(believed to be the Burns Bros. truck stop), & as far north as Federal Way to sell stolen goods, i.e. 343rd & I-5, King Co. Thus, he was mobile, had money, & was prepetory.
- ③ His brother knew the defendant carried "surgical blades" in his wallet. (Believed to be razor blades), unknown purpose.
- ④ Ex-wife Rita Luce advised she bumped into the contractor who worked on their house long ago. David Burkley, of Blue Star Construction, then #352-3852, commented: "did he burn anything else up?" She also asked her parents if they anonymously tipped us about Bill years ago. They did not.

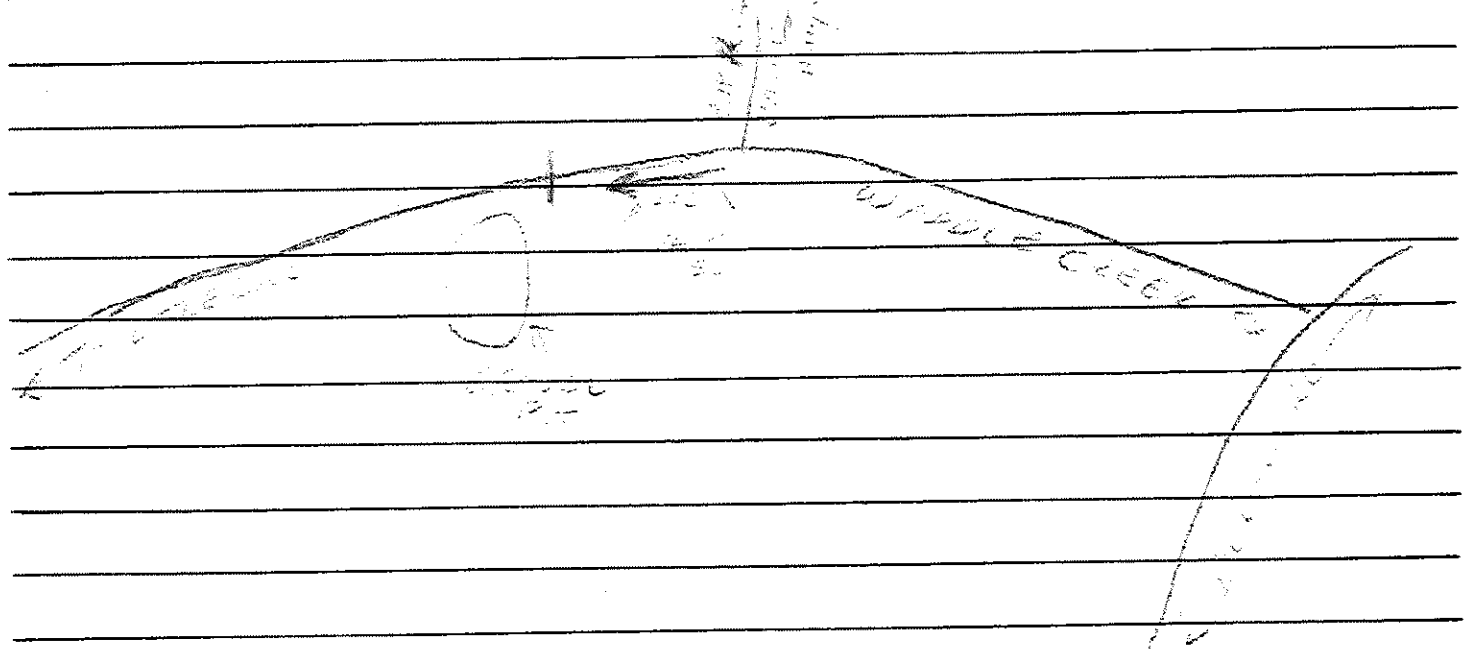

On 11 December 1973, contact was made with Detective J. E. Cook and Detective George Guthill at Seattle P.D. and was sent to Juvenile to contact Detective Van Allman. Received information and reports from Juvenile, including names of friends. Went to County Health Department and contacted Dr. Prince, who identified the dental chart as one belonging to **101C** with one exception, the number two molar had a pin that was not indicated on our chart. Dr. Prince stated that if the pin was there, he could state positively that the victim was Miss **101C**. Returned to Detective Cook's office.

