

THIS IS THE STATEMENT OF [REDACTED] (ED 1-[REDACTED]-18)
1 [REDACTED] Selkirk Ave., Kamloops, B.C. Taken this 7th day of September, A.D.
1972, at 9:40 P.M. at Kamloops Rural Detachment.

I had a drink and only one drink and he was sitting next to me. He then told me to come over to his table and I said, "No, you can come to my table", so he came to my table and then he said, "Come to my place and I will give you a drink". On the way out he picked up a mickey and a bottle at the Liquor Store and I said, "Where do you live?" and he said, "I live on the railroad track by the Valleyview" and I went, and he had some big bottle like that too, there was a little bit in there too and he poured some for me and some for him and then we sang songs, old fashioned songs and it seemed like he was very happy and all of a sudden he told me to go to bed and he said I can make you go to bed easily and I was afraid because he started to hit me so I thought that if I let him have what he wants then he let me go. Well, he wanted every way, like backwards and this way and he was started hitting me and he told me that was not the way he wanted it and he told me to suck that and I did. I thought that if I would do it and he was still hitting me so I grabbed him by the hair and I again pulled his hair and then I thought maybe I better not cause maybe it would be better if I don't hurt him, maybe he will still let me go, so after that he told me that I'm still not going. He says I take you home when it's dark so I come to the front room and he had a gun there. He says that gun, I'm going to use it on you" so I sat and I went to get a drink of water and so I look through curtains to see how the window was, whether it was open. I thought I might jump off. He told me, "Don't you look through those windows, I'm watching you". So I went back to the front room and in the meantime he fell asleep. I was waiting if he was, so I thought I could hear him snoring. Then he had locked the door, I seen him, he locked it but it was one of those kind of locks, that thing you can open this way, not with a key, and I went very slowly and opened that lock. When I opened that lock I ran out the door and I went to that trailer and I told that old man. I don't know who live there. I told him I needed help, I needed to get out from here and I told him what happened to me so he says O.K. I said, "Can you do it as fast as you can do it cause he might come out". So he says he will, "I will take you out, I will take you to the Police Station".

Q. When you say, "He" - Who do you mean? Can you describe him?

A. Oh, I don't know his name. I believe he did tell me the name, but I don't remember the name, but I mean if I see him I will know who he is to see him. You mean the way he looks like. Well he's young - about 31 and a little narrow face and a little bit of mustache like, just, you know, a little bit of whiskers, not very

tall, actually not very big either, but he was bigger than I am, like you know.

Q. How much did you have to drink in total today?

A. One in the cocktail bar and then I believe maybe one in everything he pour a big drink for me.

Q. What were you drinking in the Leeland?

A. Rye.

Q. How much did you have to drink at his place?

A. One big - that much in a glass, big glass, about that much. He wanted the big glass to be about more than half.

Q. When you said he wanted it in every way, what exactly did he do to you?

A. Well He wanted to touch me the way he wanted it and I told him I didn't know how, so he started pounding me, so that when he told me so I could take penis and put it in there and I did because I was afraid, he was hitting me, then he told me that I was hurting him, like I mean, and I wasn't hurting him, and I thought I better love him cause I thought if I love him then this way, maybe I would be alright here, otherwise, if I wouldn't, then he would have killed me.

Q. Did he have sexual intercourse with you?

A. Well just once.

Q. He said he wanted you to suck that - what exactly did he want you to do?

A. Just suck it like for him.

Q. Do you mean his penis?

A. Yes.

Re: Unsolved Murders,
British Columbia - General

A resume of six (6) unsolved murder cases is published herewith. A "news" release has been made in all of these cases and the information publicized widely in the press, radio, and television. In view of the wide and extensive coverage given by the various news media, it is anticipated that there will be a good public reaction and response. The public have been asked to report any helpful information to the nearest R.C.M. Police office.

The information published in this Bulletin will augment the information released to the news media and will assist police personnel in dealing with the public reaction to the news items.

Whenever possible, the incoming information should be handled by G.I.S. members. Following evaluation, the information will be referred to the member designated as the director of these investigations. S/Sgt. F. Bodnaruk has been appointed the director, and he can be contacted at North Vancouver Detachment G.I.S., phone number 985-1311.

There appears to be a connection between the [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and the unidentified murder victim found near Naramata on 24 June, 1974, cases. This opinion is drawn from the fact that the clothes of the victims were removed from the various crime scenes, or at least have not been found.

In all instances, the attacks on the girls were brutal, indicating a highly abnormal personality with definite sadistic tendencies. It should be noted that in the [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] cases, a "stick" was used in a vicious vaginal assault.

A review of over four hundred files at the C.I.S. office, regarding subjects having "sex" oriented crimes, has been carried out, isolating approximately 80 people. It is requested that all members review their local records with a view to identifying possible suspects. It is quite possible that the offender(s) may not have been prosecuted heretofore with a sex oriented crime, but is recognized by police personnel as being a potential active deviant. It is requested that persons identified, for one reason or another, be investigated. It would appear that the culprit(s) travels extensively, owns or rents a car, and is prone to picking up hitch-hikers.

A factor which may be of significance is that the [REDACTED], [REDACTED] AND [REDACTED] girls were of larger than average build.

The co-operation and assistance of all police personnel is solicited in these cases.

 Bella Coola, B.C. MURDER OF, Sec. 206 C.C.
 near Williams Lake, B.C. 25/26 OCT 69.
 (WILLIAMS LAKE DETACHMENT CASE) (UNORG.)

At approximately 11:00 A.M. on 26 OCT 69, the nude body of [REDACTED] (IND) (27 years) was found seven (7) miles West of Williams Lake, B.C. on a little-used cattle trail off the Chilcotin Highway.

[REDACTED] was last seen alive on 25 OCT 69 at 10:30 P.M. in the Ranch Hotel beer parlour, Williams Lake, B.C. wearing a navy blue coloured reversible coat, a floral designed shift dress (yellow with green and blue flowers). [REDACTED] was brutally murdered. She was struck in the face with a blunt instrument, fracturing her nose and facial bones. She was also severely beaten (kicked) about the head and other portions of her body. There is no evidence of sexual attack, however, the autopsy discloses that an object (probably wooden), was forcibly thrust into her vagina, causing extensive lacerations to the vaginal orifice, resulting in massive hemorrhage and ultimately causing death with contributing factors being head injuries.

All clothing had been removed from the body without any apparent force with the exception of the underpants, which were torn off. Indications are that the facial injuries took place prior to removal of [REDACTED]'s clothing.

 MURDER OF, North Vancouver, B.C. 29/30 July, 1973
 NORTH VANCOUVER DETACHMENT CASE

At 9:15 P.M. on 29 JULY, 1973, [REDACTED] left her residence, [REDACTED] Inlet Drive, Burnaby, B.C., and walked or hitch-hiked to a bus stop approximately two blocks from her home. She was last observed alive at the bus stop at 9:25 P.M.

At 9:55 A.M. on 30 JULY, 1973, the dead body of [REDACTED] was found on Seymour Mountain near a transmitter tower. This location is five miles up and one half mile off the road leading to the Seymour Mountain resort area.

The body, nude except for shoes and nylon stockings, lay face down, with the head cradled on the left arm. Her clothing was left at the scene, piled neatly beside the body. The head had severe injuries caused by a blunt instrument, namely a rock, which was at the scene. The victim was sexually assaulted, both anal and vaginal.

A suspect in this case is a person the victim met two days prior to the murder. The only information available on this suspect follows:

First Name - [REDACTED] White male
 Dirty, unkempt, unshaven appearance
 [REDACTED] lived in an older model automobile

The identification of [REDACTED] remains unknown.

