Genetic test holds promise to solve crimes

Newsday

A single hair from a criminal suspect can be a vital clue in bringing a culprit to justice using a new procedure for genetic identification, scientists reported this week.

The technique is expected to advance criminal investigations because, for the first time, criminologists using a tiny bit of genetic material can copy it billions of times for analysis to help place a suspect at a crime scene, said researcher Russell Higuchi, who co-authored the work in Thursday's issue of the British journal *Nature*.

The research focuses on the genetic material, DNA, or deoxyribonucleic acid, which forms tiny thread-like structures called chromosomes in every cell of the body. DNA consists of sequences of chemicals. Some sequences form genes, which control the activities of a cell.

Like fingerprints, each person's genes occur in unique combinations shared by no one else, other than an identical twin. By studying the patterns created when a person's genes are cut up and spread out on an electrified gel surface, experts say scientists can readily distinguish one person's genes from another's.

The patterns created are so accurate that a person can be picked from among 800 suspects, Higuchi said in a telephone interview.

"People lose several hundred hairs a day" under normal circumstances and "hairs are one of the most frequently found forms of biological evidence found at crime scenes," said Higuchi, an associate scientist at the Cetus Corp., a biotechnology company near San Francisco.

Given the new technique, even a billionth of a gram of DNA is enough and can be copied for study, he said.