In company with Detective Cook, went to 750 N. 91st Street and contacted **101B** age 14, and **101B**. Conversation with these girls revealed they had been with **101C** when she was picked up at 91st and Aurora on 11-25-73 at 1330 hours and headed South. Both girls gave different descriptions of the vehicle, see statements. When talking to **101B** it was discovered that the clothing and earrings **101C** was wearing belonged to **101B** she described the blouse, trousers and earrings in absolute detail. Statements were taken at 1350.

At 1700 hours, contact was made with **101B** **101C** boyfriend, and two other boys at **101B** who knew **101C** **101B** stated he had been going with **101C** for several months and had decided to break off because he did not want to be tied down. He stated that he had seen **101C** **101B** and **101B** at approximately noon on November 25th 1973 and had refused to talk to **101C**. He has not talked to or seen

101C since. His friends, **101B** and **101B** were also talked to, but could add nothing to the incident.

On 12-12-73, contact was made with Mr. and Mrs. Devine and **101B** **101B** sister and parents of victim. Permission was given to go through victim's personal effects. Sheriff Redmond and myself searched the room and with Mrs. Devine's permission, took diary, photo album, undeveloped film and numerous letters to be screened for clues. Appointments were made to interview **101B** at a later time.

At 1400 hours, contact was made with Will Rohrich at Chevrolane Motors at 91st and Aurora. He stated that on the date of 11-23-73, he had observed **101C** and her girl friends walk down 91st. **101C** hitched a ride while the other girls went across the street. A truck described as an old beat up green Dodge driven by a long haired bearded man picked **101C** up and departed South on Aurora. He could not give a better description of the truck. A statement was taken on tape from Mr. Rohrich.

At 1710 hours, went to **101B** residence at **101B** and contacted **101B** age 16. Subject stated he knew **101C** but did not associate with her. He stated he last saw her on 11-23-73 and gave her a ride to the 6400 block on Aurora. He stated she hung around with the wrong crowd and he was not surprised that she had got into trouble as she always hitchhiked. Detective Nelson will report further on this lead.

On 12-13-73, contact was made with Mrs. Verna Smith at 6411 Linden, reference **101B**. She stated she had not seen **101B** for several weeks, but would call as soon as she saw him. Went to Wallingford Precinct #2, contacted Capt. More and attempted to gain information in logs for

11-25-73. Nothing useful was determined. At 1445 hours, received information via Mrs. Smith that Mergen was home. Subject came to this location at 1509 and gave statement. Nothing valuable was gained to disclose assailant in this case.

On 12-14-73, was contacted by Sgt. Schenke of Bellingham P.D. A strange circumstance had occurred on evening of 12-13-73. An individual, described as Hippie type, 6', 20-21 years, 200 lbs, long brown hair and beard, dressed in faded jeans, old black coat, heavy boots or unpolished shoes and carrying a black purse, made and received a call from a restaurant just off I-5. While in restaurant, subject took large black handled knife from purse and cut outliten from P.I. on **101C** murder. Left the item on counter when he left. Subject believed to have called a female on Sunset Drive and mentioned he would be at Canadian border in early a.m., 12-14-73. Sgt. On 2 January 2, 1973, contacted Dr. Don MacLaven, Seattle Police Lab. reference results of examination of evidence on the 101C case. He advised that so far, he had only examined the vaginal swabs which were positive indicating presence of acid phosphatase.

