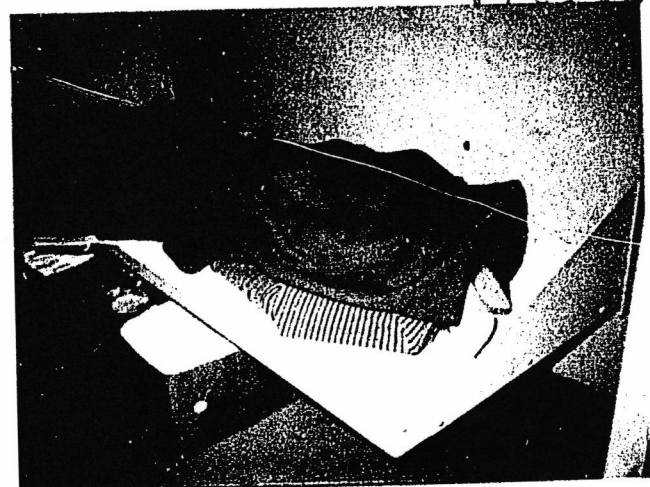
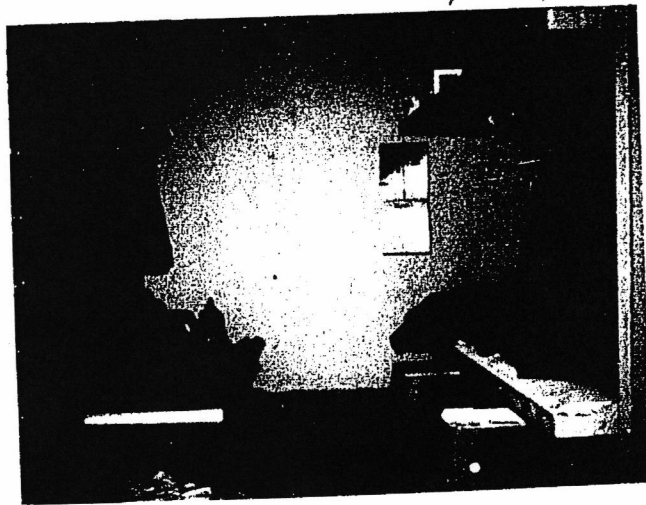
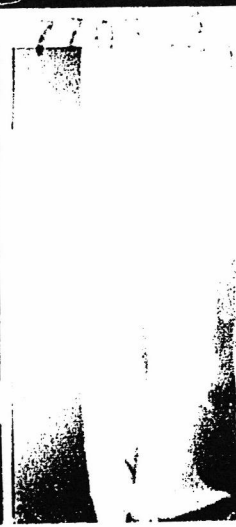
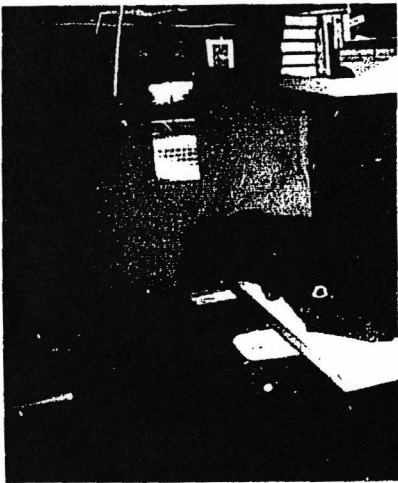
Hart, however, has been on the firing line ever since Bundy, 31, made his second escape from local law enforcement authorities within seven months as he awaited trial for the first-degree murder of a Michigan nurse in Snowmass three years ago.

Don Lyons, FBI agent-in-charge for the region, said he was not familiar with the status of the case, but presumed that

federal charges of flight to avoid prosecution would be dismissed. Since Bundy is in custody and so many agencies have "wants" on him, there would be little reason to prosecute on the federal charge, he said.

It was not immediately known when, or if, Bundy would be returned to Glenwood Springs. Hart said that other than newly-welded plates over the light fixtures in the Garfield County Jail, no extraordinary security measures will be taken.