MURDER OF, near Clearwater, B.C., 19 October, 1973
 CLEARWATER DETACHMENT CASE

70 MILES NORTH of Kamloops, B.C.

At approximately 10:00 P.M., 19 October, 1973, [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was last seen alive while hitch-hiking in Clearwater enroute to Kamloops, B.C.

On 6 April, 1974, her nude, badly decomposed body was found in a shallow ditch approximately seven miles south of Clearwater.

Due to the decomposition of the body, the exact cause of death was not determinable and a sexual assault could not be verified either.

It is "speculated" that she was "picked up" while hitch-hiking and murdered by the person who gave her a ride. A "sexual" motivation seems plausible.

A list of the victim's personal possessions, which are missing from the body, follows:

- (a) Knee length camel hair coat, light brown (tan) in colour, with a darker brown checked pattern.
- (b) Blue slacks.
- (c) Plain white brassiere.
- (d) Green ruck-sack probably containing a change of under garments, tooth brush, etc.
- (e) Light blue purse containing a red wallet. Inside the wallet are personal papers, Social Insurance Card, family pictures, swimming and Girl Guide certificates, approx. \$50 in cash and a payroll cheque from the Wells Grey Hotel, Clearwater, B.C., made out to one [REDACTED]. Cheque drawn on the Royal Bank of Canada, Clearwater Branch 649, in the sum of \$53.

Re: [REDACTED] (BD: [REDACTED] OCT 54),
 MURDER OF, Kamloops, B.C., 6/7 November, 1973
 KAMLOOPS CITY DETACHMENT CASE

On 7 November, 1973, at 3:55 P.M., the body of [REDACTED] was discovered in the South Thompson River at Kamloops, B.C. The body was nude and had been sexually attacked.

The crime was undoubtedly "sex" motivated. She suffered extensive head injuries which were caused by a rock which was found near the body. Teeth marks were present on both breasts. Both breast nipples were severed by biting. A post mortem examination revealed that she had been jabbed with an object in the vaginal area, resulting in at least five individual injuries to the inside of the cervix and one injury to the inside of the anal area. A wooden stick was used in the vagina assault. Examinations made by the serology section were negative for human seminal fluid. Based on the fact there was no sperm in evidence, it is possible that the assailant was either temporarily or permanently impotent.

The following articles of clothing worn by [REDACTED] are missing:

- (a) Black knit sweater with black plastic buttons and a collar (possibly identifiable by repair work done to one of the armpits).
- (b) Long white knit scarf.
- (c) High waisted wool knit pants.
- (d) Black patent leather shoes, size 8, 1½" sole, 2½" heel, new condition.
- (e) White brassiere.
- (f) Panties, pantyhose/stockings (if she was wearing undergarments).

A vehicle described as follows was observed leaving the general area of the crime and it may be involved:

Vehicle: Approximately 1959 Dodge, Plymouth, or possibly a Chrysler. Pronounced "fins" on rear fenders.
 Colour: Beige or salmon.
 Four door sedan.
 "Beat up" condition.

Vehicle Occupants:

- 1. Male - age not established.
 Age up to 40 years.
 Long, dirty blonde hair.
- 2. White male passenger.

[REDACTED] had a promiscuous reputation and can be described as a "hippie" type. She hitch-hiked frequently. She was last seen alive in Kamloops at 9:20 P.M., 6 November, 1973, when she was hitch-hiking from her apartment to the city centre. It is assumed that she was picked up as a hitch-hiker and subsequently murdered.

Re: Unidentified female, suspected murder of,
Near Naramata, B.C., 24 June, 1974
PENTICTON DETACHMENT CASE

*10 miles FROM
Penticton, B.C.*

On June 24, 1974, the body of a female person was found off the Chute Lake road 19 miles N.N.E. of Penticton, B.C. The body was down an embankment beside a narrow dirt road in a heavily wooded area.

The body was in a state of 75% decomposition and was nude except for panties partially rolled down. A 3/4" brass safety pin was pinned to the panties. The body is described as follows:

White female - 18-22 years.
5'7", 140-150 lbs., long light brown hair.

The cause of death could not be determined due to the body being badly decomposed. A pathologist's opinion suggests that the body was at this location up to two months prior to discovery and was deposited there after death.

The identity of the body is not known.

A forensic odontology examination gives the following information:

- fillings of high quality, and done within the past two or three years.
- May have had some minor orthodontic work as a young girl.
- no tartar deposits.

Conclusion - originates from an above-average income group and was an aware dental patient.

It is believed that this was a sexually motivated murder.

Re: Unidentified female body - Suspected Murder Of,
Near Valemount, B.C., 26 May, 1974.
VALEMOUNT DETACHMENT CASE

On 26 May, 1974, a nude body of a female was located 8.5 miles west of the B.C./Alberta border on Highway #16. The body had been sawed in half and each part placed in a green plastic garbage bag. The bags were wrapped in two identical blankets. The body parts were tied with 3/16" polypropylene rope. Of significance, the knots used in securing the rope were of some sophistication and were obviously tied by a person who had experience in tying knots. For instance, the knots are of the type used by mountaineers.

The two wrapped sections of the body were lying down an embankment beside the highway.

The body was decomposed and it is believed that it was deposited at this location some time after freeze-up 1973, up until 6 weeks before it was discovered.

A description of the blanket covering the two halves of the body is pictured on the reverse.

Description of blanket:

Indian blanket: Blue design on a white background.

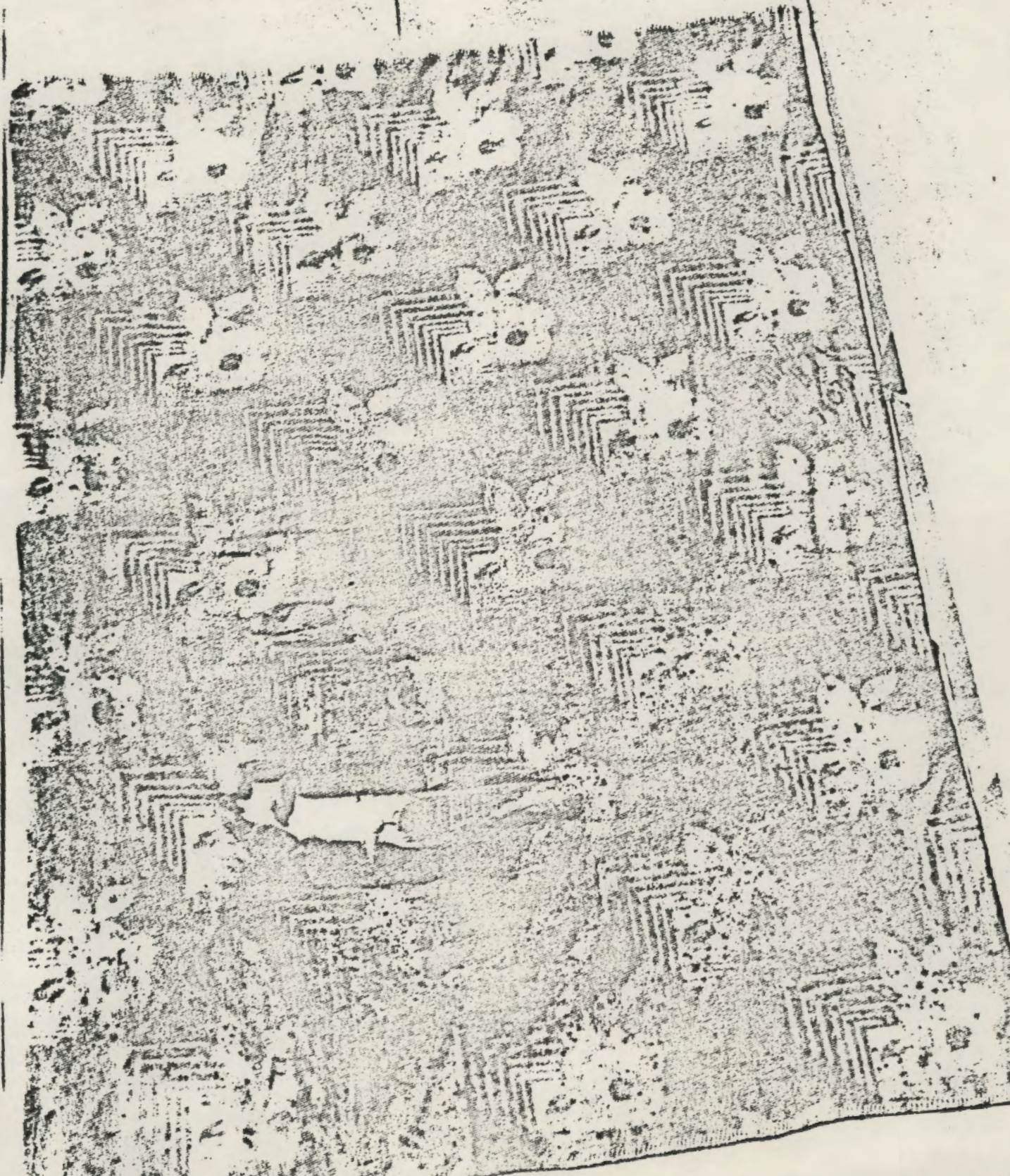
Pattern: Cartoon type Indian heads with two feathers. Series of inverted chevrons depicting old Indian markings.