Detectives Cuthill and Cook were then contacted. They had just brought in 101B for a polygraph examination. She was tested by Norman Matzke, Seattle Police Department. Results of the examination indicated she was truthful and last saw 101C on November 25, 1973, as she had previously stated. Tests indicated she had no knowledge of what happened to 101C or who may be involved.

During the evening January 2, 1973, 101B and Ray Vine were interviewed. Ray and 101B both stated they were sure they had seen 101C after November 25, 1973 at 101B residence. They stated they believed the date was November 29th. They determined the date to be the 29th because they had moved a refrigerator on that date. At about 1730 - 1800 hours. They said they stopped at 101B and went in. 101B was home and two girls were there, 101B and another they thought may have been 101B went into the bedroom with 101B. When 101B came out, the two girls left stating they had to get home for supper. A couple minutes later, 101C entered the front door. They said they don't know how 101B could have missed seeing her. 101C was there a few minutes then said she had to make a phone call. He walked down to use the phone at the service station on Aurora Avenue. She returned about 5-10 minutes later and had a worried look.

They both left, went home and ate, then loaded a small bar type refrigerator in their car. They returned to **101B** and entered the house. **101B** let them and appeared anxious to leave. They did not see **101C** at this time.

On January 3, 1973, arrangements were made to test **101B** on the Polygraph. Permission was obtained from her mother. Test results indicated that **101B** was truthful in her answers to the police, that she last saw **101C** on November 25, 1973 and had no knowledge of what happened to her or who caused her death. She was not at **101B** house on November 29th, but had been to his house on November 30. She had gotten permission on November 30 to stay all night with **101B** but **101B** mother wouldn't let her, so she went to **101B**. She said she went in and went to bed, that no one was home. **101B** showed up in the early morning hours. She stated that on November 25 and the night of the Ingram game that she and a **101B** went to **101B** and then left for the game. They left and caught a bus at Aurora by the gas station. She said this was the last time she was at **101B** until November 30.

Mr. Mergen, father of **101B** was contacted and gave permission for **101B** to take a Polygraph examination on 1-7-73 at Seattle Police Department. He also gave permission for us to search **101B** house. A close inspection of the house revealed it to be in a very dirty, unkept condition. No painting or cleaning had been performed in the house in recent months. No evidence was discovered in the house which was connected with the **101C** case.

THUR. November 29, 1973, worked. 101B went with him. Worked in Everett, Lynnwood and Seattle. They stoped at 101B about 1730-1800 hours. 101B and another girl was there. 101B and 101B went into the bedroom or were in the bedroom. The other girl kept asking them to go get 101B that they had to get home for dinner. After she came out of bedroom, the two girls left. Five to ten minutes later, 101C entered through the front door. After a few minutes she left saying she had to walk down to the gas station to use the telephone. She returned in about 5 - 10 minutes. She had a worried expression on her face. Ray and 101B then left, went home and picked up a small refrigerator and also ate while there. They then returned to 101B and entered the house and was met by 101B who was anxious to leave. 

At approximately 1200 hours, December 6, 1973, I was notified that a white female body had been discovered in the area of Camp Margret McKenney State Park, located on the Waddel Creek Road.

At 1215 hours, I was requested to go to the scene. I arrived on the scene at 1235 hours.

On arrival, I was requested by Chief Criminal Deputy, Dwight Garon, to immediately proceed with backup photography. (See photo logs) After photography work was complete, I assisted in the search of the immediate area. I located several pieces of broken glass, which I took into evidence, this broken glass was strewn over a small area in an area adjacent to where the body was located. I departed the scene at 1410 hours.

I then proceeded to the autopsy room at St. Peter Hospital. In the presence of Tag Frazier, Deputy Coroner and Coroner Hollis Fultz, photographs were taken of the body. (See photo log.)