Bundy escaped by wriggling through a one-foot-square hole in his cell ceiling after prying loose the overhead metal light

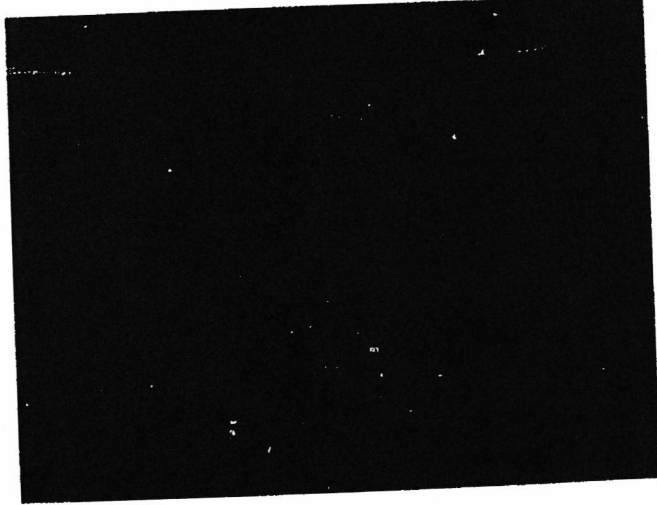

Personally appeared before me, the undersigned District Judge, GREGORY J. MUSTARI, who after being sworn, deposes and says as follows:

1. My name is GREGORY J. MUSTARI; and I am employed as a police investigator for the Garfield County Sheriff's Department, Garfield County, State of Colorado, and have been so employed for approximately fifteen (15) months.

2. That on December 31, 1977, a Garfield County Sheriff's Department Complaint Report was filed by Mr. Robert Hart, and stated as follows:

- a. That a report was made to Mr. Hart that Theodore Robert Bundy was not in his cell and could not be located.
- b. That Mr. Frank Perry, the night jailer, had contacted Mr. Hart with the information about Bundy's disappearance at 12:10 p.m. on December 31, 1977.
- c. That Mr. Hart responded to the Garfield County Sheriff's Office and inspected Bundy's cell, Cell #5, and discovered that Bundy was in fact gone.
- d. That Mr. Hart observed the Cell #5 and observed that Bundy's bunk had books and papers piled up and a shirt with one sleeve stuffed with paper, giving the appearance that he was in the bunk, a copy of the Complaint Report #770562 is attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

3. That Mr. Frank Perry, the jailer on duty at the Garfield County Jail on December 30th and 31st, 1977, stated the following:

- a. That Mr. Perry arrived at the Garfield County Jail on December 30, 1977, at 5:30 p.m. and that upon his arrival, he checked the lodging book in said jail, which took approximately forty-five (45) minutes.
- b. That Mr. Perry stated that he spoke with Bundy two (2) times between 6:15 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on December 30th, 1977.

- g. That Perry was at Bundy's Cell #5 again on December 31st, 1977, at 11:30 a.m. or 12:00 p.m. to assist in serving lunch. That the letter which Perry left on the food door was still there. That Perry entered Bundy's Cell #5 and shook what he thought was Bundy, only to discover that there was a "dummy" in the cell bunk; and Bundy was gone. Perry described the "dummy" construction as follows:
1. Arm of one shirt sleeve stuffed with paper.
 2. Wastebasket used to form shoulders.
 3. Hooks to create appearance of body and legs.
- h. That Perry took a step ladder and observed that the light fixture was loose, and moved it to one side. Perry shined a flashlight through the approximately 12" X 12" square hole in the Cell #5 ceiling and observed the following:
1. Garfield County Jail blanket.
 2. Bundy's transistor radio.

4. That Dolores Gomez, the Garfield County Jail cook, was on duty on December 31st, 1977 at 6:20 a.m. and reported the following:

- a. That Gomez reported for duty as the Garfield County Jail cook on December 31st, 1977, at 6:20 a.m. and proceeded to prepare the inmates' breakfast for that day.
- b. That Gomez served breakfast at 7:40 a.m. on December 31st, 1977, and started with Bundy's cell, #5. Gomez stated that she opened the

window door, looked in and told Bundy, "Here's your breakfast". Gomez stated it appeared that Bundy was sleeping.