The blanket is inexpensive and mass produced.

The identity of the murdered woman, who is described as follows, has not been established.

White female, age estimated at approx. 40 years.
Height: 5'5". Large hips, medium build, auburn hair with grey streaks.

A fingerprint search revealed no Canadian criminal record.

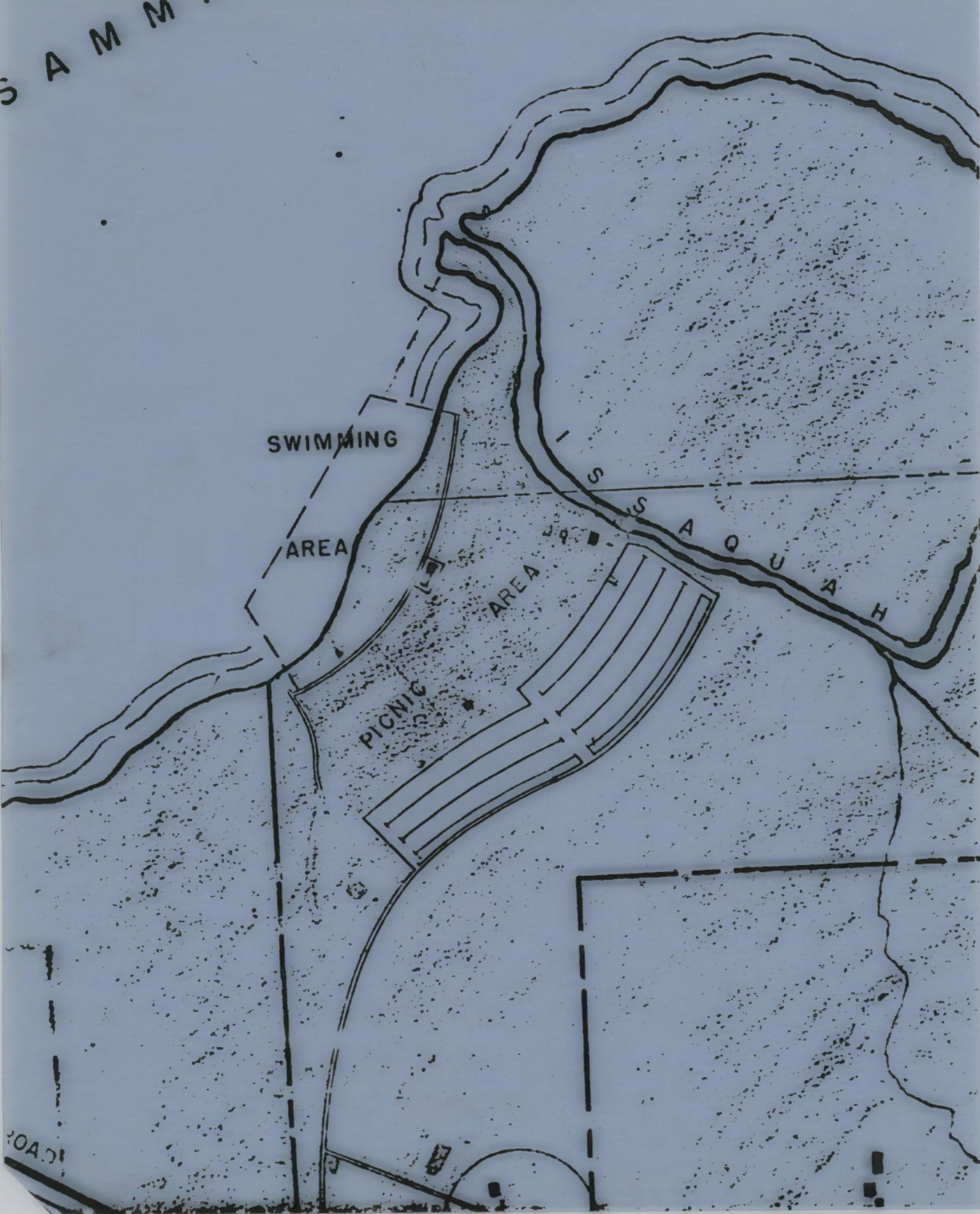

REVIEW OF AREA SEARCHED BY OFF. WARDSTROM

Yellow area - land search of entire State Park - Tuesday and Wednesday (07-16/17). Expanded and covered Pine Lake, Beaver Lake (in red) down to Redmond-Fall City Road and up to Fall City. Broken down into sections and had rig and team in each section. This was Friday.

Then Saturday, the green area was covered - team and a rig in each section. Had extra rigs and teams so another team back into the Pine Lake area and Yellow Lake and Laughing Jacob Lake areas. First two days ground search in the Park 95-100% sure nothing. Ran all secluded roads - teams checked brush and any area a person may have gone. Green on Saturday and Red on Friday covered.

Sunday - teams with just an observer and a rig checked driveways where they couldn't see cars and houses from the road - all Black - Colfield, Merrimont and Tiger Mountain, all the way to Squak Mountain, then sent teams back into black area, all the way to Redmond-Fall City-Preston.

Yellow Tuesday and Wednesday; Red sections Friday; Green on Saturday.

Overlapping some back into the Friday sections. Sunday was the black and hit all driveways again. Divers out again yesterday. Divers from I-90 all the way down the Issaquah Creek and last Wednesday had covered shoreline.

Lakes - If a plane takes pictures, you can see bottom of lake covered by rigs. Did not dive. Sent dogs into gravel pit areas - all covered. 24 jumpers landed in gravel pits. Footprints in some mud. Dogs covered the whole area and didn't find anything.

Ground search in State Park - 95-100% sure nothing. Rigs went up everything that they could.

Area west of Park in the green, essentially all overgrown. Sent team with a guy that lives there and familiar entire area - all covered. That is where they found 1 section that

Didn't cover far side of Tiger Mountain. Did cover Tradition Lake. Far side too much wilderness.

