

A STATEMENT ON THE LAW SCHOOL ADMISSIONS TEST

Given the tremendous number of applications an admissions committee such as your own must review to select a relatively few entering students, I can understand the tendency to rely upon a universal measuring device such as the LSAT in screen-applicants. A committee member, faced with several dozen files to evaluate in a limited period of time, may feel that, realistically, the LSAT score provides the only means of managing the load expeditiously. Despite these considerations, however, I feel obliged to offer in my own behalf the request that my entire application file be given equal consideration, if at all possible.

I do not believe this is the time to be timid, and I shall not be. I have planned too long for a career in law to allow the fear vanity or a poor performance on the LSAT prevent me from making every effort to plead my case for admission to law school. Therefore, I will say to you now, with the greatest confidence, that the file you have before you is not just the file of a "qualified student", but the file of an individual who is obstinate enough to want to become a critical and tireless student and practitioner of the law, and qualified enough to succeed. My grades these past two years, my recommendations, and my personal statement speak of Ted Bundy the student, the worker, and researcher in pursuit of a legal/education; the LSAT does not and cannot reveal this. Dear Sirs:

It has been my pleasure to know Ted Bundy for over a year now as a student in three of my courses, as an advisee and as a personal friend. I know him well enough to make a comprehensive evaluation of his attributes. His performance in all of my classes (one a large lecture course of 300 students, one an honors seminar with 20 members, the other an advanced seminar with 10 students) was superior. He consistently achieved one of the highest scores on all tests, papers and discussion performances. He is an extremely diligent, hard-working student who has always impressed me with his degree of preparation and enthusiasm for learning. At times he even pursued self-initiated research into areas of interest to him which went well beyond the required readings and assignments. He gets involved. Furthermore, he is one of the most articulate undergraduates I have known and has verbal skills which exceed those of most of our graduate students. His questions and answers are always germane to the discussion topic and his interest in learning has a way of exciting others around him in conversations. It is clear that other students use him as a standard to emulate. Similarly his more recent academic record is outstanding and demonstrates a high level of intellectual capabilities. As you know, during his first year and a half of college his grades were mediocre. This reflected more his lack of committment and uncertainty about his area of studies than his abilities. Since returning from his subsequent period of political and government activities, he has established his true goals of studying human behavior and pursuing a career in law. I know he is sincere and has no ambivalence in this pursuit and his grades since returning to college are further evidence of this dedication. Thus, there is no question about his ability to learn and achieve academically.

It should also be noted that he is not just an academic grind. While being successful in his courses he is actively involved in numerous outside projects. He has begun an exciting investigation of the dynamics of jury trial procedures for his honors thesis which promises to be a significant contribution to our understanding of this aspect of the judicial system. At the same time he is participating as a member of the Crisis Clinic staff which aids individuals in distress. Another of his activities is being one of the prime movers in a local pilot project to tap the strength of various presidential candidates among young voters. And, as if this were not enough, he is an integral member of a student-faculty curriculum committee which is currently assessing the department's undergraduate research program. His involvement here, as in the others listed, is well beyond mere presence at meetings. He, in large part, designed and carried out the entire assessment phase of this committee's investigation. Without a

doubt, one can have nothing but admiration for his energy and use of skills in all these extra activities. I am awed!

His personal characteristics are all of the highest standards. Ted is a mature, young man who is very responsible and emotionally stable (but not emotionally flat as many students appear—he does get excited or upset appropriately in various situations). He has an excellent sense of humor and in general is a great individual to know as a personal acquaintance. He seems to have many friends and from my knowledge, he can take charge of a project in an unassuming fashion as well as work smoothly under the direction of others. I am at a loss to delineate any real weaknesses he has. Only two points come to mind concerning possible drawbacks. One is his tendency, though infrequent, to be too serious about some matters which appear to me not to be that crucial. The second is that he is not pursuing a career in psychology as I believe he would become a great colleague.

