Readers:

This report focuses on the murders and disappearances of several young women throughout the states of California, Oregon, and Washington.

Over the past five years, there have been fourteen young women murdered in Northern California, and all of these murders appear to have been committed by the same person. Eight other young women have mysteriously disappeared in the states of Oregon and Washington over the past year. Since the murders and the disappearances may be related to each other, both topics will be discussed in this report.

The California Department of Justice, through its Division of Law Enforcement, has developed this report with the help of many local law enforcement agencies. The report has been designed to present a brief overview of the crime situation, to aid investigators in solving these crimes, and to offer suggestions as to a course of future action.

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GENERAL STATEMENT

After evaluating more than one hundred murder cases involving young female victims, it appears that thirteen of these crimes were committed by the same person. Each of the thirteen cases occurred in Northern California within the past five years. As of this writing, the suspect remains unknown and the cases unsolved.

BACKGROUND

In June 1974, representatives from a local law enforcement agency met with personnel from the California Department of Justice to discuss several unsolved murders, all having the following similarities:

1. The victims were female,
2. under thirty years of age,
3. found nude or partially clothed,
4. apparently dumped at locations other than where they had been murdered,
5. with some or all of their clothing missing.

During the meeting, the California Department of Justice was requested to implement a study of all homicides that appeared to match the above listed criteria. The purpose of the study was to determine if a series of murders existed that appeared to have been committed by the same individual or group.

In July 1974, the California Department of Justice initiated the study as requested. One hundred and three cases were found to have the above listed characteristics, and each case was reviewed. After review, it was this writer's opinion that thirteen of the unsolved murder cases (fourteen

victims) did have enough common similarities to constitute a series. Furthermore, each of the thirteen cases appeared to have been perpetrated by the same individual.

During the study, it was also learned that several young women had mysteriously disappeared in the states of Oregon and Washington. Two of the missing females were later found murdered. Due to the similar characteristics involved in the multi-state crimes, it was thought possible that a connection existed between the cases of the missing young women and the selected murder cases in the California series.

The remainder of this report focuses on the thirteen cases in the murder series, and the possible connection with the missing females in the states of Oregon and Washington.

SUMMARY OF THE MURDER SERIES

This section of the report briefly summarizes each of the cases in the series, beginning with the first case in 1969.

On December 10, 1969, [REDACTED] was abducted from her boyfriend's apartment in the city of Rodeo. Her nude body was discovered on December 28, 1969, lying over a roadside embankment near Bolinas Lagoon in Marin County. The victim had apparently been kept alive for approximately ten days after her abduction. Although the victim was found completely nude and none of her clothing could be located, she apparently had not been sexually molested. The cause of death was listed as aspiration due to an unidentified virus. To date, none of her clothing has ever been located.

On March 13, 1970, [REDACTED] was last seen in the parking lot of the Coronado Inn in the city of Vallejo. Her nude body was discovered in Lake County on March 21, 1970, lying off an isolated county

road in some heavy brush. None of the victim's clothing has ever been located, and it is unknown if she had been sexually molested. The cause of death has never been determined exactly; however, it may have resulted from a blow to the head followed by drowning.

On August 27, 19⁷¹, the nude body of [REDACTED] was discovered lying in some shrubbery on the bank of Lake Merced, in the city of San Francisco. She had been stabbed three times in the chest and abdominal area, and was apparently dumped at the discovery site. The victim had been dead several days prior to being found. She was completely nude when found and none of her clothing has ever been located. It is unknown if the victim had been sexually molested.

On February 4, 1972, Maureen L. Sterling and Yvonne L. Weber were last seen at the Redwood Skating Rink in the city of Santa Rosa. The skeletal remains of both victims were discovered in a remote area of eastern Sonoma County on December 28, 1972. It appeared that the victims had been dumped where they were found, after being murdered elsewhere. The cause of death remains unknown. None of the clothing for either victim has ever been located. Due to the condition of the victims, it was not possible to determine if they had been sexually assaulted.

On March 4, 1972, [REDACTED] was last seen hitchhiking north on U.S. Hwy-101, from Marin County to her residence in Santa Rosa. Her nude body was discovered the following day, lying in a creekbed in an isolated section of eastern Sonoma County. The victim was apparently murdered at some unknown location and thrown over the roadside embankment to the site where she was found. She had been strangled to death and also received superficial cuts in her chest area. Her body bore signs of having been bound prior to being dumped at the discovery site. None of her clothing has ever been located, and she had apparently been raped.