Along with the search, had helicopter going over I-90 and areas around Park.

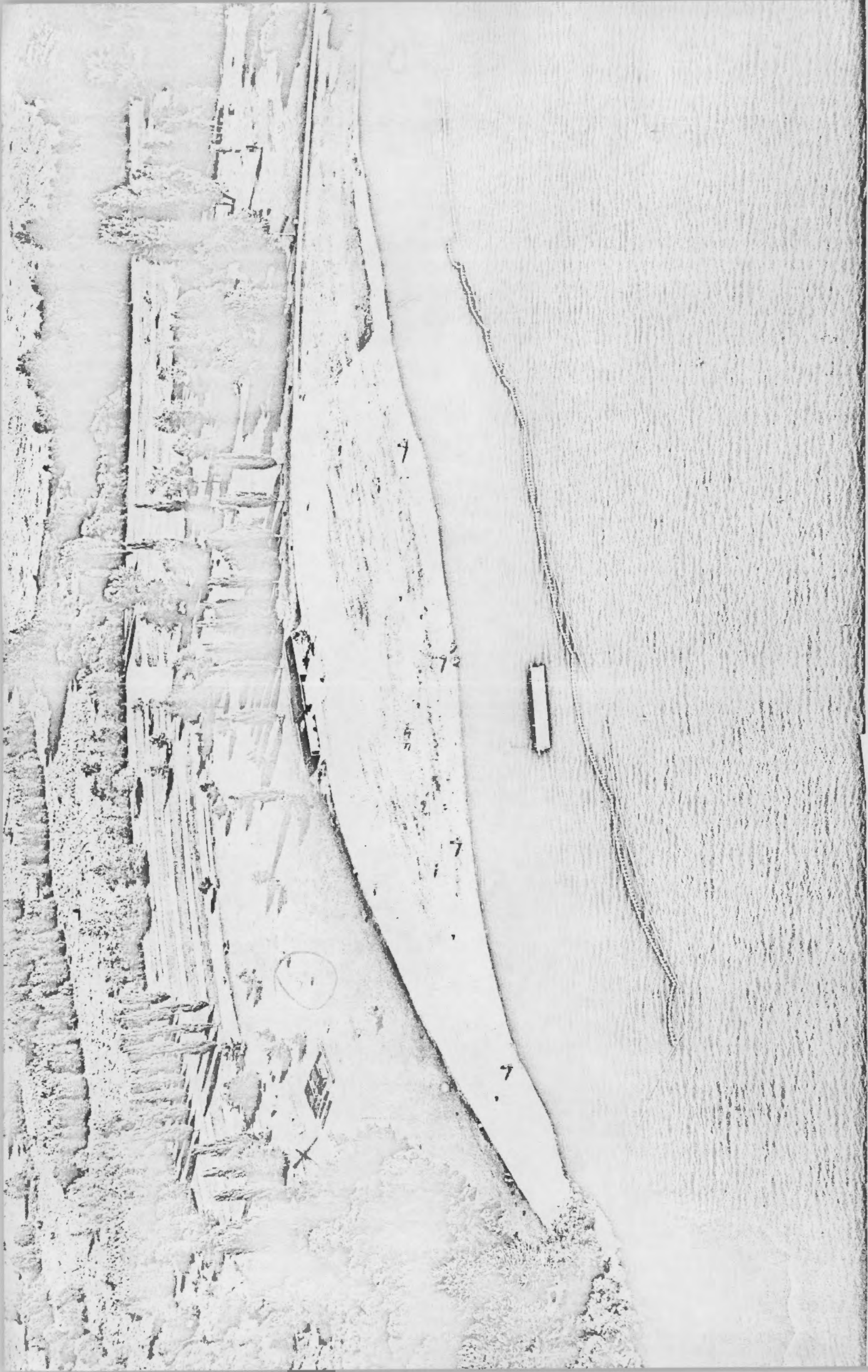

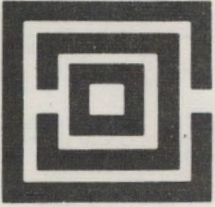

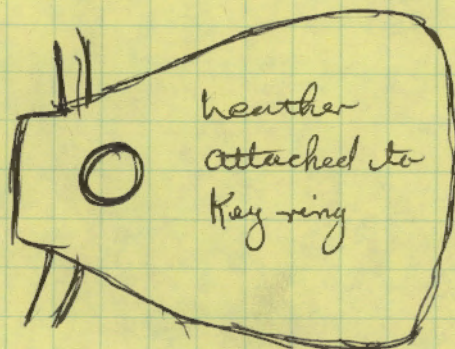

Vancouver hitchhiking to the welfare office. CAROL was married to [REDACTED]. Clark County has eliminated [REDACTED] from involvement in CAROL'S death or disappearance. He was cleared after a polygraph examination. CAROL was found about 25 miles from the area last seen.

The first set of bones appears to have been subject to more decomposition than [REDACTED]. The bones are that of a female, 18-25 years old, about 5'5" to 5'7". There is still a mandible missing from this body. The skull has been recovered. Dental charts of BRENDA BALL had been examined with negative results. Identification has not been made.

No apparent cause of death has been determined. Bones are being sent to the FBI lab for examination.

Clark County has a subject in jail by the name of [REDACTED]. He is charged with rape and attempt murder. [REDACTED] dumped a nude female in a county park after he had raped, strangled, shot with a dart gun, and stabbed her. He left the female for dead, but she lived. [REDACTED] is not talking. Clark County feels [REDACTED] may be responsible for the other deaths but they do not have any evidence to link [REDACTED] to the deaths. [REDACTED]'S photograph has been shown to witnesses in the King County cases with negative results. [REDACTED] appears to match the description of "TED" but Clark County has verified that [REDACTED] has had a moustache for the last year.

Our investigation into the deaths of Denise Naslund, Janice Ott, and a third unidentified person has developed to the degree that we are asking another favor of your office.

Considering the circumstances surrounding the M.O. used to dispose of the bodies of the victims we would appreciate a list of all the people released from Western State and other similar institutions before their closure, who were incarcerated as a result of criminal court action since January 1, 1964. Our reason is based on the fact that the suspect "Ted" was between 20 and 28 years of age, according to witnesses. Consequently we are going back 10 years to the time when the suspect would have been 18 years old at the time he was committed in an adult court.

If this request cannot be honored please advise us of an alternative that we could consider to provide this type of information.

To date we have investigated over 447 people who resemble Ted without any success in developing a good suspect.

Thank you for the assistance you've given us in this case.

On September 7, 1974, our Department was called to investigate the human remains found near Issaquah. After examination the remains were determined to be Denise Nasland, Janice Ott, and another person whose identity and sex are unknown.

We have received a voluminous amount of information from the public and other agencies regarding "Ted," the only suspect we have at this time. A lady from Tacoma reported an unusual experience with a cab driver in Pullman. We contacted Detective Hoffman of the Pullman Police Department who investigated the incident which didn't materialize into anything significant or relevant to our case. However, he referred us to you concerning an unsolved homicide that your Department investigated approximately two years ago. The homicide involved a co-ed who was found in a canyon about six months after her disappearance. Apparently, she had been stabbed. We would appreciate any information that you could provide regarding the circumstances of her disappearance and death.

ITEM:

On 10/31/74, DETECTIVES ROGER DUNN and ROBERT KEPPEL visited Clark County Sheriff's Office in Vancouver, Washington for purposes of comparing information on homicides of similar nature to King County's.