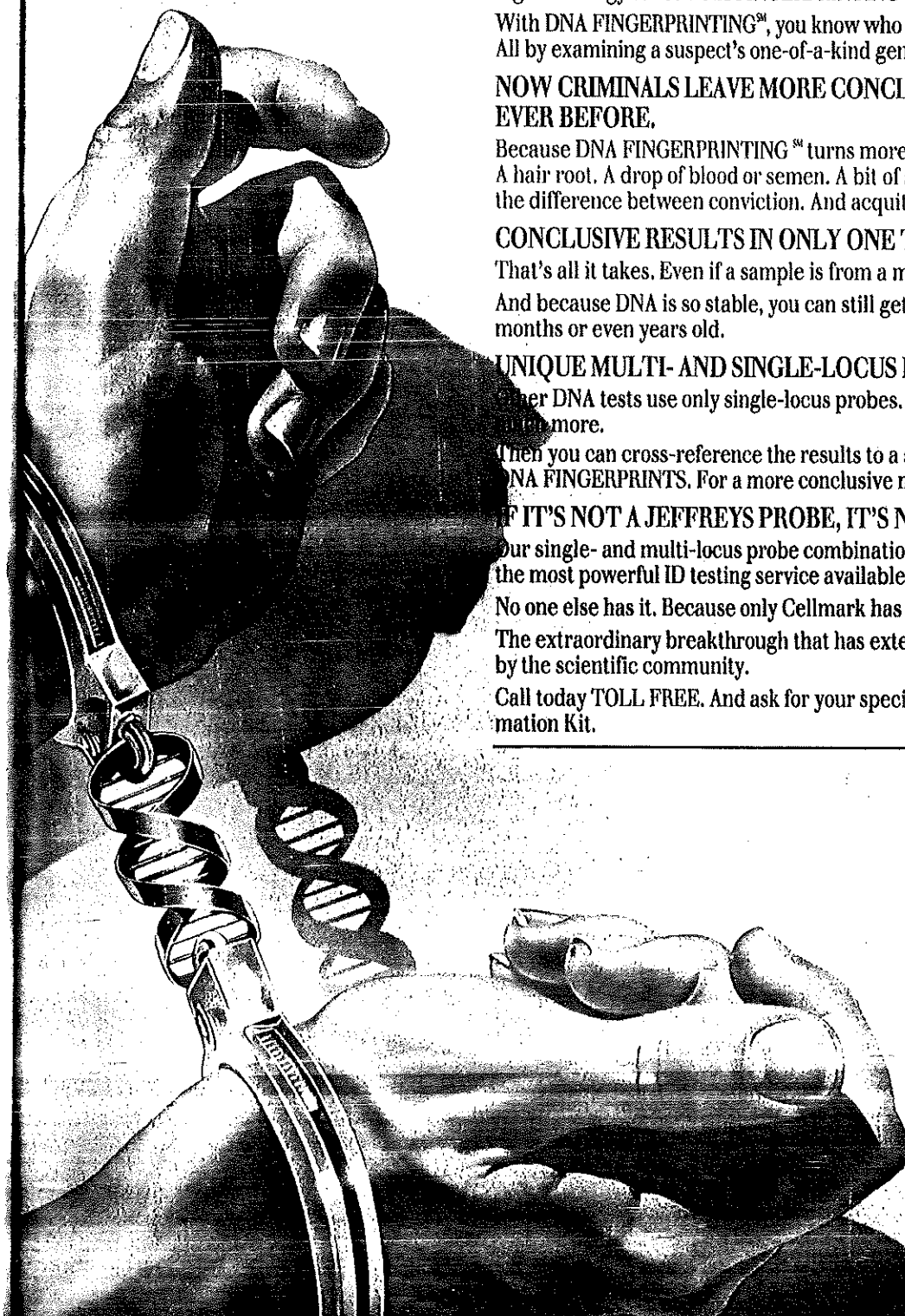

TO ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES

SECOND SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL NO. 5375 (DNA) WAS SIGNED INTO LAW BY GOVERNOR BOOTH GARDNER.

THE BILL REQUIRES THAT THE STATE PATROL, IN CONSULTATION WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON SCHOOL OF MEDICINE, DEVELOP A PLAN FOR AND ESTABLISH A DNA PROGRAM FOR THE STATE OF WASHINGTON.

THE WASHINGTON STATE PATROL IS REQUIRED TO SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 1, 1989, THAT WILL INCLUDE (1) A TIME LINE IMPLEMENTING EACH STAGE; (2) A LOCAL FINANCIAL PARTICIPATION ANALYSIS; (3) A SYSTEM ANALYSIS; (4) A FULL COST/PURCHASE ANALYSIS; (5) A VENDOR BID EVALUATION; AND (6) A SPACE LOCATION ANALYSIS THAT INCLUDES A SITE DETERMINATION.

IN ADDITION, AN OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE SHALL RECOMMEND TO THE LEGISLATURE BY NOVEMBER 1, 1989, SPECIFIC RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE COLLECTION, ANALYSIS, STORAGE, EXPUNGEMENT, AND USE OF DNA DATA. THESE RULES ARE TO BE DESIGNED TO PROTECT THE PRIVACY INTERESTS OF AFFECTED PARTIES. THIS COMMITTEE SHOULD BE APPOINTED IN THE VERY NEAR FUTURE.

AFTER JULY 1, 1990, EVERY INDIVIDUAL CONVICTED IN A SUPERIOR COURT OF A FELONY DEFINED AS A SEX OFFENSE UNDER RCW 9.94A.030(26)(A) OR A VIOLENT OFFENSE AS DEFINED IN RCW 9.94A.010(29) SHALL HAVE A BLOOD SAMPLE DRAWN FOR PURPOSES OF DNA ANALYSIS BEFORE RELEASE FROM OR TRANSFER TO A STATE CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION OR COUNTY JAIL OR DETENTION FACILITY. THESE BLOOD SAMPLES SHALL BE USED SOLELY FOR DNA PURPOSES.

DNA ANALYSIS SERVICES ARE TO BE PROVIDED TO LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES AFTER JULY 1, 1990.

THE DNA PROGRAM ESTABLISHED SHALL BE COMPATIBLE WITH THAT UTILIZED BY THE FBI.

THE BILL ALSO PROHIBITS LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT FROM ESTABLISHING OR OPERATING A DNA ANALYSIS SYSTEM PRIOR TO JULY 1, 1990, AND THEN IT MUST BE COMPATIBLE WITH THE STATE SYSTEM. THIS DOES NOT PROHIBIT THE USE OF DNA IN INDIVIDUAL CASES AS PRESENTLY DONE THROUGH THE USE OF A PRIVATE CONTRACTOR.

THREE COURT CASES USING DNA HAVE BEEN CONCLUDED TO DATE WITH A GUILTY FINDING. A FEW MORE CASES HAVE RESULTED IN A GUILTY PLEA.

FBI Announces New DNA Policy

The FBI Laboratory is now prepared to accept physical evidence for deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) testing.