On November 20 or 21, 1972, [REDACTED] was last seen by a family acquaintance in a Santa Rosa market. Her nude body was discovered on December 12, 1972, lying over a roadside embankment in a heavily wooded area of eastern Sonoma County. The cause of death was listed as a dislocation of the first and second cervical vertebra. The victim was apparently dumped at the location completely nude, and none of her clothing has ever been located. She had not been sexually assaulted.

On May 29, 1973, the nude body of [REDACTED] was discovered lying in some shrubbery in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park. She had apparently been murdered elsewhere and dumped at the location where she was found. All of the victim's clothing was missing except for her bra, which was found around her neck. She had been sexually molested, as semen was found in her vagina, rectum, and mouth. The cause of death was listed as strangulation.

On June 9, 1973, [REDACTED] was last seen leaving her San Francisco residence enroute to the store. Her nude body was discovered the following day, lying in some bushes on a vacant lot. The victim was apparently dumped at the location completely nude, and none of her clothing has ever been found. She may have been sexually molested, as semen was found in her vagina. The cause of death was listed as strangulation.

On July 1, 1973, [REDACTED] was last seen leaving a friend's house in the city of San Francisco. Her nude body was discovered the following day, lying in the schoolyard at the Benjamin Franklin Junior High School in San Francisco. She had apparently been murdered by asphyxiation and dumped completely nude at the discovery site. Although none of her clothing has ever been located, she apparently had not been sexually molested.

On July 12, 1973, [REDACTED] was last seen at a motel where she was staying, while visiting in San Francisco. Her nude body was

discovered on July 15, 1973, lying in a parking lot on the Washington High School grounds in San Francisco. She had apparently been strangled to death and dumped at the location where she was found. None of her clothing has ever been located, and it appeared she may have been raped.

On July 15, 1973, [REDACTED] was last seen leaving her grandmother's house in Garberville, hitchhiking south on US Highway 101. Her nude body was discovered on July 31, 1973, at the same remote location where the remains of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were found on December 28, 1972. She had apparently been dumped over the roadside embankment after being murdered at some unknown location. None of her clothing has ever been located. Death was caused by strychnine poisoning. It is unknown if the victim had been sexually molested.

On December 22, 1973, [REDACTED] was last seen hitchhiking on US Highway 101, from the area of Malibu Beach to her home in Garberville. Her nude body was discovered in a creek in eastern Sonoma County on December 28, 1973. She had been strangled to death, hog-tied with a 1/4-inch nylon rope, and then thrown into a creek. None of her clothing has ever been located. She may have been sexually assaulted, as semen was found in her vagina.

On September 29, 1974, [REDACTED] was found floating in the Salinas River near the city of Greenfield in Monterey County. The area is typically a rural farm area and floodplain. She had been strangled to death and dumped into the river completely nude. None of her clothing has ever been located. When she was pulled from the river, she was still relatively warm, indicating she had not been dead long. It is unknown if the victim had been sexually molested.

AREAS WHERE THE BODIES WERE DISCOVERED

All six of the Sonoma County murder victims were discovered in the eastern section of the county, in areas that are typically rural and semi-isolated. The bodies were found dumped over roadside embankments, into ravines or creekbeds heavily lined with trees and brush.

The map on the following page depicts the discovery sites of the Sonoma County victims. On a scale of three miles to the inch, it can be seen that the furthest point between the discovery sites is sixteen miles.

