Former PFC Cosden Jr. told this reporter he participated in a major operation -- Operation Hastings -- a two and a half week battle in which members of the Red Chinese Army were killed.

His company, "Lima", captured "truck loads" of Russian and Chinese weapons, after that fight, Mr. Cosden Jr. said.

As the interview by this newspaper progressed, Mr. Cosden Jr. told of 18 Marines being able to walk after Operations Hastings -- 18 from his

company of 132 men and officers.

Thirty-two to 34 Lima Company Marines were hospitalized, the rest were killed, he said.

In talking about home as it relates to a fighting man on the war front, Mr. Cosden Jr. said:

"Reality is in front of you. "The only thing on your mind is the moment you are leaving Vietnam. You try not to think about the people at home.

"You question if the people at home know 'what I am doing here' . . . you wonder if they appreciate it. . .

"First you get there and you feel lost and forelorn. . . you walk around in a daze. . .

"A couple of boys in the company once got a letter from home. . . they ran out in front of machine guns. . .

"Several times I read newspapers, but not letters.

"You want to hear from home as if you were talking to them. . . as if you were in no danger at all. . .

"If the letters ask how you feel, you have to answer that question to yourself," and that a man in war does not want to do, Mr. Cosden Jr. said.

## VIETNAM

PFC Cosden Jr., while in Vietnam, was of the opinion that the United States should not have been in Vietnam "in the first place," he said. "But now we shouldn't pull out."

"I would go back to keep us from pulling out.

"I hate the place. . . too many of our buddies died there. . ."

PFC Cosden Jr. was a Marine company demolition expert, a machine gunner and a team leader.

He was a member of the Third Battalion, Fourth Marines, Lima Company.

He is the holder of two Purple Hearts; the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry from the South Vietnam government, for outstanding heroism in line of duty against the North Vietnamese during Operations Hastings; a Navy commendation; a Presidential unit citation; the Vietnamese Service Ribbon; and he was nominated for the Bronze Star for action against the enemy, he told his reporter.

He received a medical discharge from the Corps.

Speaking about the action which won him the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, the ex-high school football player and Marine said:

"The Vietnam war is strictly a guerrilla warfare. . .

"They opened up from a gully on us. . . my ammo carrier and myself ran to a fence. . .

"I ran up to the gully firing. . . burn't the barrel up. . . our lieutenant was hit. . ."

After the firing ended 26 enemy dead were found.

"Sometimes," Marine PFC Cosden Jr. said, "I wake up in cold sweat. . . it's something you have to live with yourself."

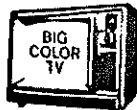

## State To Seek Indictment Vs. Earl Cosden, Jr.

The State of Maryland plans to seek a grand jury murder indictment against William Earl Cosden Jr., a Marine veteran of the Vietnam war. The accused, according to police authorities and court records, is presently at the Clifton T. Perkins Hospital for examination by the Department of Mental Hygiene of the State of Maryland. According to court records, the Department of Mental Hygiene has been directed to inquire into "the question as to whether the said William E. Cosden Jr. lacks such mental capacity as to enable him to properly conduct his defense, or advising as to the conduct of his defense and to determine

his mental condition as of April 16, 1967, when the alleged crime was committed. . . . Former Marine Pfc. Cosden Jr. has been charged by the St. Mary's County Sheriff's Department with the murder of Helen Patricia Pilkerton, 21, of Lexington Park. Joseph D. Weiner, state's attorney for St. Mary's County, told The Enterprise Tuesday he plans to seek an indictment against Mr. Cosden Jr. According to State's Attorney Weiner, the dead woman's body was found Sunday, April 16, face down in a stream "back of Great Mills" by two young girls. The dead woman was last

seen alive by friends in the area of the 'Tall Timbers' Tavern, about 12:30 or 1 a.m. April 16, Mr. Weiner said. Mr. Weiner said a cue stick has been found and it is believed to be the "murder weapon". He said that at the scene where the dead woman was found, blood was spilled on the side of the bridge rail and on the ground. Several stab wounds were inflicted on the deceased, Mr. Weiner said. As of Wednesday morning, according to the Sheriff's Department and the State's Attorney Office, no official cause of death had been reported.