In summary, this is an exceptional individual. He is bright, articulate and active to the extent that I would rate him in the top 1% of college seniors I have known. He has the capabilities, background and self-sustaining motivation to complete any law or doctorate degree program requirements with flying colors. I recommend most highly, without any reservations, that you accept him in your program.



This statement has been written in response to requests, implicit and explicit, contained in law school application forms. I hope it will enlarge your understanding of my qualifications for law school.

Post-Graduate Employment

- Criminal Corrections Consultant. January 1973. Currently retained by the King County Office of Law and Justice Planning to identify recidivism rates for offenders who have been found guilty of misdemeanors and gross misdemeanors in the twelve County District Courts. The purpose of the study is to determine the nature and number of offenses committed subsequent to a conviction in District Court.
- Trime Commission Assistant Director. October 1972 to January 1973. As assistant to the Director of the Seattle Crime Prevention Commission suggested and did the preliminary investigation for the Commission's investigations into assaults against women and "white-collar" (economic) crime. Wrote press releases, speeches, and newspaper articles for the Commission. Participated extensively in the planning of the Commission's activities for 1973.
- Campaign Research Assistant. September 1972 to November 1972. Was a member of the paid staff in the State headquarters of the Governor Evans' re-election campaign. Concentrated primarily on research involving the opponent.
- Psychiatric Counselor. June 1972 to September 1972. Carried a full-time caseload of twelve clients during a four-month internship in Harborview Hospital's Psychiatric Outpatient Clinic. Held periodic sessions with clients; entered progress reports in hospital charts; continually re-evaluated psychiatric diagnoses; and referred clients to physicians for medical and psychotherapeutic medication evaluations. Participated in numerous training sessions conducted by staff psychiatrists.

I could go on at great length to explain that the practice of law is a life-long goal, or that I do not have great expectations that a law degree is a guaranty of wealth and prestige. The important factor, however, is that law fulfills a functional need which my daily routine has forced me to recognize.

I apply to law school because this institution will give me the tools to become a more effective actor in the social role I have defined for myself.

Dear Dean Hunt:

I hope that it doesn't seem inappropriate for an engineer to recommend the admission of an applicant to your law school. I am not the least bit uncomfortable in this role, though. Public life has placed me in working contact with a great number of law students and attorneys. For this reason, I feel that I can recommend Theodore Bundy to your law school and predict that he will be as fine a law student as has ever studied there.

I first met Ted after he had been selected to join my campaign staff in 1972. It was the consensus among those of us who directed the operation that Ted's performance was outstanding. Given a key role in the issues, research, and strategy section, he demonstrated an ability to define and organize his own projects, to effectively synthesize and clearly communicate factual information, and to tolerate uncertain and sometimes critical situations. In the end, it was probably his composure and discretion that allowed him to successfully carry out his assignments. These qualities made his contributions to strategy and policy dependable and productive.

If, however, you are concerned that a political campaign is not a measure of a prospective law student, then I am sure you will look, as I have, at Ted's other achievements and activities. Dear Sirs:

It has been my pleasure to know Ted Bundy for over a year now as a student in three of my courses, as an advisee and as a personal friend. I know him well enough to make a comprehensive evaluation of his attributes. His performance in all of my classes (one a large lecture course of 300 students, one an honors seminar with 20 members, the other an advanced seminar with 10 students) was superior. He consistently achieved one of the highest scores on all tests, papers and discussion performances. He is an extremely diligent, hard-working student who has always impressed me with his degree of preparation and enthusiasm for learning. At times he even pursued self-initiated research into areas of interest to him which went well beyond the required readings and assignments. He gets involved. Furthermore, he is one of the most articulate undergraduates I have known and has verbal skills which exceed those of most of our graduate students. His questions and answers are always germane to the discussion topic and his interest in learning has a way of exciting others around him in conversations. It is clear that other students use him as a standard to emulate. Similarly his more recent academic record is outstanding and demonstrates a high level of intellectual capabilities. As you know, during his first year and a half of college his grades were mediocre. This reflected more his lack of committment and uncertainty about his area of studies than his abilities. Since returning from his subsequent period of political and government activities, he has established his true goals of studying human behavior and pursuing a career in law. I know he is sincere and has no ambivalence in this pursuit and his grades since returning to college are further evidence of this dedication. Thus, there is no question about his ability to learn and achieve academically.