We contacted SGT. CHARLES BRINK. SGT. BRINK took us to their crime scene. On October 12, a hunter came across human bones in an area about two miles south of Yacolt, Washington. The area's description is heavily wooded with alder and fir trees. There were no nettles. The crime scene is considerably more remote than King County's. The city of Yacolt is about twenty-five miles from I-5. It is in northeast Clark County. About two miles from Yacolt, one must turn south on the Dole Valley road and travel about one mile, then turn off on a dirt road. At the end of the dirt road is a dirt turnaround commonly utilized by lovers. A path starts at the end of the turnaround.

The body location was about 100 feet along the path. One body was dumped between two old cedar logs approximately 5 feet in diameter. The other body was about 40 feet farther up the path dropped next to a similar old cedar log. Portions of bones from the first body were drug over the cedar log apparently by animals. Bones were found in an area of about 10,000 square feet. The path that the bodies were found along appeared to be more used by animals than humans. The only physical evidence located was a blue tampax holder near the second body find. The bodies were thought to be dumped nude since no clothing or jewelry was found. Investigation indicated that animals had removed and knawed bones from both bodies.

The second body had been identified as CAROL L. VALENZUELA, who was reported missing to the Camas Police on August 4, 1974. VALENZUELA was last seen in

The 10 page summary included with this letter is an attempt to accurately tell what I have found in Oregon which may concern the Cathy Parks disappearance and how it might relate to the Washington disappearances. There is undoubtedly many errors in the report and a great many unsubstantiated conclusions. I began thinking about the problem last May when Cathy Parks disappeared from our campus. (I am a third year graduate student in chemistry at O.S.U.) I never met her or any of the others who have disappeared but feel obligated to help however I can.

The man I offer as a suspect and whos name appears on the registration mentioned in the report is [REDACTED]. His family lives in Corvallis. I have withheld his name from everyone but you the reader even though I have discussed various aspects of the case with several friends and relatives.

I have found nothing positive to imply that [REDACTED] is guilty of a crime but enough general things to, I think, warrant an investigation of perhaps 1.) His high school record, 2.) A possible military record, 3.) His car ownership past and present, 4.) Obtain a recent photograph.

The data which would have allowed me to write detailed maps including accurate street names is locked in my dorm room at O.S.U.

I would not recommend that the family of [REDACTED] be contacted in the initial stages of the investigation. If nothing comes of it, embarrassment might be better avoided.

I have been on vacation here in Black Diamond since before Christmas and plan to return to Oregon by bus Sunday evening, January 5.



An attempt to reconstruct the Cathy Parks' disappearance as it may have involved "Ted".

Late in the evening (9:00 - 11:00 pm) of May 8, Cathy Parks left her dorm room alone to buy a fudge sundae at the M.U. building a couple of blocks away. Finding the M.U. closed, she turned onto A Street* and walked toward Monroe St two blocks from the M.U. building. As she advanced slowly along A Street, a dimly lighted street with cars parked at an angle facing the sidewalk, she thought about the letter she had written and tossed away, a letter asking her fiance to understand that she needed more time to get her life together, asking that their relationship be made less binding for at least awhile.

Earlier this same evening on a secluded road in the woods near McDonald State Forest, which lies about 3 miles from the O.S.U. Campus, a young man named "Ted" sat in his station wagon carefully planning a gruesome evening, wrapping his unhurt hand in a bandage and waiting for darkness to make recognition of himself or his station wagon less likely, a real danger since this was his hometown. He originally intended to visit his parents but changed his mind. When darkness finally came, Ted put out his cigarette in the over-filled ashtray. One last thought occurred to him. Before starting he reached into the glove box and tossed out his window the remains of a military survival kit, an almost spent roll of beige medical tape and by accident or on purpose the car registration which carried his name and address thinking that on this muddy backroad none of these articles would be found or at least associated with a crime.

He drove in the darkness out of the wooded area transversing a mile or so of somewhat muddy road, turned onto the hardtop and headed for the O.S.U. Campus.

When on the campus, he drove carefully to avoid contact with the Campus Security. Ted eventually parked on A Street facing the sidewalk, a parking place he had decided upon after the last few evenings of surveying the campus, a good place to observe the moderate number of pedestrians yet not be obvious.

Ted saw Cathy walking along looking as if she didn't have any specific destination and might therefore be persuaded to stop and talk, for although he was a stranger to her, he was moderately handsome, possessed a manner which instilled confidence, and had a painful bandaged hand. Cathy would well understand the pain since she was also suffering though in a different way.

They talked for awhile about school and finally about horses. Ted told her about his horse which he kept at the O.S.U. horse barn. Cathy was happy for the diversion and finally agreed to ride out to the horse barn to see the horse of which he was so proud.

Ted backed out of the parking spot smiling to Cathy, reassuring her that she would be pleased with his horse. Following the traffic pattern he headed toward Monroe St., Stopped and turned left onto Monroe. In a few blocks, they stopped at a stop light and turned left onto B Street*. They followed B Street for about 1 mile at which time the horse barn was in sight off the road to the right. However Ted did not turn toward the horse barn. He instead mumbled something about it being a little further up the road and drove straight ahead.

By this time Cathy was beginning to worry but what could she do? The car was moving rapidly. There were very few houses close to the and no traffic for her to signal her growing distress. To show fear might only aggravate her situation. They turned left onto an uphill gravel road about 1 mile past the horse barn. People do keep horses all over this area thought Cathy. She had

often been out here walking. However when Ted turned the station wagon down a muddy secluded road, she knew she was in serious trouble.

Driving recklessly along the road, Ted realized by Cathy's appearance that deceit was no longer possible or necessary. A call for help would not be heard since the nearest house was about 1/3 mile away through the trees. He drew a knife threatening Cathy not to do anything foolish as he turned the car into a muddy turnaround just 100 yds from where he sat waiting earlier in the evening. The tires sank deeply into the mud stopping the car. Ted tried repeatedly to rock the car out but failed. He didn't have a shovel nor anyone he could trust to help.

Cathy had become a liability. There wasn't any choice. He attacked her and killed her efficiently with his knife as he had been taught to do in the service. Ted then drug the body off some distance into the woods and walked back into Gorvallis. There he borrowed a car from a friend. That same night and morning Ted retrieved the body and the valuables from his car (he could say his car had been stolen) and dumped the body at an undetermined secluded place far removed from his "stolen" station wagon.

How the abandoned automobile and other articles were found.

I took a week long vacation during the last part of September from my research and studies in chemistry at O.S.U. (I am a third year graduate student at O.S.U.). During my vacation which was spent in Black Diamond, the Seattle Times presentation of the bones discovery near Issaquah with a review of all the Washington disappearances came to my attention. Since I was at O.S.U. during the Cathy Parks' disappearance, I was interested in finding a link between the Washington crimes and the Oregon disappearance of Cathy Parks.

My cousin Greg Ruppert drove me back to my dorm room at O.S.U. and stayed the night. In the evening we talked about the Issaquah bones and their location in relation to the scene of the abductions. I reasoned that there was only one place near the O.S.U. Campus that would duplicate the situation at Issaquah and that was out near the McDonald State Forest. There are several reasons why this area should be favorable for such a crime. (1.) It is the most secluded area within 5 miles of the campus. (2.) To leave the O.S.U. central campus by the route which has the least number of stop signs and stop lights and the most open road would require that one drive out in this direction. (3.) The horse barn located near the State Forest provides a very reasonable element of enticement to the story.

Greg agreed to drive out to this area the next morning to help me look for bones. We did look for 4 or 5 hrs but found only animal bones (some we turned into the Police for inspection). When we had worked our way along the back roads to the most secluded part of the area, we found (1.) The partial remains of a military survival kit which contained drugs, medicine, a clean 36" X 2" (approx.) bandage spread in the grass, several nutritional

items or wrappings and a card listing the original contents. We thought that it was probably the kind used in Vietnam. (2.) A mostly used roll of wide beige plastic medical tape. (3) An automobile registration which was somewhat soiled and had cobwebs attached.