## Grand Jury Returns Two Murder

Grand Jury murder indictments have been returned against St. Mary's County men -- William Earl Cosden Jr., of Dover Estates, Valley Lee, and Joseph Franklin Hebb, of Old Road.

Indictments have also been returned in the case of a Navy seaman who was shot and killed here in the County May 31 and in the case of a State Police Trooper who was injured May 20 while attempting to question a man on an alleged speeding violation.

Cosden, a 20-year-old Marine Corps Veteran, was indicted for "feloniously, willfully and deliberately" murdering Helen Patricia Pilkerton, 21, on April 16, 1967.

According to the Sheriff's Department, she was beaten to death with a stick. Her body was found by two teenage girls in a team by the Flat Iron Road in the Great Mills area.

The dead woman was identified by the Sheriff's Department as a resident of Lexington Park and an employee of the A & E Hotel in Lexington Park.

### HEBB INDICTED

Hebb, 60, was indicted for "feloniously, willfully and deliberately" murdering John Willmer Thomas on July 16, 1967.

The dead man was shot and killed by a .12 gauge shotgun at the Hebb residence, the Sheriff's Department reported.

Circuit Court Judge Philip H. Dorsey Jr. Monday morning arraigned Cosden on the murder indictment and scheduled the Cosden trial for Aug. 30.

Attorney Walter B. Dorsey entered a plea of innocent for Cosden.

The Hebb arraignment was postponed Monday because Hebb was confined to the Clifton T. Perkins State Hospital for mental examination.

### OTHER INDICTMENTS

In the case of the seaman who was killed here May 31: David L. Swinson, a petty officer third class at Patuxent River Air Station, was indicted with killing Charles a seaman at NAS.

Blakey, 22, was shot and killed on State Road five and a half miles south of the Naval Station here to the Sheriff's Department.

POC Swinson, 24, was also indicted on three counts of intent to injure and two counts of carrying a weapon with intent to injure.

One of the charges of carrying a weapon open to injure concern persons whose names are "un Grand Jury said.

## Case Heard Last Week

## Verdict Pending In Murder Trial

Two judges this week were still deliberating over the fate of William Earl Cosden Jr., a 20-year-old Marine Corps veteran tried last week in the St. Mary's County Circuit Court for murder.

No verdict has been handed down yet in the case.

Cosden, a resident of Andover Estates, Valley Lee, was indicted by a County Grand Jury last month for "feloniously, willfully and deliberately" murdering Helen Patricia Pilkerton, 21, on April 16, 1967. Cosden's attorney, Walter B. Dorsey, entered an innocent plea for Cosden at his arraignment last month.

According to the Sheriff's Department, the Pilkerton woman was beaten to death with a stick. Her body was found by two teenage girls in a stream by the Flat Iron Road in the Great Mills area.

The dead woman, a resident of Lexington Park, was identi-

fied by the Sheriff's Department as an employee of the A & E Motel in Lexington Park.

## TRIAL

Cosden's trial Aug. 30 and 31 was heard by Judge J. Dudley Diggs, chief judge of the Seventh Judicial Circuit of Maryland, and Judge Perry G. Bowen, of Prince Frederick, Calvert County.

During the trial, the court was informed that Cosden is an ex-Marine who served in combat in Vietnam and was wounded in action against the enemy.

Cosden's attorney, Dorsey, told the court that Cosden spent five months in Vietnam during 1966, with more than four months on the line.

According to Attorney Dorsey, his client was a machine gunner and a demolition expert. Cosden participated in war patrols and he participated in operation Hastings, a major Marine Corps engagement

against the Viet Cong last year, the court was told.

Attorney Dorsey, in his presentation of Cosden's service record to the court, said that operation Hastings resulted in heavy casualties to the Marines.