It should also be noted that he is not just an academic grind. While being successful in his courses he is actively involved in numerous outside projects. He has begun an exciting investigation of the dynamics of jury trial procedures for his honors thesis which promises to be a significant contribution to our understanding of this aspect of the judicial system. At the same time he is participating as a member of the Crisis Clinic staff which aids individuals in distress. Another of his activities is being one of the prime movers in a local pilot project to tap the strength of various presidential candidates among young voters. And, as if this were not enough, he is an integral member of a student-faculty curriculum committee which is currently assessing the department's undergraduate research program. His involvement here, as in the others listed, is well beyond mere presence at meetings. He, in large part, designed and carried out the entire assessment phase of this committee's investigation. Without a

doubt, one can have nothing but admiration for his energy and use of skills in all these extra activities. I am awed!

His personal characteristics are all of the highest standards. Ted is a mature, young man who is very responsible and emotionally stable (but not emotionally flat as many students appear—he does get excited or upset appropriately in various situations). He has an excellent sense of humor and in general is a great individual to know as a personal acquaintance. He seems to have many friends and from my knowledge, he can take charge of a project in an unassuming fashion as well as work smoothly under the direction of others. I am at a loss to delineate any real weaknesses he has. Only two points come to mind concerning possible drawbacks. One is his tendency, though infrequent, to be too serious about some matters which appear to me not to be that crucial. The second is that he is not pursuing a career in psychology as I believe he would become a great colleague.

In summary, this is an exceptional individual. He is bright, articulate and active to the extent that I would rate him in the top 1% of college seniors I have known. He has the capabilities, background and self-sustaining motivation to complete any law or doctorate degree program requirements with flying colors. I recommend most highly, without any reservations, that you accept him in your program.

A STATEMENT ON THE LAW SCHOOL ADMISSIONS TEST

Given the tremendous number of applications an admissions committee such as your own must review to select a relatively few entering students, I can understand the tendency to rely upon a universal measuring device such as the LSAT in screen-applicants. A committee member, faced with several dozen files to evaluate in a limited period of time, may feel that, realistically, the LSAT score provides the only means of managing the load expeditiously. Despite these considerations, however, I feel obliged to offer in my own behalf the request that my entire application file be given equal consideration, if at all possible.

I do not believe this is the time to be timid, and I shall not be. I have planned too long for a career in law to allow the fear vanity or a poor performance on the LSAT prevent me from making every effort to plead my case for admission to law school. Therefore, I will say to you now, with the greatest confidence, that the file you have before you is not just the file of a "qualified student", but the file of an individual who is obstinate enough to want to become a critical and tireless student and practitioner of the law, and qualified enough to succeed. My grades these past two years, my recommendations, and my personal statement speak of Ted Bundy the student, the worker, and researcher in pursuit of a legal education; the LSAT does not and cannot reveal this. I would like to take this opportunity to call attention to information pertinent to your evaluation of my qualifications for a program of legal studies:

- 1. A Legal Education: Interests and Goals.
- 2. Current Activities.
- 3. An Interruption in College Education.

1. A Legal Education: Interests and Goals

You begin with the relations between might and right, and this is the assuredly proper starting point for our inquiry. But, for the term "might", I would substitute a tougher and more telling word: "violence". In right and violence we have today an obvious antimony.

Sigmund Freud Why War?

To counsel a client; to arbitrate questions between individuals and institutions; to search for the facts; and ultimately, to provide for the orderly resolution of conflict and the avoidence of "violence"—these activities constitute the goals which have attracted me to a program of legal study. Encouraged, perhaps, by my behavioralist background, I see the legal profession engaged in a quest for order. This quest affects all peoples and all places as people forever maneuver and experiment to establish and to disestablish political communities and organizations. As new values and ways of behaving and relating to the environment and to other people replace old values and behavior, men must, if they are to persist as a community, write new laws more consistant with the new boundaries of common problems.