Because the FBI Laboratory is presently the only police crime laboratory in the United States with this capability, a significant increase in case submissions is anticipated. In order for the Laboratory to be responsive to this increase, considering its limited resources, a selective case acceptance policy has been established to handle these requests effectively.

Policy for Submitting Evidence

In general, this policy states that the FBI Laboratory will accept evidence for DNA analysis from current, violent personal crimes where appropriate standards for comparison are available. Specifically, DNA analysis on State and local cases will be limited to homicide, sexual assault, and serious aggravated assault cases in which a suspect has been identified. In certain cases, evidence will be accepted by the FBI Laboratory for DNA analysis even though a suspect has not been identified. These exceptions include serial homicide/rape cases and sexual assaults on young children. A known blood sample from the victim and suspect is required for comparison purposes.

Requests for DNA Analysis

Requests for DNA analysis on previously adjudicated cases should not be submitted to the FBI Laboratory but should be referred by the investigating agency to one of the private DNA testing laboratories. Names and addresses of these laboratories can be provided upon request.

It is the policy of the FBI Laboratory that no examinations will be conducted on

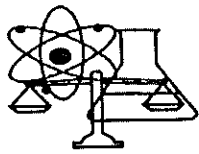
evidence which has been previously examined by another expert. However, the Laboratory will accept evidence samples for DNA analysis, even though another crime laboratory may have conducted traditional serological tests on the evidence items if that crime laboratory does not have the capability to perform the DNA tests and if the submitted samples are determined to be of a quality and condition conducive to DNA analysis. The local crime laboratory should contact the DNA Analysis Unit of the FBI Laboratory prior to submitting this type of evidence.

Law enforcement agencies requesting DNA analysis are encouraged to submit evidence to their local crime laboratory for traditional serological testing prior to submitting samples to the FBI Laboratory for DNA testing.

Packaging and Shipment of DNA Evidence

Body fluid-stained evidence, submitted to the FBI Laboratory for serological and/or DNA analysis, should be completely air dried before packaging and submitted promptly. Blood samples from the suspect and victim should be collected by medical personnel in two vacutainer tubes, one containing EDTA for DNA analysis and the other containing no preservative for serological analysis. These blood samples should be submitted to the Laboratory without delay. In the event there will be a delay in submission of the dried stain evidence to the Laboratory, it should be kept frozen. DNA Update

Forensic Scientist Don MacLaren, supervisor of the Biochemical Section in the Seattle laboratory, recently completed a three and one-half month visiting scientist program at the FBI Forensic Science Research Center. During his stay, MacLaren participated in the development and evaluation of two methods used in the DNA process. MacLaren worked under the direction of three PhD FBI researchers and had the opportunity of working with five other visiting scientists from the Maryland, Kentucky, Florida, Arizona, and South Carolina state laboratories. The visiting scientist program will eventually involve fifteen scientists during this development period.

MacLaren and Forensic Scientist Mike Nolan will be attending an intensive course on the application of DNA procedures sponsored by the FBI during the month of January. This training will initiate a program of procedure development, database development, users training and facility remodeling. If the resources are made available by the legislature, the program could be on-line as soon as January 1990.

The Crime Laboratory Division is presently in the process of obtaining a nuclear regulatory license and planning space revision in the Seattle laboratory.

FBI DNA Program On-Line

The FBI laboratory announced that their DNA program went on-line December 12, 1988. A telephone conversation with a member of the DNA unit revealed the following criteria will be used in accepting cases for DNA processing:

- The case involves a violent crime such as homicide or sexual assault.
- The subject (suspect) must be known.
- Blood samples from both the subject and the victim must be available.
- The case must have occurred on or after December 1, 1988.
- The case must be examined by a local/state crime laboratory and deemed appropriate for DNA processing.

The criteria are scheduled to be published in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin and the Crime Lab Digest.