I was present while Dr. Bigelow, a local dentist, prepared a dental chart of the victim, which I then took into evidence at 1535 hours. I then returned to the Department and began to call all local dentists. I advised them that copies of the dental chart were being sent to their office in an attempt to identify the victim. All local dentists were again contacted on the morning of December 7, to verify that they had received a copy of the dental chart. Copies of this chart were sent to the cities of Yelm, Tenino, to the Sheriff's Departments of Lewis, Grays Harbor, Mason, Pierce and King Counties. The military authorities

at Ft. Lewis and McChord Air Force Base, Seattle and Tacoma Police Departments were also sent copies of the Dental Chart.

During the afternoon of December 7, 1973, I was present during the body examination of the victim, conducted at St. Peters Hospital by the pathologist. At 1704 hours, I departed the hospital with Captain Bade and went to assist Detective Curtis in the Littlerock area.

At approximately 2000 hours, I accompanied Captain Bade to the Rochester area to check on a juvenile girl at the Tharp residence which is located at 178th Ave. SW. This girl had been reported to the Department as closely matching the description of the victim. The juvenile in question, however, was home and safe.

At 11:30 hours, December 11, 1973, I interviewed a Mrs. Eva Jean Rohr, age 45, P.O. Box 397, Tenino, residence telephone, 264-2809, business 264-2960. Interview was conducted at the Log Tavern where she is a bartender. Mrs. Rohr advised that she had observed a girl matching the description on November 26, 1973 or on November 30, 1973 at the Bank of Olympia, Tenino Branch. This lead was checked with the bank and the girl that Mrs. Rohr had observed was not believed to have been the victim. (See officer's supplemental report)

At 1245 hours, December 11, 1973, I interviewed a Mr. William E. Lawrence, age 18, 905 Spring Lane, Centralia, 736-7593, business phone 273-5578, interview was conducted at the Washington Weyerhaeuser Nursery located at Rt. 8, Box 434, Olympia. Mr. Lawrence advised that on December 2, 1973, that he and his girlfriend were at the Camp Margret McKenney Park between the hours of 11:45 to 17:30 hours. He advised that he had observed one vehicle with two individuals in it who had been trail riding. (See officer's supplemental report for details)

During the afternoon hours, December 11, 1973, I was transferred to the Seattle area with the investigation team.

At 1215 hours, December 12, 1973, I received from the victim's mother, Mrs. Devine, a copy of the victim's birth certificate, one letter box containing miscellaneous letters and papers, one leather purse with contents, one jewelry box with miscellaneous items of jewelry, one metal box containing miscellaneous papers and a diary, two photo albums, and miscellaneous school papers.

At 1450 hours, December 12, 1973, I interviewed the victim's sister,

At 1700 hours, December 12, 1973, I interviewed a Miss **101B** by telephone. This interview was in reference to several obscene telephone calls that she had been receiving. (See officer's supplemental report for further details)

At 1745 hours on December 12, 1973, I interviewed a Miss **101B** **101B** by telephone, reference obscene telephone calls which she had been receiving. (See officer's supplemental report for further details)

On December 13, 1973, at 0930 hours, I interviewed a Miss Maude W. Bakken, 747 North 135th Ave., this interview was in reference to her having seen victim. The interview determined that victim had been seen on November 20, 1973, prior to the time which she disappeared. (See officer's supplemental report for further details.) At 1500 hours, December 13, 1973, I interviewed a Mrs. Francis M. Berry, age 35, 12520 East Marginal Way, So., Seattle, Telephone 242-0756. Interview was in reference to her having observed victim on Old Highway 99, one block north of entrance to Sea-Tac Airport. (See officer's supplemental report for further details.)

At 1845 hours, December 13, 1973, I received from Dr. William Bigelow seven extracted teeth, one set of dental casts, upper and lower, and one card containing seven X-rays. These items were taken into evidence at 1845 hours.

At 0815 hours, December 14, 1973, evidence taken from Mrs. Devine which was property of the victim, 101C was turned into the evidence officer, Sergeant H. V. Baesen.