Cosden, the court was told, was hospitalized three times when he was in the Marine Corps -- two times for war wounds suffered in 1966 and one time for combat fatigue and heat stroke.

The defense attorney told the judges that Cosden had been placed in combat one week after his arrival in Vietnam.

Further informing the court on Cosden's Marine service record, Attorney Dorsey said that a Marine doctor once described Cosden as "dangerous to himself and to others."

Dorsey also told the court that according to Cosden's service record, "Cosden had an uncontrollable urge to kill other Marines."

The Cosden Marine Corps record also showed that Cosden suffered incoherent hallucinations, depression and recurrent nightmares, Dorsey told the court.

Cosden had to be forcibly restrained from entering a burning aircraft during a battle, Attorney Dorsey told the judges. Testimony in court showed Cosden received a general discharge.

## EXAMINATION

In testimony presented to Judges Diggs and Bowen, it was noted that Cosden was examined at the Perkins State Hospital as to his mental condition.

According to two psychiatrists, Cosden was suffering from an anxiety reaction resulting from neurosis.

The psychiatrists told the court that Cosden had a personality disorder and lacked substantial capacity to realize his conduct or conform to re-

quirements of the law.

But, the court also received testimony that Cosden's mental condition was not severe enough to impair his capacity to appreciate the requirements of the law.

## TELLS FATHER

Other testimony presented in court showed that Cosden told his father on the morning of April 16 about events surrounding the Pilkerton death.

According to court testimony, the Pilkerton woman and Cosden were in a Tall Timbers establishment on the night of April 15, at the same time, and that she left with someone else but they met again later that night because her driver could not take her home.

Further court testimony told of Cosden not remembering what happened the night of April 15 or early morning of April 16, but that he saw the dead woman's body on the ground.

Attorney Dorsey asked the judges to consider his client's mental condition, before giving a verdict in the case.

State's Attorney Joseph D. Weiner asked for a guilty verdict.

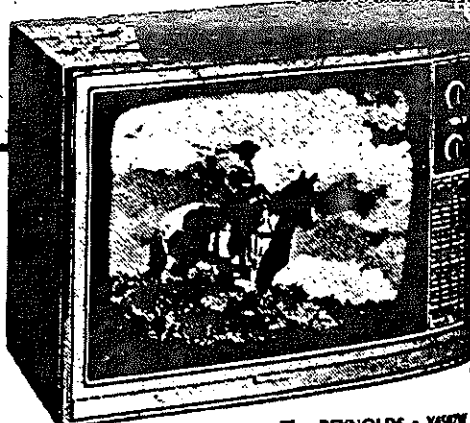

## Court Says Cosden Is 'Insane'

William Earl Cosden Jr., a 20-year-old Marine Corps veteran, was sentenced to the Clifford T. Perkins Hospital on an "insane" verdict Tuesday in the County Circuit Court.

Cosden, a Valley Lee resident, was indicted by the County Grand Jury in August of this year for "feloniously, willfully and deliberately" murdering Helen Patricia Pilkerton, 21, on April 16, 1967.

Circuit Court Judges Perry Bowen and J. Dudley Diggs this week termed Cosden insane at the time of the crime and insane now.

Under the court ruling, Cosden is to stay in the State mental hospital until "he no longer constitutes a danger to others or himself under the dictates of the law."

Two court appointed psychiatrists told the Circuit Court that Cosden "lacks the substantial capacity to appreciate the consequences of the crime." Testifying to the court were Dr. Jonas R. Rappaport and Dr. James E. Smith II. Dr. Rappaport is the chief medical officer for Baltimore City.

Judge Diggs said: "The facts substantiated by the State prove that the defendant (Cosden) is guilty but not responsible for his actions because of mental illness."

According to the Sheriff's Department, Helen Pilkerton was beaten to death with a stick. Her body was found by two teenage girls in a stream by the Flat Iron Road in the Great Mills area.