Following the theme of a quest for order, I shall examine several issues, toward the resolution of which I intend to make contributions both as a student and as a practitioner of the law.

Order and the Economy

Declining worker productivity and capital investment have produced an atmosphere of growing antagonism between labor and management. Strikes, injunctions and compulsory arbitration reflect what seem at times to be the irreconcilable interests of workers and owners. The call for legislation in the face of such disputes is likely to find greater acceptance among the Americam people and their representatives in government. The prospect of a trend toward greater legal constraints imposed on labor-management negotiations presents a challenge to me. I would like to participate in the shaping of new patterns of labor-management relations.

B. Order and the Environment

Perhaps the greatest potential for reversing environmental deterioration in the United States and bringing our population under control lies in the utilization of our legal system.

> Paul and Ann Ehrlich, Population, Resources, and Environment

Expand the nuisance doctrine? Permit class actions against pollutors? Permit the recovery of punitive damages? These and other questions concerning the maintenance of a healthy environment demand to be answered by our legal system to which is entrusted not only the protection of the individual but, also, the protection of American industry, the principle source of strength and livelihood for this country. By the same token, legal prohibitions on reproduction will certainly be interpreted by many as an intrusion upon the sovereigh rights of the individual. As an attorney, the provision and enforcement of legal antecendents to advanced environmental planning and population control in the 1970's and beyond would have a high priority for me.

Page 3 A Personal Statement C. Order, the Courthouse, and the Social Sciences No program of crime prevention will be effective without a massive overhaul of the lower courts. Report of the President's Committee on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice, 1968. Modern social science research on vital problems and living institutions will always be confronted with large practical difficulties.... It is important that the researcher into the problems of today be prudent, by being prepared to make some condessions to reality and some to ideal methodology. Harry Kalven and Hans Zeisel, The American Jury The list of suggested reforms of our legal system increases daily: add more judicial manpower and change the selection and the tenure of judges; provide more prosecutors, defense counsel, and probation officers; make jury venires more representative of the entire community by adding minority and young persons; modernize the physical facilities and the administration of the courts; create unified state court systems; improve the informational basis for pretrial screening and negotiated pleas. Numerous, indeed, are the recommendations. However, the wholesale institution of these and other proposals, some argue, would disrupt our judicial system to the degree of dysfunction. As a student in the social sciences I believe that the use of what Hans Zeisel calls "the tool chest of the social scientist" can reduce the resistance of those who rightly oppose changes in our system of justice. While recognizing the limitations mentioned by Kalven and Zeisel in the opening quotation, I will argue that the controlled experiment, in the hands of a sociologist or psychologist familiar with legal procedure, can provide a testing ground where old procedures are discarded or substantiated, and new ideas rejected or confirmed. Currently, I am conducting the first in a series of studies concerning jury trials. In an article on jury research in America (Law and Society Review, 1970, vol. 4, pp. 345-370) Howard Erlanger concludes

with the following questions: "What is the role of the jury in a system in which the overwhelming majority of criminal trials are dealt with by

negotiate pleas? Does a different type of case come to trial? Do outcomes differ?" Using computer coded data collected on 11,000 felony cases by the Washington State Criminal Justice Evaluation Project, I am writing programs designed to isolate what I hope to be tenative answers to these and other questions regarding the management of felony cases. I hope to have the opportunity to continue this research as a law student.

D. Summary

Locating the new boundaries of common problems and adapting the law to deal with them should prove to be an exciting, but difficult task. In the meantime, the legal profession must continue to serve the immediate needs of our citizens. I wish to perform this service.

2. Current Activities

Listed in this section are those curricular and extracurricular activities to which I presently devote the majority of my time.

A. Honors Research and Thesis

Under the supervision of a faculty member, I have initicated two studies investigating the nature of the jury trial. Using data collected by the Washington State Criminal Justice Evaluation Project, I am utilizing computor based analyses to examine the types of cases and defendants that come to a jury trial. In addition, I have designed an experimental study of minority persons as jurors on simulated juries were racial composition of the jury and the race of the defendant are manipulated.