- c. That Gomez collected the breakfast dishes at 8:20 a.m., December 31st, 1977, and noticed that Bundy had not eaten any of his breakfast. Gomez informed the jailer of this, this date.
- d. That Gomez was in the kitchen area of the Garfield County Jail on December 31st, 1977, at 9:30 to 10:00 a.m. and heard a "racket" from the jail apartment, which is right next to the kitchen. Gomez stated the "racket" sounded like doors being slammed or things being dropped.
- e. That Gomez, on December 31st, 1977, between 9:30 and 10:00 a.m., knocked on the apartment door as she had two (2) letters for the off duty jailer and his wife. At this time, Gomez heard the front door slam.
- f. That Gomez served lunch to the Garfield County inmates on December 31st, 1977, at 11:40 a.m. and returned to pick the dishes up at 11:55 a.m. this date. Gomez stated that she, at this time, requested that the jailer, Mr. Perry, go in and check Bundy in his Cell #5. Gomez stated she watched from the hall in front of Cell #5 as Perry shook what Gomez thought was Bundy, and discovered that Bundy was not in his cell and the object Gomez thought was Bundy was in fact, stacks of books under the blanket, made it look like someone was sleeping in the bunk.

5. That Robert Morrison, the off duty jailer, who lives in the Garfield County Jail apartment, reported the following:

- a. That on December 31st, 1977, at 6:45 p.m., Morrison and his wife left the Garfield County Jail apartment and went out for the evening and returned on December 31st, 1977, at 9:30 p.m.
- b. That Morrison stated he was unable to sleep and got up from bed at approximately 12:00 a.m. and was up until 4:00 a.m. reading. That he went back to sleep at approximately 4:15-4:30 a.m., January 1st, 1978.
- c. That Morrison stated he woke up at approximately 8:00 a.m. on January 1st, 1978, and took a shower and that he and his wife left the Garfield County Jail apartment approximately 9:00-9:15 a.m., and returned at 11:45 a.m. on January 1st, 1978, at which time Morrison was informed that Bundy had escaped.
- d. That on January 1st, 1978, at 1:30 p.m., Morrison went into the ceiling space in Bundy's cell and worked his way to the apartment, where Morrison observed a hole in the ceiling, which went into a closet in the apartment. That Morrison further discovered his muzzle-loading rifle and derringer pistol were missing from the closet in the Garfield County Jail apartment. These were discovered up on the ceiling next to the hole which led out to the apartment closet. Morrison also discovered a flashlight, which was not there on an earlier in-

spection of the ceiling prior to Bundy's escape.

6. That this investigator, GREGORY J. MUSTARI, has conducted an investigation into the escape of Bundy and discovered the following:

- a. That Bundy was ordered held in the Garfield County Jail on April 11, 1977, by Judge Lohr on the charge of Murder in the First Degree, C.R.S. 1973, 18-3-103.
- b. That Bundy was placed in the Garfield County Jail, Cell #5, where he was being held on a warrant issued by the District Court for Murder in the First Degree, the affiant of that warrant was District Attorney's Investigator, Michael Fisher.
- c. That after a search of the Cell #5, in the Garfield County Jail, it appears that Bundy went through a 12" X 12" hole in the cell ceiling, crawled across the ceiling and broke through the plaster ceiling in the jail apartment and exited the building through the apartment side door.
- d. That Bundy's blanket and radio were found inside the ceiling next to the 12" X 12" light fixture hole, which is where Bundy is believed to have exited.
- e. That Bundy was being held on an order from the District Court for Murder in the First Degree, C.R.S. 1973, 18-3-103.
- f. That Bundy is a convicted kidnapper from the State of Utah and has been sentenced to serve a prison term there.

g. That Bundy did, in fact, escape from the Garfield County Jail sometime between December 31st, 1977 and January 1st, 1978, in violation of C.R.S. 1973, 18-8-208, Escape, and that Bundy was being held on a Class One Felony at the time he escaped, which constitutes a Class Two Felony for said escape.

7. Based upon the above information, I believe and have probable cause to believe that the aforesaid Theodore Robert Bundy on or about December 31st, 1977 to January 1st, 1978, committed the crime of Escape, in violation of C.R.S. 1973, 18-8-208, as amended, in the County of Garfield, State of Colorado, and accordingly request that a warrant for the arrest of the aforesaid Theodore Robert Bundy be issued.