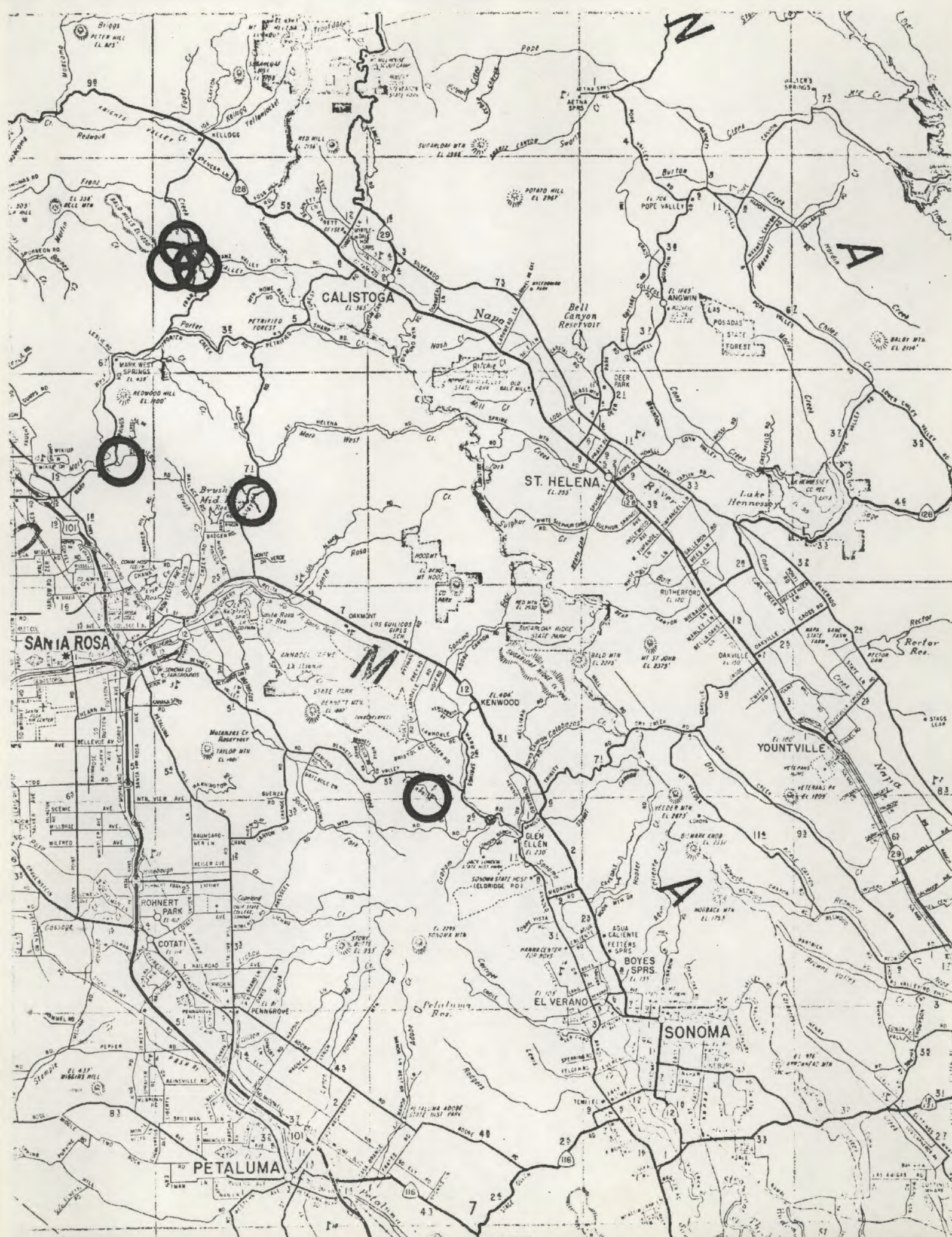
NOTE: [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were discovered at the same location on December 28, 1972, and seven months later the body of [REDACTED] was discovered in exactly the same place.

Other victims found in similar type areas were [REDACTED] found in heavy brush near an isolated county road in Lake County; [REDACTED], found lying over a roadside embankment near Bolinas Lagoon in Marin County; and [REDACTED], found in a river in a rural farm area of Monterey County.

In San Francisco, the areas where the bodies were discovered are somewhat different. Two of the victims were found lying on schoolgrounds, two were found in parks, and one was found in some bushes on a vacant lot.

SUSPECT PROFILE

Although the suspect in this murder series remains unknown, and no physical description of the perpetrator is available, the following tentative profile of the suspect was developed. The writer has based the profile upon his knowledge of the cases, past cases of a similar nature, and his interpretation of the available information.