100 yds further down the deeply rutted road we found a 15 yr old yellow and white Rambler station wagon high centered in the dried mud. At that time it had several windows smashed, 3 wheels missing, the top of the carburetor missing, the battery missing and the seat cushion on the passenger side missing. The license plates were still on the car and there was no evidence to show that anyone had tried to remove them. The paint, chrome, and body of this car were in good condition. Greg returned to his home in Tacoma that same evening.

In the next few days and weeks, I returned to the area perhaps 3 times and made more thorough searches of the car and the area. I noticed more vandalism and missing engine parts but found no bones of interest in the surrounding area.

When the story broke about the stabbing/falling death of Vicki Schneider at Evergreen College wherein was described the knife as a small butcher knife, I recalled that an empty knife box was on the front floor of the abandoned car. I compared the empty box with those at a local Payless drug store sportsman's counter and determined that it contained a "Pixie" model \$10.00 paring/general purpose knife with fixed 3" blade and black handle made by Gerber Legendary Blades in Portland. I wrote to the Campus Security at Evergreen but they said that their knife was of a much cheaper kind and thanked me for the letter.

During one of my visits to the abandoned car I noticed that the ceiling

cloth above the front passenger side was criss-crossed with knife cuts although the cloth was not hanging down or the damage visible from outside the car. At that time I attributed it to vandalism but now after some thought I have decided that the cuts were the results of testing the sharpness of the new knife while sitting in the driver's seat. None of the seats or other more visible upholstery was cut, a fact which supports this conclusion.


About a day after finding the registration, I called the home of the owner in Corvallis. A younger child answered the phone and then gave it to his mother (?) who said that the owner (possible her stepson, judging by her age 30-40 yrs and the manner in which she referred to him) had been in California since the first part of the year. She had no idea that the car was in the woods only about 3 miles from their home nor did she know where it had been recently or how it became stuck in the forest. She said she would ask her husband about it. I gave my name and phone number (754-1026) and told her to call or stop by if she wanted the registration and a detailed location of the car. I was never contacted. I made a photocopy of the registration and a few days later turned it over to the Corvallis Police along with some bones which proved to be animal. One of the policemen passing through the room when we were trying to fix the location of the abandoned car said he knew where it was and referred to the father of the family as a "no-good-nick".

I told the police that a link between the Cathy Parks' disappearance and the abandoned car should be investigated but I don't think anything was done.

In an effort to find out something about the owner of the car, I visited the Corvallis High School library and looked through the "Annuals" from

about 1968-1973. I found the owner who in 1970 was a sophomore. After 1970 I found nothing of him. I guessed that he had dropped out. There is a possibility that he may have gone to the other high school in the Corvallis area for the two remaining years but I believe this serves a different part of the Corvallis area and was not checked.

"Ted's" mother left him when he was young and needed her. The seed of hatred of woman was at that time planted and continued to grow more ominous as Ted grew older. His father did not give him the extra guidance he needed.


Ted was often in trouble in his teens. He quit school after his sophomore year. A short time later he joined the Army and was sent to Vietnam where he was trained to kill effectively.

Near the end of his military career, 1973, he was wounded and wore his arm in a sling for a few months as a civilian. He learned to win sympathy and trust with his affliction. It soon healed. Even though all obvious signs of his injury had disappeared, he remembered how to fix a wounded arm or hand, how to act the part of an injured man.

Ted grew up in a college town. He was very much attracted by the mystique of the college coed but could do nothing because of a barrier. His limited education was his barrier which prevented him from competing for the special kind of friendship which he desired most.

In the early Spring of 1974 he learned for the first time how to effectively use his skills to obtain his goal in an imperfect way. He used his make-believe wound to help trap the victim and his practiced knife to do revenge on the mother who left him.

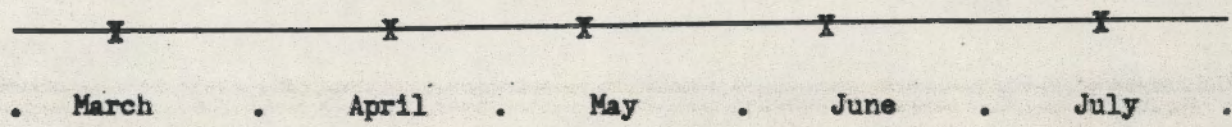

Considerations and findings which tend to link the disappearances in Washington with that of Cathy Parks in Oregon.

- 1.) College Coeds. In a very general way, the fact that 4 of the women who disappeared in Washington were college coeds as was the one who disappeared in Oregon would tend to relate the incidents.
- 2.) Abrupt disappearance, no body. The disappearances in both Washington and Oregon were all abrupt from the campuses. No bodies were found.
- 3.) Washington Ted-from out of state. At none of the Ted appearances did it seem as if he wore a disguise. One could conclude that Washington is therefore not his home state especially after his flagrant exposure at Lake Sammamish. He was not noticed at O.S.U. in Oregon possibly because he was not involved there or possibly because he had to operate in a less visible manner since he was more likely to be recognized.
- 4.) Day of the week. The following is a listing of the campus disappearances including the day of the week. All of these are related by their common middle of the week times.

Parks	May 8	Wednesday	Oregon
Hawkins	June 11	Tuesday	Washington


- 5.) Monthly frequency. Below is shown a line graph with X's marking the dates of the disappearances. Note that without the Oregon disappearance, a distinctly empty space exists for May.



This suggests that the Oregon disappearance is part of the same pattern.

6.) Tape and bandage. Beige colored tape and a large size bandage were found on the secluded road in Oregon. It is safe to state that thses articles did come from the abandoned station wagon since they were found very close to the registration. The road was otherwise relatively free of miscellaneous litter. Bandages or related fittings were confirmed to be an essential part of the disguise used in most of the Washington crimes.

Report on skeletal material found 1½ miles east of Issaquah, Washington
on 9-7-74 and 9-8-74.

Bag #1 - Spine, rib cage, pelvis, left femur (fragmentary)

The material in bag #1 represents a female. This diagnosis is on the basis of the fragmentary pelvis. The key here is the very wide sciatic notch which is a characteristic hallmark of the female pelvis. The age of this material is based upon the femur. The greater trochanter is absent and the bulbous nature of the femur suggests that this epiphysis had not completely fused. Also, the distal end of the femur is missing and again it is believed to be the result of immaturity. The greater trochanter usually fuses with the shaft of the femur between 17-18 years of age. Also, this is the approximate time for the distal end of the femur to fuse (Krogman, 1955).

Bag #2 - Fragmentary right pelvis and femur

It is believed that this material goes with that in bag #1. The pelvis, on the basis of the sciatic notch is female and in this instance we have a portion of the pubic bone and the subpubic angle is female. As in the femur in bag #1, this specimen lacks a greater trochanter and distal end of the femur. This points to a similar age. I hasten to add that there is always a range of maturational variability attached to age estimates, and when we say a bone is a certain age (17-18) this is at best an approximation; for it is well known that there is a great amount of individual variability in the timing of fusion of bony parts.

Bag #3 - Human Skull

Sex: Female. All evidence suggests that this is a female skull. The brow ridges are small. The nuchal lines are very small. The suprameatal crest is practically nonexistent. The total morphology of the skull suggests female.

Age: ca. 18-22 years. This estimate is based essentially upon dental eruption and the wear of the teeth since the skull displays a general premature closure of all cranial and circum-meatal sutures.