The dead woman was identified by the Sheriff's Office as a resident of Lexington Park and an employee of the A & E Motel in Lexington Park.

by a hit-and-run driver on South 249 at Callaway. The 33-year-old man was a pedestrian on the highway at the time of the accident, the State Police reported.

In this week's fatal traffic accident, Marvin A. Greenwell, 43, of Route Two, Hollywood, was killed in a two-car head on collision on Route 235 Oct. 16 two miles north of Route 245.

Greenwell was identified by State Police as the driver of one of the cars. He died of a crushed chest and multiple lacerations of the head, it was reported.

Donald L. Matthaix, 38, of Alexandria, Va., identified as the driver of the other vehicle in the Greenwell fatal, was charged by State Police with manslaughter, reckless driving, failure to keep right of the center line and driving while under the influence of alcohol.

Three persons were injured in the Greenwell fatal.

They were his wife, Mrs. Dana Greenwell, 48; Matthaix; and Roland C. Sandretzky, 33, of Alexandria, Va.

Matthaix and Sandretzky were taken to St. Mary's Hospital and Mrs. Greenwell was taken to the Bethesda Naval Hospital.

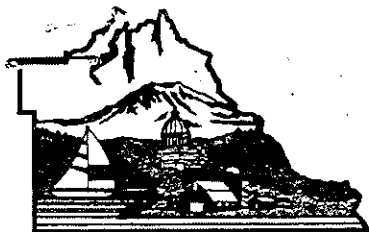

Geiger Pre-Release last week received a McNeil Island Inmate you need to know about and we hope to hear from you if he re-offends.

He committed an assault-rape in 1975 in Thurston County that still has our attention.

Cosden worked for a family-owned, large truck stop and followed an attractive young woman to a point where she was forced over to the side. He hit her about the head with a rubber mallet and made some comment similar to his surprise that here he, "was doing the same thing as Ted". At that time frame, the "Ted" (Ted Bundy murders) were quite well known. His victim survived to testify and his sentence was a maximum of 48 years.

But, there is more. Earlier in Maryland, he stabbed a young woman (possibly a girlfriend) to death with a broken pool cue and was sent quite briefly to a mental institution. His father, now deceased, was successful in gaining the man's release to Olympia. A chain of fires were set/or/involved with Cosden, Jr. that seemed to coincide with some tension involving him. They were;

- 1) a "stolen" and torched truck of his on 8/10/73,
- 2) another truck of his on 11/26/73, following a witness seeing blood in his truck bed and was inconsistent in story,
- 3) a house fire at his home on 4/15/74,
- 4) a truck-wash fire at his work 7/15/75,
- 5) and a pole shed-dwelling fire of his neighbor he didn't care for on 10/26/75.

We have two (2) unsolved runaway hitchhiker girl murders, i.e.,

- 1) a likely Memorial Day 1974 case of 101C [REDACTED] found a few miles east of Cosden's work at Millersylvania State Park, likely stabbed in the upper body area, and
- 2) a likely 11/25-26/73 case of 101C [REDACTED] who was found west of Cosden's work at Capitol Forest, likely attacked with a knife to the neck area. Her jeans were cut on the back and peeled over the buttocks and she had previously been tied with rope.


Mr. Cosden remains a very possible suspect in the 1973 homicide and we are anxiously awaiting the soon-to-be-possible state testing of DNA for hair. At this juncture, we do not know the comparability of hair evidence. We do know the evidence is not unlike that of Cosden. While in prison, he worked with weights and is unusually strong.

It might be fair to say we are aware of several different subjects of interest reference the 1974 homicide.


As Bill Cosden seems to be in your area, the greater risk seems to be to your community. However, his mother, brother and ex-wife still reside near Olympia, as is the family business. Thus, we are concerned he will return to work or visit when full DOC release occurs.

Please keep him in mind and us as well, should we be of any assistance or if we need to know any facts.

Under Sheriff made known to this officer, that CORDEN is convicted murderer, incarcerated for being mentally insane.