It is the writer's opinion that the suspect is:

1. Male, because of the strength required to throw the bodies to their resting places.
2. Caucasian, because the majority of the known perpetrators in past crimes of this nature were Caucasians.
3. Under 50 years of age, because of the sexual overtones involved in some of the killings (a psychiatric evaluation of six murders in the series lists the suspect between 17 and 25 years of age), his physical strength, and because the majority of known offenders in similar crimes were below the age of 50.
4. Physically strong, for the same reason as cited in item #1.
5. Familiar with witchcraft or the occult, because of a witchcraft symbol found during the [REDACTED] case and the possible occult involvement in the missing female cases in the states of Oregon and Washington. ?
6. A lone operator, because of the nature of the crimes and the fact that the suspect has not been detected. If this was a group effort, the chances are that some information on the suspects would have been detected and reported.
7. Cunning, because of the lack of evidence at the discovery sites. The suspect apparently parked his vehicle in the roadway and not on the shoulder, thus eliminating any possibility of obtaining tire track impressions.
8. Knowledgeable in the art of knot tying, because of the type of knots used in binding [REDACTED]. Other victims also showed signs of having been bound; however, no bindings were located at the scenes.
9. Familiar with the geographical areas where the bodies were deposited,

because of the close proximity of the discovery sites in Sonoma County and San Francisco.

10. A collector of his victim's clothing, because none of the clothing of the fourteen victims has ever been found.
11. Probably working in a job that allows him to travel about freely and unsupervised, primarily along US Highway 101, such as a long-haul truck driver, traveling salesman, or construction worker. The majority of the bodies were discovered east of US Highway 101, within a few miles of the highway.

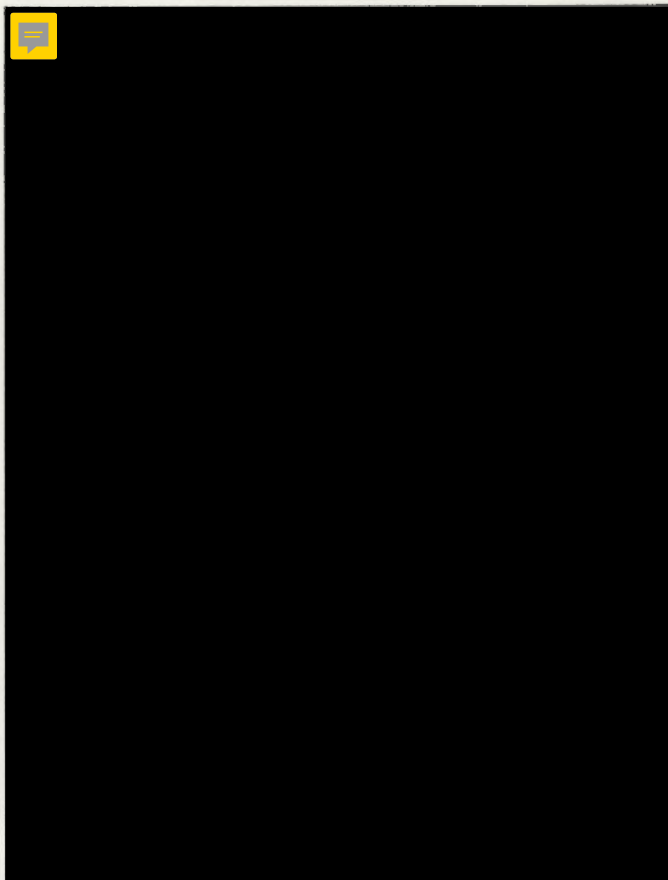
VICTIM PROFILE

Each of the murder victims had certain physical characteristics which were quite similar, and were combined to make up the following profile of the typical murder victim in this series. The victims were typically:

1. Female
2. Caucasian (except Yvonne Quilantang, who was a Negro)
3. Between 12 and 24 years of age
4. Of small to medium physical stature
5. With long hair parted in the middle
6. With pierced ears
7. Attired in casual street clothing

The item is described as: A straw carrying bag, approximately twenty-four inches high, with straw handles.

