



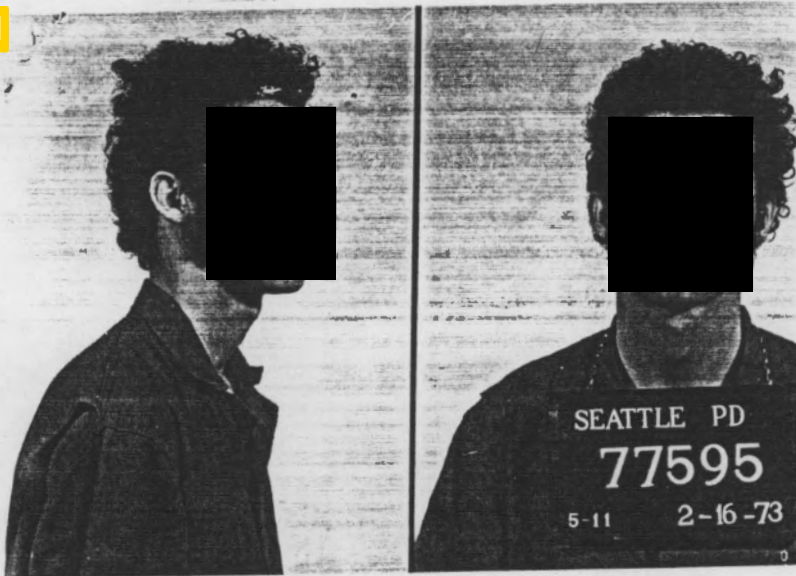

[REDACTED] : Will testify, facts concerning their daughters habits and conversation when last seen by the Father, to their daughter failing to return home on 2-21-74.

Lenora Ewen : Will testify to being with the Victim on 2-21-74, that they were close girlfriends knowing each others habits, that she last saw the Victim at 2030 Hrs. on 2-21-74 at her house.

Mary J. Hargis : Will testify that the Victim came to her home around 2030 Hrs. on 2-21-74 inquiring about one of her daughters, that she told the Victim her daughter was at Shakey's Pizza Parlor, 3500 SW Avalon Wy., that the Vic. left in that direction from her house.

DeAnne Oberlander : Will testify that the Def. is her ex-husband, that he came to her house on or about the 1st of Feb. and stayed with her and her husband until the 25th of Feb. that he returned to the house on March 3 & left from there again and did not return. That on the night of Feb. 21st he left the house sometime after 1930 hrs. returning with muddy clothes & washing them. That she identifies the knife & sheath found at the crime scene as belonging to her and her husband & that she has observed the Def. carrying this same knife & sheath while staying at their house.

Charles Oberlander : Will testify to most of the same facts as his wife DeAnne.

Deborah Emond & Vickie L. Vaughn : Will testify to being present at the Oberlander's residence during the time the Def. was living there, that they were both present the night of 2-21-74 when the Def. came home around 2030 hrs. with his clothing covered with mud and that he immediately washed them, that he displayed appx. \$8.00 in cash saying that he had earned it helping to change a tire on a car.

Carroll Beane & Helen Beane : Will testify that they operate a cleaning est. in White Center, that the Def. came to work for them on Feb. 21st using the name of [REDACTED] that he worked that day and was taken home by Mr. Beane that evening around 1730 Hrs. That the Def. worked the following day of Feb. 22 and was again taken home, that the Def. called them that eve. at home stating he had to leave and go to Portland, Ore. the next day, but would return to work on Mon. Feb. 25th & that the Def. never returned to work for them.

The subject was committed to Western State Hospital on May 9, 1973, from King County Superior Court. Due to the inadequate records and security of Western State Hospital, we can not be assured of his confinement from May 9, 1973, to January 25, 1974.

Either in late 1973 or in the Year 1974, I called the Bellevue Police and told them about suspicious activities (Suspected Gang Rape). I gave them a License Number of the first car which had been at the scene the longest. They, in turn, transferred the information to the King County Sheriff's Office.

I was later told that one of the Sheriff's Cars had come. The Officer had looked around on the "upper" part of Lake Washington Blvd. S.E., on the West Side of the 112 S.E. Overpass of 405 Freeway.