Race: Caucasian. The skull and mandible suggest Caucasian since it exhibits numerous features usually associated with this group.

Morphological description: Face: Extremely high and narrow face; zygomatic arches are very small and narrow, and the zygoma inclines distally at a sharp angle, thus accentuating the narrowness of the upper face. The nasal bones are extremely high and narrow and the root of the nose is high also. The nasal aperture is very narrow. From the side, the face presents a straight or orthognathous profile. This nasal morphology suggests that the individual possessed a long, narrow nose.

Bag #3 continued

Cranium: The cranium is exceedingly long and narrow. The long head is the result of premature closure of the sagittal suture. This condition is called scaphocephaly and results in very long heads compared to their breadths. The cranial index ($\frac{\text{breadth} \times 100}{\text{length}} = 63.95$).

This is an extremely long, narrow-headed individual. The index for "average" long-headed individuals is between 71 and 76, thus the long, narrow head in this case is obvious.

The forehead is bulbous and the frontal bosses are quite pronounced. There is a small degree of asymmetry in that the left side of the forehead projects somewhat more forward than the right side.

The occipital bone as well as the general contour of the rear end of the skull is bun-shaped. Both of these conditions, the fullness of the forehead and the bun configuration are probably the result of unusual brain growth in a front-back direction during the period of brain growth in this individual.

Teeth (maxilla): All teeth are permanent and the individual possessed the normal complement of 16 maxillary teeth. The third molar had not erupted, although from its position in the crypt it is judged that this tooth was probably a few months from erupting. An isolated right maxillary third molar from bag #4 fits into the vacant crypt of skull (#7). The central incisors are normal sized and still display the remnants of the three mamelons along the incisal border. In older individuals these have usually been worn away. The long axes of the central incisors are inclined to the left, especially the left central. Also, the left central is positioned approximately 3 mm lingual (behind) the right central. An additional detail, the right central incisor presents a slight incline plane on the mesial half of the tooth. This indentation was not postmortem and therefore might be useful for identification. The lateral incisors are average size. The left lateral is positioned lingual (behind) the left central and its long axis is slightly rotated mesiodistally. The right lateral incisor is more or less in normal position, but it is rotated several degrees distolingually. This rotation positions the incisal border of this tooth obliquely to the same border of the right central. The canines are of normal size and present no distinguishing features. The premolars are both bicuspid and appear of normal dimensions. The first upper molars present 4 cusps. These teeth are of normal size. The right upper first molar has a slight development of the Carabelli cusp. It appears as a small enlarged crest on the lingual surface of the protocone (mesiolingual cusp). The left first upper molar lacks this cusp. If dental casts were ever made of this individual, this trait should be apparent on the cast. The second molars have four cusps although as is often the case in modern Homo sapiens the hypocone (distolingual cusp) is quite small and is really nothing more than a slight indentation along the distal surface of the tooth. The third molars are 3-cusped; they lack the hypocone (distolingual cusp). The absence of this cusp is frequently observed in humans.

Bag #4 - Left tibia, represented only by the mid-shaft, and 3rd maxillary molar

I do not believe on the basis of size and morphology that this tibia is from the same individual represented in bag #8. There is a third maxillary molar in this bag belonging to the skull in bag #3.

Bag #5 - Bone fragment, unidentified

Bag #6 - Mandible

Sex: Female. This sex diagnosis is on the basis of the small size and proportions of the mandible. The markings where the attachment of the masseter muscle inserts are barely visible. The coronoid process is narrow and pointed and the semilunar sulcus is relatively shallow. The ascending ramus, as well as the corpus is not pronounced. All of these features suggest female. One feature does not suggest female, and this is the square profile presented by the mandible in the region of the chin when viewed from below. I do believe, however, that the overriding features suggest female.

Age: The individual had not erupted the third molars. They do not appear to be present, however, this should be checked by x-ray examination.

Teeth: The central incisors are represented only by the left one. The right is absent and it appears to have been lost postmortum. The lateral incisors appear normal in size. The left one is positioned slightly distolingually to the left central. The canines are represented only by the left one and, here again, I believe it was lost postmortum. The premolars show nothing unusual and are of normal size and position. It might be noted that both first premolars display 2 or 3 small cuspules along the mesial marginal ridge.

The first molars have four cusps and present the +4 pattern. In addition, the left one has an amalgam filling in the buccal developmental groove while the right has a large amalgam filling on the occlusal, mesial and buccal surfaces. The second molars are also 4-cusped. The left one has an amalgam filling identical to the first and the right one has an amalgam filling that occupies the occlusal and buccal developmental groove. The filling does not pass to the mesial surface as on M₁.

Bag #7 - Mandible (this mandible fits with the skull in bag #3)

Teeth: All 16 permanent teeth are present. As in the maxillary dentition M₃ has not erupted or perhaps the protoconid (mesiobuccal cusp) had just pierced the gingival tissue. The central incisors appear to be of normal size and morphology. The incisal border of the left central is horizontal, whereas that of the right central inclines distally. The lateral incisors are of average dimensions. The right lateral incisor is more caniniform than its antimere and is also positioned (rotated) lingually to the canine. The canines appear to be of normal size. The first premolar is bicuspid and both right and left are similar in size and position. The second premolar is also bicuspid, albeit, the left presents a better developed distal marginal rim than its antimere. Also, this marginal rim displays two or three very small grooves. The first molars present 5 cusps. The left one has the typical Y-5 pattern. This configuration is as follows: The hypoconid (distobuccal cusp) contacts the metaconid (mesiolingual cusp) in the central basin. The occlusal surface of the right first molar is obliterated due to a large amalgam filling. The second molars present 4 cusps and here again we see an amalgam filling on the occlusal surface of the right one. Although not erupted M₃ possesses 5 cusps. Finally, it should be noted that in addition to the two fillings mentioned, there is a buccal amalgam filling in the developmental groove of both lower first molars. The mandible is gracile and presents few rugosities. Both the ascending ramus and the corpus are small and narrow.

Bag #8 - Right tibia - proximal and distal ends missing

Bag #9 - Vertebral column consisting of 11 thoracic vertebra and 5 lumbar and very fragmentary pelvis, all articulated. Bones are small and delicate suggesting female. There is a laceration along the ventral surface of the centra of lumbar 3 and 4. The explanation for this is not immediately apparent to me.

Bag #10 - Cervical vertebra (axis to 7th plus 1st thoracic with attached 1st rib (left) - probably this material goes with vertebrae in bag #9).

Bag #11 - Fibula, fragment - distal and proximal ends missing

Bag #12 - Right humerus. Small but more robust than humeri in bags #13 and #20. This humerus represents another individual.

Bag #13 - Left humerus, same general structure as specimen in bag #20. Specimens in bags #20 and #13 probably represent one individual.

Bag #14 - Right femur. Distal and proximal ends missing. The lesser trochanter is missing. The bone is heavy and shows well developed linea aspera.

Bag #15 - Right scapular fragment (small)

Bag #16 - Bone fragment, possibly from mid-shaft of right ulna.