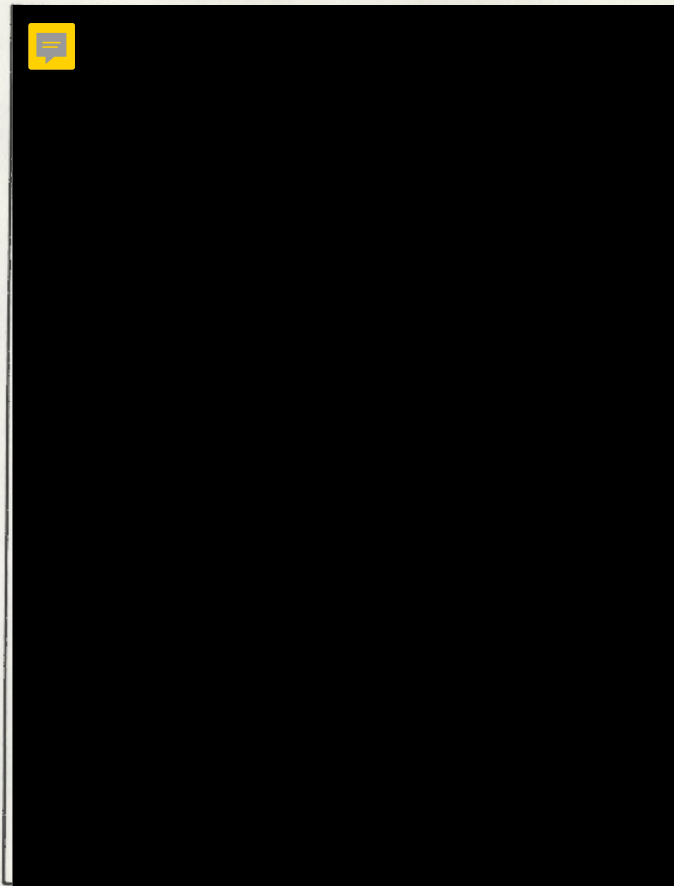

5. Red with black lace panties.
6. Woman's black vinyl jacket.
7. Yellowish gold sandals with a strap between the toes and a strap across the top of the foot with Indian designs imprinted on it.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

1. There are no crime scenes per se; all of the victims were murdered at some unknown location and their bodies deposited where they were found. (One possible exception is the murder of [REDACTED], who was believed to have been killed where she was found.)
2. Most of the victims were found near water (i.e., lakes, rivers, streams, ditches, etc.).
3. Only those victims over eighteen years of age were sexually molested.
4. All of the victims were found completely nude and none of their clothing has ever been found. (One exception is the murder of [REDACTED] in San Francisco. She was found nude; however, her bra was found around her neck.)
5. Most of the victims were known to hitchhike, and several were hitchhiking when they were last seen.
6. Several of the victims were involved in narcotics, generally to a small degree. However, drugs did not appear to have been the motive for the killings.
7. Generally, the victims disappeared over the weekend; Friday through Sunday. The time of day was consistent with the hours of darkness.
8. The majority of the victims were known to have been sexually active.
9. The majority of the victims were from broken homes or homes with family problems.
10. Some of the victims had been bound.
11. The majority of the bodies were discovered east of U.S. Hwy-101, within a few miles of the highway.
12. The bodies were deposited over roadside embankments in rural, semi-isolated areas or in schoolyards, parks, and vacant lots.

13. The suspect may experiment in various methods of killing. In the majority of cases, strangulation was the cause of death; however, some of the victims were stabbed or poisoned.
14. The suspect is apparently physically strong, since the victims were thrown bodily by the suspect to their resting places. There was no indication that any of the victims had been dragged to where they were found.