However, due to a misunderstanding, the Officer did not proceed to the correct address. The area was on the "lower" part of Lake Washington Blvd. S.E., and in the approximate Block of 60th ~~St.~~ ^{152.60th}. Close to the entrance of Hazelwood Lane. Therefore, my suspicions were never confirmed.

I am not writing to complain as I was nervous and frightened for the person or persons at the time. In my excitement a misunderstanding resulted. The point I am thinking about is with all of this about "Ted", and I can't help but wonder about the suspicious activities that evening.

(Ted's)
The Driver of the car sort of fits the description. He was about twenty-two or older. Had light blonde hair--ear length and slightly curly. Had a slim build.

His car was the only one I could get the License Number on. The other four cars had headlights aimed in both directions preventing anyone from seeing the license numbers. This is what alerted me to "Hanky-Panky". Also, the first car had been parked for an hour and the occupants seated quietly. Driver and front seat passenger were smoking cigarettes.

With cars parked or moving about and filled with young teen-age boys, the boys' actions were definitely questionable. No screeching of tires, no hot-rodding, tooting of horns void, no yelling, laughing, or talking, no smoking or drinking beer or acting silly. Nobody running from car to car----everyone seated in a car. Nothing to attract attention.

Out of curiosity I drove by them again. In the second parked car on my left, in the full glare of my headlights, a tiny person suddenly sat upright in the middle of the back seat and stared into my headlights. (That person wanted to be seen and, I would say, looked frightened.) Not only looked frightened but naked and it was cold outside. The person was pushed back down on the seat because of the quickness and stiffness of the body as it went sideways. The tiny person had shoulder length, very white (as this paper) thin hair. I would guess the person to be ~~very~~ young.

In an indented area by the first parked car (license number given) tall dried grass had all been neatly laid down in one direction indicating a blanket had been laid there. Also, in my searching around the next day I found two unused, narrow-lined sheets of school paper ripped from a wired folder. And one very clean and new, small, Lady's handkerchief with a small white monogram in the corner--no initials. A crumpled used package of Raleigh Cigarettes, and a few smoked cigs.

Lion on Tiger Mountain— there goes the neighborhood

Mickey is a tawny-haired young female weighing 350 pounds.

A lioness that weight apparently is regarded by boy lions as just right. But Mickey hasn't really had a chance to test her charms.

Now she has created a storm center on Tiger Mountain, outside Issaquah, and is threatened with being shifted to a new abode.

WHAT'S A LIONESS doing on Tiger Mountain?

Mickey lives in a comfortable chain-link-fenced pen at the home of John Devries, 26222 S. E. 152nd St. Some of the neighbors are not enamored of a lioness neighbor.

They fear for the safety of their children, who could push little fists through the fencing.

Otherwise the fence and its roof seem secure.

Although stating firmly that the neighborhood children are the pri-

mary concern, one neighbor pointed out that Mickey's presence also poses economic problems. A prospective homebuyer hearing a lion roar is likely to tuck away his checkbook and quickly depart the area. Its comparative wildness is a major attraction, but that's a bit too wild.

LET IN ONE LIONESS and there goes the neighborhood.

Devries is the man in the middle. The county has started court proceedings against him, demanding removal of Mickey. She doesn't belong to Devries. He's harboring her for a friend, Randy Thomason of Burien, trained in zoology with lions his special interest.

Devries likes Mickey well enough, but confesses when it comes to lions, he can take 'em or leave 'em alone.

"I really think the danger is slight, if any," Devries said. "But all the same, I'd like to see Mickey out of here. Life can get complicated

enough without having a lioness making things more difficult."

Devries is the object of the county's animal-control-division complaint, but Mickey's fate really is up to Thomason.

Thomason plans to appeal the county's action or at least make some move to gain a little time.

MICKEY had been quartered at the Olympic Game Farm outside Sequim, where she was a ward of the Disneyland animal people. She had to leave the farm because of lack of cage space.

"There really isn't all that cage space anywhere around here," Thomason said.

Meanwhile, Mickey eats well and romps with the Devries' Norwegian Elkhound. The dog stays outside the cage, of course, and Mickey stays in—at least for now.

"But get her out of King County," says the county.