At 0930 hours, December 14, 1973, I met with Dr. Stanford D. Prince in Seattle and showed him the X-rays, the dental casts and teeth which had been extracted from the victim. Dr. Prince then examined these items with the dental record which he had of 101C

At this time he stated that he could make a positive identification of the victim. Dr. Prince then prepared a certificate stating that he had made positive identification. A copy of this letter, the chart containing old X-rays and a dental record of 101C was then given to me. These were taken into evidence at 1000 hours.

At 1130 hours, December 14, 1973, I talked with the pathologist who had conducted the autopsy on 101C. He advised me that his report had been mailed to the Thurston County Coroner on the evening of December 13. I then asked him a few questions which I had concerning 101C the victim. I asked him about the marks found around the wrists. He replied that he could not state definitely what had caused the marks, however, they could correspond to the fingers of her assailant who may have grabbed her about the wrist. I asked him about a bluish area which had been located above the victim's right breast. He stated that he believed that this spot may have been caused by small animals which had entered the chest cavity. I then asked him

about a bruise which had been found on the scalp and he stated that this bruise was from a very minor bump to the head, that it had been caused by nothing with any force to it. I then asked the doctor if any observations had been made on the lower extremities in the ankle area, of the victim's legs, that may have indicated that she had been tied or hung upside down. He stated that nothing was noted, however, if she had been tied with a sheet, towel, a wide strap, or something of this nature, that there would be no marks. The doctor then estimated again that he believed the victim had been dead 2 1/2 to 3 days prior to the time the body was found, if she was killed at the place where the body was located.

On December 14, 1973, between the hours of 1520 and 1630, I made a TV recording tape of all those attending the memorial services for

On December 17, 1973, at 0810 hours, the evidence obtained from Dr. Prince, the evidence obtained from Dr. Bigelow and the T.V. tape of those who had attended the memorial services were turned into the evidence room to Sergeant Hank Baesen.

Q. Are you older than 101C

A. Yeah, a year and a half.

Q. When was the last time you 101C

A. A quarter after two the day before they left, the 24th.

Q. She left home on the 25th?

A. Yeah, at about 1:30.

Q. Was she alone?

A. She was alone when she left. She had two girl friends with her when she got in the car but she was the only one in the car.

Q. I mean when she left your house.

A. Well, mommy was taking her to a babysitting job.

Q. Do you know the name of the people where she was babysitting?

A. Their name is 101B the telephone number is AM 5-2250.

Q. Do you know the names of the boyfriends that 101C had during the last year?

A. Yes, there was three of them. 101B and 101B

Q. Can you give me the ages and addresses of these three boys?

A. 101B 16, lives on 101B and I believe, phone: SU 3-4454, 101B 15 and I believe the address is 101B phone: LA 2-8443, and 101B is 14 and he lives on 101B I don't know the address, phone: SU 3-9719.

Q. How long did 101C go with these boys?

A. She went with 101B for ten months and 101B I'm not quite sure, it was either four or five months and 101B about eight months.

Q. 101B was the last boy to go with 101C

A. Yeah.

Q. Who before 101B

A. It was 101B first then 101B and then 101B

Q. Has 101C ever runaway from home before this time?

A. Once.

Q. When was this?

A. It was just before Halloween, I think. She got all the way to Olympia and came back home. She left at 11:30 at night, again it was after her babysitting job, and returned about 5:30 in the morning.

Q. How did she get to Olympia??

A. Hitchhiking.

Q. Did she mention what she did in Olympia to you?

A. No, she just said she had runaway. She called me the next morning and told me to destroy the note on her bed. I didn't destroy it, I just took it away and mom didn't know about it until this time.