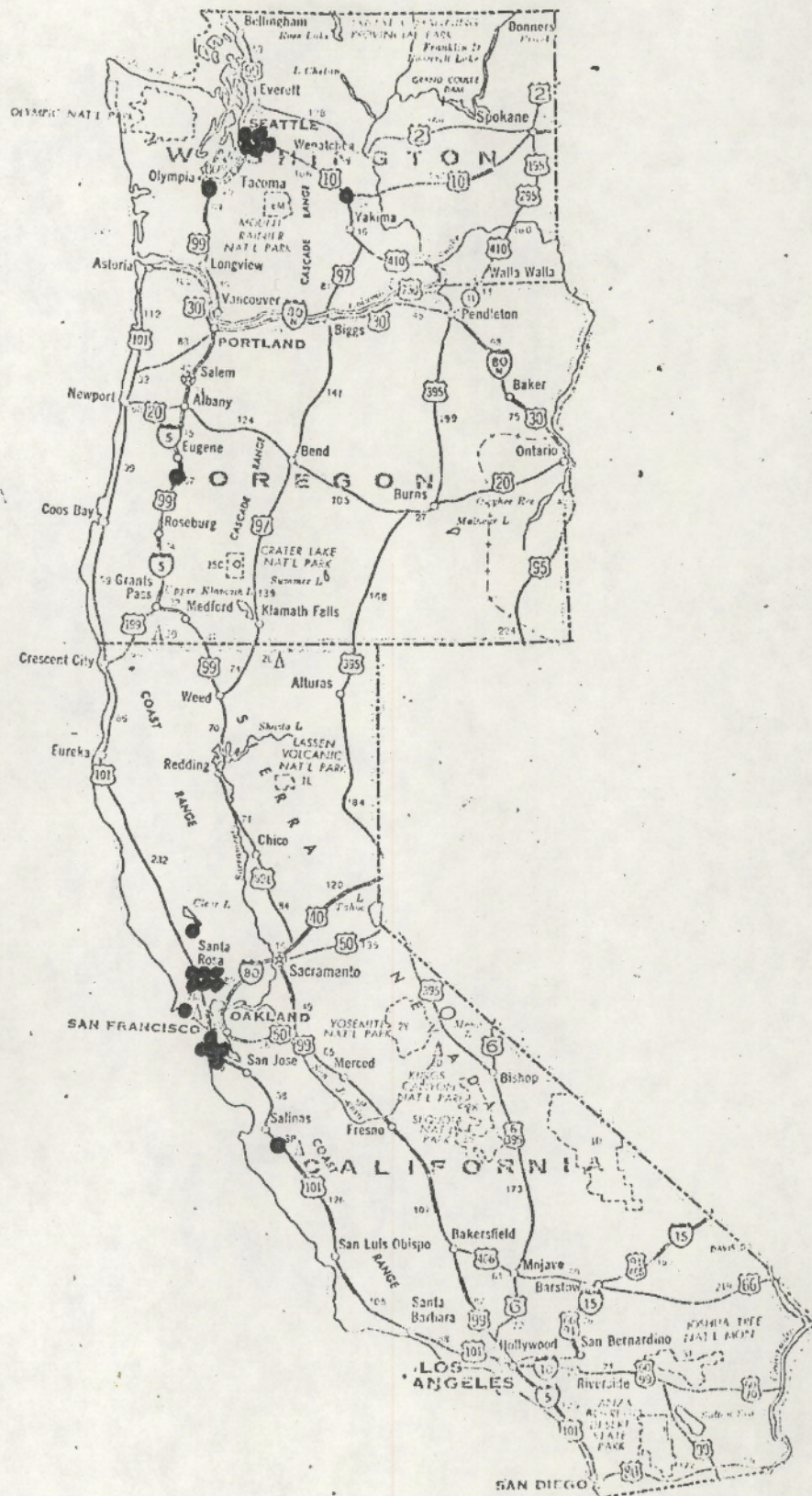
POSSIBLE OUT-OF-STATE CONNECTION

Since January 31, 1974, eight young women have mysteriously disappeared from various locations throughout the states of Washington and Oregon. On September 10, 1974, the skeletal remains of two young women were discovered lying over a roadside embankment in King County, Washington. The remains were later identified as being: Janice Ott and Denise Naslund, the last two missing females in the state of Washington.

Perhaps there is a connection between the murder series in California and the missing females from out-of-state, as there are several common similarities:

1. The missing females match the general profile of the murder victims in California.
2. The bodies were discovered in similar type areas.
3. The bodies found in Washington were found nude and no clothing was located.
4. The missing females in Washington and Oregon disappeared between January and July 1974. There was no reported activity in the California murder series during that time.
5. The unknown suspect in the missing persons series apparently travels about freely as the unknown suspect in the California cases is believed to be doing.

The map on the following page depicts the general locations where each of the California murder victims were discovered, and where each of the out-of-state females disappeared.



OUT-OF-STATE VICTIM INFORMATION

The following section pertains to the missing females in the states of Washington and Oregon. Included in this section are: a photograph of each missing female, her physical and clothing descriptions, and a brief summary of the disappearance of each young woman.

At the end of this section is a composite of a possible suspect in the disappearance and murders of Janice Ott and Denise Naslund.

LYNDA ANN HEALY

Female, Caucasian, 5-7, 115, 7-3-52, long brown hair parted in the middle, blue eyes, 1/2 inch scar on the bridge of her nose.

The missing female was last seen on Thursday, 1-31-74, at 2400 hours, when she left the main floor of her campus residence at the University of Washington, to proceed to her basement bedroom. Bloodstains were found in her bedroom, and the victim is still missing.