SUBJECT: Second monthly meeting of Washington Crime Laboratory Regional Coordinating Committee

The meeting began with Capt Paul Schultz commenting on the Crime Laboratory budget. Funding has apparently been granted for the DNA program which is expected to start about July 1, 1990. Initially there will be a large back log to start with, due to the requirement to catalog all the violent offenders and sex offenders getting out of prison as well as those still in. To start with only the Seattle Crime Laboratory will have the capability. Hopefully this will expand to give the Spokane Laboratory the capability also. WSP had several projects to be accomplished as to the time frame, local agency financial participation, system analysis, full cost, vendors bids, space, and locations. The important thing here for us is the - LOCAL AGENCY FINANCIAL PARTICIPATION. They mentioned the various agencies around the country that had used LIFE CODES, INC., and the expense that they had incurred. Although the prices we may pay would not be as much as those agencies dealing with LIFE CODES, INC. previously, no one has any idea what they might be. It looks like we will have to pay for the service if we want to use it.


A new PHYSICAL EVIDENCE HANDBOOK is being printed and will soon be distributed to every police officer in the state at no cost to local agency. It might be considered for adding to our SOP. It consists of aprox 30 pages.

The Tacoma lab has received their new Scanning Electron Microscope. They are still waiting for a computer and xray unit that goes with it. When set up and with properly trained personnel they will have many new capabilities. One of the best for us will be the elimination of the Atomic Analysis Kits we use for gunshot residue. This will use a new method where by you will use a little sticky disk on the suspect hands which will pickup gunshot residue particles. It is supposed to be much easier and more reliable than our old method

I saw Jean Johnston, at the Crime Lab. She says she wants to work part time because of her little children, but the administration wants it to be a full time position only, which resulted in her submitting a resignation. Its too bad, she had been with the lab along time.

Another problem that is anticipated in conjunction with the DNA implementation is freezer space. Our freezer space is very limited right now, and will greatly increase in the future. It has been determined that liquid blood will have a limited life even though it has been refrigerated, and only the frozen samples will endure for any time.

GOVERNOR GARDNER HAS APPOINTED THE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE. THE COMMITTEE WILL CONDUCT ITS FIRST MEETING ON AUGUST 10, 1989, AT THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE TRAINING CENTER IN BURIEH. THE COMMITTEE WILL RECOMMEND TO THE LEGISLATURE SPECIFIC RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE COLLECTION, ANALYSIS, STORAGE, EXPUNGEMENT, AND USE OF THE DNA DATABASE.

UNTIL THE CRIME LAB DIVISION GOES ON LINE JULY 1, 1990, BLOOD EVIDENCE CAN BE SENT TO THE FBI FOR DNA ANALYSIS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ANNOUNCED POLICY PUBLISHED IN THE MARCH 1989 ISSUE OF THE FBI LAW ENFORCEMENT BULLETIN:

IN GENERAL, THIS POLICY STATES THAT THE FBI LABORATORY WILL ACCEPT EVIDENCE FOR DNA ANALYSIS FROM CURRENT, VIOLENT PERSONAL CRIMES WHERE APPROPRIATE STANDARDS FOR COMPARISON ARE AVAILABLE. SPECIFICALLY, DNA ANALYSIS ON STATE AND LOCAL CASES WILL BE LIMITED TO HOMICIDE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, AND SERIOUS AGGRAVATED ASSAULT CASES IN WHICH A SUSPECT HAS BEEN IDENTIFIED. IN CERTAIN CASES, EVIDENCE WILL BE ACCEPTED BY THE FBI LABORATORY FOR DNA ANALYSIS EVEN THOUGH A SUSPECT

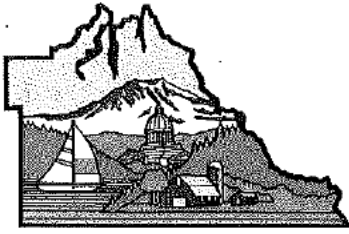

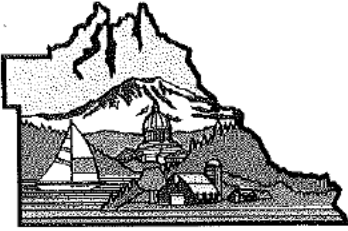

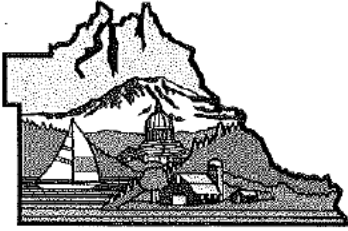