Bag #17 - Left femur. Distal and proximal ends missing. Lesser trochanter is missing. This bone also presents well developed linea aspera and it is of the same general size and proportion as specimen in

- Bag #18 - Atlas vertebra - probably goes with vertebral column from bag #1. Left femur with distal and proximal ends missing. The lesser trochanter is present. Small femur.
- Bag #19 - Bone fragment, possibly from mid-shaft of radius or ulna.
- Bag #20 - Right humerus fragment. Proximal and distal ends missing. Deltoid tuberosities slightly developed. Small in construction.
- Bag #21 - Four lumbar vertebrae (L1 - L4). The 3 upper vertebrae are articulated, one is loose. These are badly preserved. The vertebral epiphyses are still represented as slight lines thus suggesting recent closure, and therefore a young adult.
- Bag #22 - Bone fragment, possibly from mid-shaft of radius or ulna.
- Bag #23 - Fragment of rib, left side
- Bag #24 - Fragment of what appears to be the odontoid process from the axis
- ✓ Bag #25 - Six ribs - very fragmentary. All left ribs. One of these, I am not sure which number, shows a marked indentation just medial to the angular facet. The rib is broken at that point and may represent an old injury. All of these ribs are gracile.
- Bag #26 - Fibula fragment. Distal and proximal ends missing

Summary

There are definitely three (3) individuals represented by this material. The skull and one mandible are probably female and may go with the articulated spinal cord and pelvic and femoral fragments in bags 1 and 2. The isolated mandible is probably that of a young female and may well belong with various bone fragments represented in this collection. There are two (2) more or less complete vertebral columns plus four (4) lumbar vertebrae from a third individual. In addition, there are femora from three (3) individuals, thus, there is positive evidence of three (3) individuals. It is our opinion that there are two (2) fragmentary female skeletons represented and they both were probably in their late teens or early twenties at the time of death. Since the third individual is represented by such fragmentary material it is difficult to assess the sex or age, however, the femur is rather small. I would not hazard a sexual diagnosis at this time.

Bag #27 - Right femur. Proximal and distal ends missing. Lesser trochanter present. Linea aspera well defined. This bone is somewhat larger and more robust than the isolated femur in bag #18. If these two femora go together (bags #27 and #18) we then have the two femora from the third individual. If not, a fourth individual is represented by the femur in bag #27. Additional clarification is necessary before positive identification is possible.

Bag #28 - Fragment of what appears to be the upper portion of the left greater sciatic notch, thus this fragment represents a piece of ilium. Female ?.

Bag #29 - Fragment. Portion of right ilium representing the upper border of the sciatic notch and part of the auricular facet. The contour of the notch strongly suggests female. This fragment and the fragment from bag #28 represent the right and left halves of two ilia, however, in my opinion, they are not from the same individual.

#30 - Two (2) boxes

Box #1: Right maxillary canine, human. Both from size and coloration, the tooth appears to go with the mandible in bag #7.

Box #2: Left maxillary lateral incisor, human. Both from size and coloration the tooth appears to go with the mandible in bag #7.

Bag #31 - Nonhuman. Animal pelvis.

Bag #32 - Nonhuman. May be a bird bone.

Bag #33 - Nonhuman vertebrae and ribs from some small mammal.

Bag #34 - Religious book. Fragmentary.

Bag #35 - Three human ribs. All left.

Bag #36 - Left tibia, proximal and distal ends missing. The anterior crest is extremely sharp and the bone is more robust than the tibiae in bages #4 and #8, thus representing another individual.

Bag #37 - Left human scapula, badly preserved. Small; delicate.

Bag #38 - Human Rib - left.

Bag #39 - Unidentified material.

- Bag #40 - Nonhuman vertebrae and two ribs, probably a young cow?
- Bag #41 - Human left pelvic fragment. The contour of the sciatic notch suggests female. There is evidence that the iliac crest has recently fused, thus indicating an individual in their late teens or early twenties. The pelvic fragment in bag #29 might belong with the more complete pelvis in bag #41. This is certainly no more than an educated guess based upon size. If this is true it means there are three individuals as stated earlier. If this new fragment does not go with the other material, and if fragments in bags #28 and #29 are different individuals, we have the pelvic fragments of four individuals.
- Bag #42 - Shaft of human left humerus. Extremely small; delicate. proximal and distal ends missing. I believe that this humerus goes with the right humerus in bag #12.
- Bag #43 - Nonhuman. Probably the distal epiphysis (?) - femur of a cow?
- Bag #44 - This bag contains extremely small bone fragments which I do not believe to be human. I do not know what animal they are from.
- Bag #45 - Unidentified bone fragments.
- Bag #46 - There was no bag #46 included.
- Bag #47 - I do not know what the specimen in this bag is, probably an animal of some sort?
- Bag #48 - Seven fragmentary thoracic vertebrae, plus what appears to be fragmentary ribs. This material is human. The vertebrae are badly preserved. Also, where it is possible to determine, it appears that the epiphysis of the centra had not completely fused and were lost after death suggesting a young adult. These thoracic vertebrae might go with the four isolated lumbar vertebrae described in bag #21.

Remarks:

The victim and her mother had been having difficulties for the preceding year since her father's demise. The victim expressed her dissatisfaction over her mother's dating and recent announcement of engagement.

The victim was known to hitchhike in the area of her residence and school and was rumored by schoolmates to have experimented with marijuana. She had been also having problems at school and was once suspended for two days for a petty theft and truancy.


On the date she became missing, she told her mother she was going to the Rio Del Mar beach area to ride mini-bikes with a boy names [REDACTED]. The mother stated that the victim had numerous phone conversations with [REDACTED] during the vacation week preceding her disappearance. Numerous persons with either the first or last name of [REDACTED] have since been located, investigated, interviewed etc. with negative results.

On the date in question at approximately 12:45 P.M. the victim's younger sister (11) received a phone call at the family residence for their mother. 



Gentlemen:

This office is interested in attempting to ascertain if your female homicides which remain unsolved have any similarities or patterns to the homicides our county has experienced over the past two years beginning in February, 1972, and our last one in December, 1973.

I am sending you a copy of information I feel is pertinent to our cases to help you understand what type of homicides we are dealing with.

In researching the northern California area in unsolved female homicides, a pattern begins to develop as to areas and months of the year they occur (see attached list). On all of our cases our females were known to hitchhike or were hitchhiking when they were killed. Another aspect about our victims is the fact that all of them came from broken homes which may be a criteria which our suspect, who is unknown, may require before committing his crime. Our victims have never been killed where they have been found, therefore we have no crime scene per se. We have never recovered any personal property such as clothing, shoes, etc. that our victims were wearing. The victims are always nude and dumped over a bank near running water in rural locations. The suspect vehicle would have to park in the roadway as there are no pull-off areas, therefore no tire tracks have ever been located.

We have, at this time, sent our cases along with photographs and complete autopsy reports to Howard Teten of the F.B.I. who does psychological profiles on what type of person or persons we may be looking for.

We would appreciate it if a copy of your report, copies of your crime scene photographs and your complete autopsy reports and any other information you can supply be sent to our department so we can have them evaluated. If it appears that we may all be working the same individual, a meeting of all departments concerned could be held at a convenient location to discuss these unsolved homicides.

We would also appreciate any information on female homicides in other jurisdictions which are not listed on the attached list.

On June 26, 1974 RO and Captain John Hess met with Criminal Specialist Dave Strube at CII to discuss the information this department has developed concerning unsolved female homicides in seventeen surrounding jurisdictions with similarities to the six female homicides our county has experienced over the past two years. The other 17 jurisdictions have 22 unsolved female homicides. When Dave Strube received this information from this department, he checked the CII files back to 1970 and came up with 56 more female homicides that were similar to our cases but covering a larger area of Northern California for a total of 84 unsolved homicides.

This meeting was held to determine the following:

1. What criteria or similarities did each case have to meet for us to keep them as similar cases in the homicides we are investigating.
2. To ascertain if a suspect profile or victim profile can be developed with the information available from these cases.
3. The ultimate goal of having a seminar with all departments concerned with the information pieced together to come up with a suspect or suspects and the apprehension of the responsible in these numerous motiveless killings which at this time outnumber the muslim or zebra assassinations.