Last seen wearing:

1. Blue jeans.
2. White smock type blouse with blue trim.
3. Brown vinyl waffle stompers.
4. Brown belt.
5. Turquoise rings on each ring finger.

Missing from her room:

1. Red backpack, possibly containing a yellow ski cap and miscellaneous books. Her identification was intact and in the room.

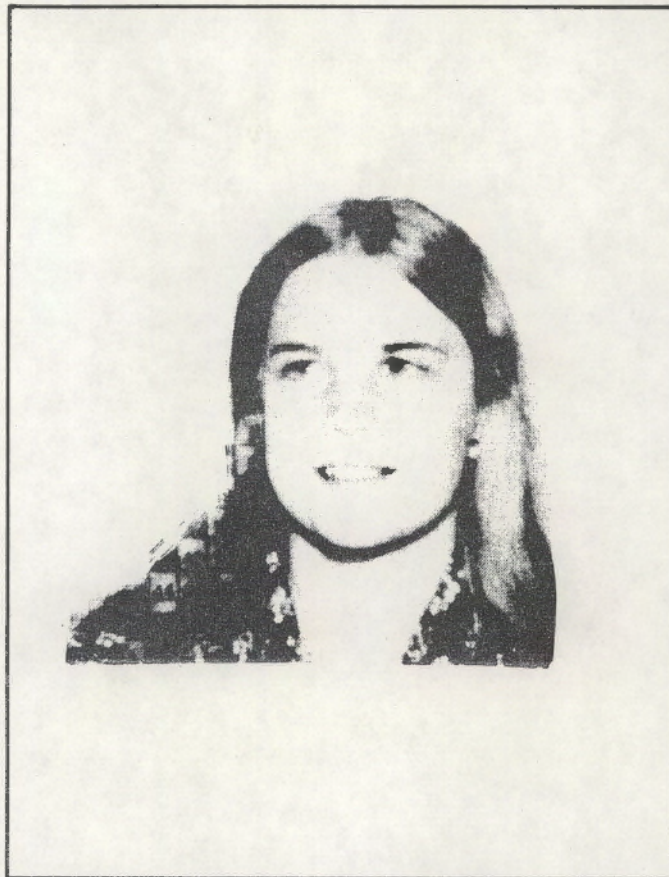

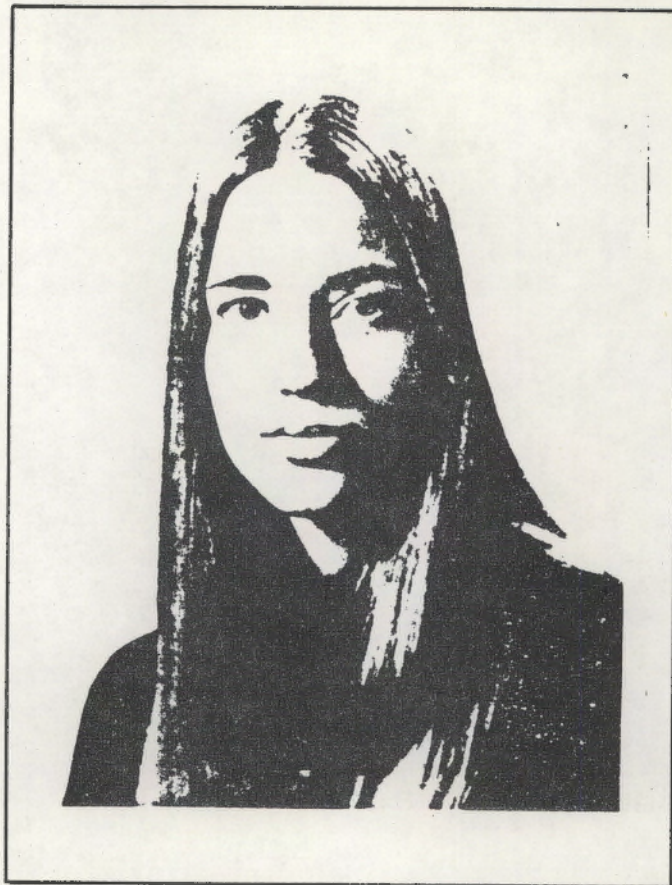

4. Brown hush-puppy type shoes.



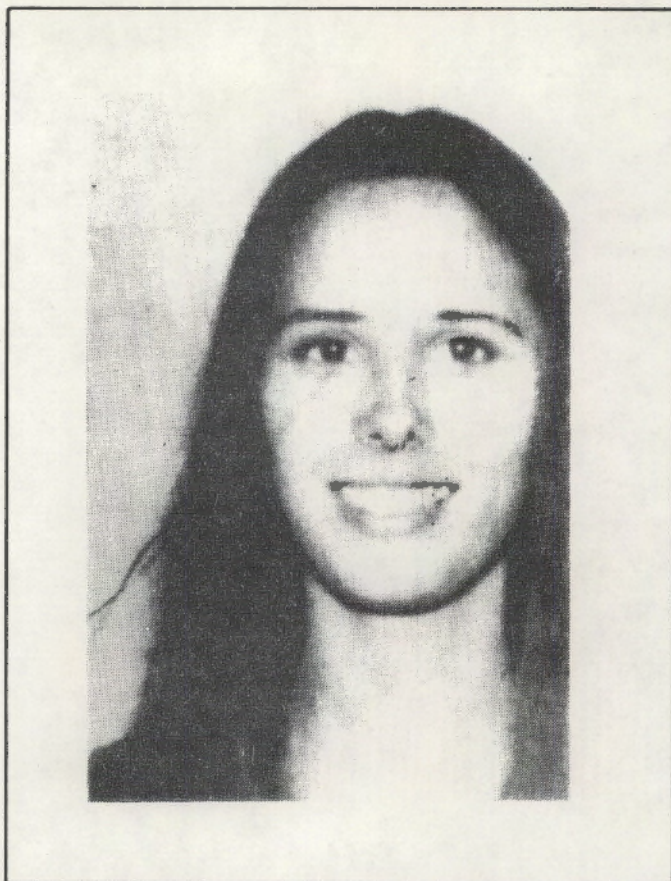
ROBERTA KATHLEEN PARKS

She was then observed to be pushing her bike towards the parking lot, accompanied by the man. On September 10, 1974, her remains were found dumped over a roadside embankment, along with the remains of Denise Naslund.

DENISE MARIE NASLUND

Female, Caucasian, 5-4, 120, 10-10-55, shoulder length brown hair parted in the middle, brown eyes.

The victim was last seen on Sunday, 7-14-74, at 1600 hours, at Lake Sammamish State Park in Washington. She had been observed talking to another young woman in the women's lavatory. Her remains were discovered on September 10, 1974, dumped over a roadside embankment. Janice Ott's body was also discovered at the same place. None of their clothing was found.

Last seen wearing:

1. Cut off shorts.
2. Dark blue halter top.
3. Brown, Mexican style sandals.

POSSIBLE SUSPECT IN THE WASHINGTON CASES



The subject pictured above was observed walking with Janice Ott, when she was last seen at 1230 hours on 7-14-74, at Lake Sammamish State Park.

The subject is described as: Male, Caucasian, mid to late 20's, 5-7 to 5-8, 160 lbs., neck length blond-brown hair, slight English accent, wearing white boxer-style shorts, a white T-shirt, and white tennis shoes. He was also wearing a sling on his left arm.

The subject's car is possibly a Volkswagen, Bug design, painted an unusual medium shade of brown.

CONCLUSIONS

1. Certain similar characteristics exist, which tend to link the cases together; however, there is not sufficient evidence to establish any positive connections at this time.
2. It is believed that the fourteen murders in California were committed by the same person.
3. There is a possibility that the same person who is responsible for the murders in California is also the responsible in the disappearance of eight young women in Washington and Oregon, two of whom were found murdered.
4. The suspect remains unknown.
5. The murders will probably continue until such time as the perpetrator is identified and apprehended.
6. At the present time, there does not appear to be enough evidence to lead to the perpetrator's conviction should he be identified and apprehended.
7. The victims' clothing, should it be located, could be the vital evidence needed for a conviction.
8. No trends or frequencies of attack could be established.
9. The perpetrator apparently strikes at random; no specific days or dates.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. The California Department of Justice should continue to monitor all incoming reports, and remain alert for future crimes of this type.
2. When the next similar case occurs, the investigating agency should utilize the Visual Investigative Analysis techniques, provided by the California Department of Justice.
3. Any agency making arrests for similar type crimes, or finding the clothing as described in this report, should notify the California Department of Justice. In turn, the California Department of Justice will notify all interested agencies.