B. Psychology Undergraduate Curriculum Committee

As one of the three student members on this faculty-student committee, I have begun an evaluation of the Department's independent undergraduate research program.

C. Seattle Crisis Clinic

I am a clinical assistant employed on a part-time basis to do counseling by phone with individuals whose difficulties range from suicide to birth control. The clinic's primary responsibility is to serve as a point of immediate access for persons in crisis who need to talk to someone. Page 5 A Personal Statement

D. Ballot Projection Research Team (BPRT)

BPRT is an infant organization, composed primarily of students in the behavioral sciences, which has become affiliated with a major political party in Washington State. I have been given the responsibility for planning the pilot BPRT research program; the goal of which is the assessment of the strength of several presidential contenders in a target population of 18-25 year olds living in the Puget Sound region who have not attended college.

3. An Interruption in College Education

I left the University of Washington in January, 1968, without a degree, and returned to that same school in June, 1970. Because I believe my activities during this two and one-half years absence may arouse in you more than casual interest, I shall attempt here to chronicle the events which immediately preceded and which occurred during this intervening period.

The purpose of my transfer to the University of Washington in 1968 was participation in the Chinese language program offered by the Far East Department. A year of intensive study was rewarded with an invitation to attend the Chinese Language Summer Institute conducted at Stanford in 1967. It was at Stanford that I began to question the total commitment to the study of Chinese that was increasingly being demanded of me. In short, what began as a desire to effect a rapprochment with the neople of Mainland China became subordinate to an increasing awareness of the need for the reconciliation of the American people with themselves. Three months after my return to the University of Washington it became evident that I would have to thoroughly re-align my own priorities before I could continue with my education.

April, 1968, to December, 1968 - Political campaigns were beginning to take form when I was appointed Seattle Chairman and Assistant State Chairman for New Majority for Rockefeller, a nationwide youth campaign organization created to support the Governor's presidential nomination bid. Rockefeller's defeat in Miami and my subsequent unemployment prompted an invitation to me to become the personal aid and driver for Arthur Fletcher (later to be appointed Assistant Undersecretary of Labor) during his unsuccessful campaign for Lieutenant Governor in Washington State.

January, 1969 to May, 1969 - Because of family ties in the Philadelphia area and my own interest in community development, I participated in a community survey and organization program for Philadelphia School Subdistrict #4. The public schools in this predominately black community were responding to the establishment of community control in several New York City schools.

September, 1969, to May, 1970 - I was given instruction in the art of process serving and court filing as an under-paid employee of an attorneys process service in Seattle.

Did these years spent outside the academic community have any lasting influence on my educational performance? Subjectively speaking, the answer is an unequivocal "yes". Let me, however, examine a more objective measure of this influence. Upon my departure from the University of Washington in 1968, my grade point average for the period from September, 1966, to January, 1968, was a 2.68. Since my return to Washington as a student in July of 1970, my GPA for the period between July, 1970, and December, 1971, is a 3.73. My GPA in Psychology is a 3.81.

My performance in this most recent phase of my educational career gives evidence, to the determination with which I have been pursuing my ultimate educational objective: admission to law school.

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


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

Instructions for Preparing Individual Profiles

On each pupil's report sheet record his raw scores and their percentile equivalents.

To construct a graphic profile:

- 1. With a pen or colored pencil make a small dash on each vertical line at the point which corresponds to the percentile for that test.
- 2. For each test draw a bar from the 50th percentile line to the small dash indicating the student's percentile rank. When many profiles are to be drawn a felt-nibbed fountain pen such as the Type B "Brite-Line Marker" made by Cushman and Denison, Carlstadt, New Jacobse "Magic Marker" made by Speedry Products, Richmond Hill 18, N. Y. is convenient for making a broad line with a single stroke.
 - 3. By using differently colored pencils or inks, the percentile profile based on different group norms can be plotted on the same chart. For example, one might wish to plot profiles of a twelfth-grade boy based on general norms for twelfth-grade boys and also on special norms of twelfth-grade boys in a college preparatory course. For further discussion of methods for plotting profiles, see Section 3 of the Differential Applitude Test Manual.

The group on which the percentiles are based should be indicated below the words "Norms used." This is extremely important if the charts are to be referred to at some later date.

If the *vertical* distance between the levels of any two scores is one inch (equal to ten points in the Standard Score column) or greater, it is probable that a real difference exists between the two abilities. Differences between one-half inch and one inch are doubtful, and should not be given serious consideration unless supported by other evidence. If the vertical distance between any two scores is less than half an inch, it is probable that no important difference exists between the two abilities. (See Section 3 of the *Manual*.)

I first met Ted after he had been selected to join my campaign staff in 1972. It was the consensus among those of us who directed the operation that Ted's performance was outstanding. Given a key role in the issues, research, and strategy section, he demonstrated an ability to define and organize his own projects, to effectively synthesize and clearly communicate factual information, and to tolerate uncertain and sometimes critical situations. In the end, it was probably his composure and discretion that allowed him to successfully carry out his assignments. These qualities made his contributions to strategy and policy dependable and productive.

If, however, you are concerned that a political campaign is not a measure of a prospective law student, then I am sure you will look, as I have, at Ted's other achievements and activities. Look at his academic record in his last two years of college; look at his impressive community involvements; and look at the several law-related positions he had held since graduation. I believe he is qualified to and intent upon pursuing a career in law.



The standard which has been established is based upon careful studies of the relationship of pre-law academic achievement and the admission test performance to law school achievement and upon the competition among applicants for the limited number of positions in the entering class. This selection of but a few of the many applicants seeking admission means that by necessity many otherwise qualified persons are denied admission, especially in light of the unusually high quality of admission candidates. The median of the class entering in 1971 was almost a 3.45 grade-point average with a 640 LSAT and that median is almost certainly bound to be higher for 1972. We recognize that strict adherence to high standards may result in some disappointments; however, experience has demonstrated that adherence to these standards contributes to the best interests of all concerned. cases applicants are able to improve their records and admission profiles by undertaking additional pre-legal course work and/or retaking the LSAT, if extenuating circumstances precluded a score indicative of one real abilities and the subsequent score reflects a significant improvement. 

Dear Members of the Admissions Committee:

This letter is to serve as my personal statement regarding my application as a first-year student to the University of Utah College of Law.

First, it is necessary that you understand why I was unable to attend in the Fall, 1973 after having been accepted to your College of Law. The decision was made with extreme reluctance and regret. Having been accepted as a first-year law student early in 1973 I was very excited and quickly returned my confirmation. Only the intervention of a very serious circumstance could have prevented my attendance.

Two weeks prior to the August 31st orientation session I was injured in an automobile accident. Still determined to attend Utah, I made every effort to accelerate my recovery both in and after leaving the hospital. The physical and financial complications persisted, finally forcing me to concede that I would not be in any condition to travel and study for several weeks after the beginning of Fall Semester, 1973. I notified Mrs. Karen Knudson of the situation.

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This interruption in my future plans was a great disappointment to me. However, six months of working and being active again has served to confirm my desire to study the law. The initial depression one experiences when important plans must be abandoned has been overcome. I am extremely eager to begin pursuing my long-held objective to study law. It is also still my intention to study the law at the University of Utah. The excellence of your program of legal studies, the beauty of the campus and the State in general, the natural vitality of the people of Utah still attracts me. Of substantial influence in my decision to come to Utah has been my fiance who was born and raised in Ogden and attended college in Logan. She would very much like to return to the area and resume working with her father who is a physician in Ogden. In short, I feel I am prepared to enter law school as if there had never been any interruption at all.



This law school, like most others, is faced with an unprecedented increase in the number of applicants seeking a legal education. Based on current applications and the patterns of prior years, we expect to receive more than 2,000 applications for admission to the class entering in the fall of 1973. At the same time, enrollment restrictions and resource capabilities require us to limit to approximately 150 the number of positions which we can make available to persons selected from this large group of applicants.