Q. Did she know anybody in the Olympia area?

A. No. But, I just remember something, we had a pen pal from Olympia. His name was Bob. He has a New York accent.

Q. Do you know his phone number?

A. No. He always called us. We didn't care for him that much.

Q. How did he get your number?

A. From a girl friend I know in Rainbow.

Q. And her name is?

A. Becky Braun.

Q. Do you know anything else about this Bob?

A. He's a sex fiend that's all he ever talks about on the phone.

Q. What type of things does he say?

A. He asked 101C and I if we ever had sex before. If we did, what we liked about it. Then he would tell us what he liked about it. It was hard to understand him because he had the accent so heavy. He'd asked what would make us, as he said, hot, did we get off easily, eating out, put in different positions and then he'd tell us, you know, that he didn't mind if he was excited if he was just alone, that he would get himself off and he didn't care too much for women on top but he did like other positions and we just about said the same thing over and over again on each telephone call.

Q. When was the last time he called?

A. The day 101C turned up missing. I remember that distinctively. He called and I asked if he would call back, I didn't enjoy talking to him. I told him we had a problem and we couldn't talk to him.

- Q. Did he ever tell you about himself?
A. About he was from New York that's just about it. He told me is last name. He did call 101B and talked to her and he may have given her his last name. He told her he was in another city.
- Q. Did he always call your or did you call him?
A. He always called our house and asked if either 101C or I was home.
- Q. He never left his number?
A. No. I'm not one for calling long distance, you know, I don't make that much on my job.
- Q. I read in one of 101C letters where you had just made arrangements to cut a record. What kind was it?
A. It was going to be a 45 rpm. One song I produced myself, Grand Fund Railroad, the other the guy that was to become my producer was writing to a group for the rights to a song. He's in Portland getting my back up music for the record.
- Q. Do you know many musicians?
A. No, my friends play some type of instrument or sing themselves. I'm not familiar with any hit groups.
- Q. Do you know anyone who teaches guitar lessons?
A. I never took a lesson. I don't know anybody that teaches. I just looked in books and my friends and things, that's how I learned.
- Q. Your sister has fingernail polish on her fingernails which is light blue or gray in color. Does she have this type of nail polish?
A. She doesn't even like fingernail polish. I have thirteen different colors. She might have used mine. I've got a blue.
- Q. Have you ever seen her wear this shade?
A. Before she did try on one of my fingernail polishes once. It was a glittery type of orange. She could have gotten it from one of her friends. It's the thing now-a-days.
- Q. She also had orange color nail polish on her large toe nails. Did you know that she had that on?
A. Yeah.
- Q. Was this hers?
A. No, it was mine.
- Q. When did she put this polish on approximately?
A. It was a longtime ago. About a month or a month and a half ago. It's probably pretty well chipped by now.

- Q. Do you have any ideas who she may have obtained a ride with to Olympia?
- A. No, it was just probably someone off the street. You asked before at home if she'd had any other close calls, well, she had. I didn't want to say anything, I didn't want mom to know I was with her. She got a ride with two guys from California going to Canada. We'd all been at the Center and her and her girl friend left. 101B and I came back to the house. She wasn't home. At about one half an hour later and just after he left, a white pick up had these two guys in it, late 20s, rough looking people. 101C and her friend 101B and 101B and 101B were who's now in Seattle Youth Center, and 101B were in the truck and they came in and told me they wanted me to come with them to these people's hotel room for a few drinks. I didn't want to go. We got there and had a couple of beers. They didn't let us leave. They said they wanted sex in return for the beer. they had given us and I told them if they didn't let me out, myself, sister and friends, I'd scream. That didn't phase them a bit. It went on for about an hour. It was about 3:00 in the morning finally we walked out the door and we started walking cross the bridge. They wouldn't drive us home. It was a long way on the other side of Aurora. They came and picked us up and took us back to the motel. They didn't let us go again and we finally got out. We hailed a taxi and none of us had any money except 101B who had \$3.00 but the guy said that's o.k. he'd just take one and leave us the rest and he took us home.
- Q. When did this happen?
- A. Last summer probably in August, I think. From then on I never went with them. 101C tried it with 101B and I told her if I ever caught her doing that again I'd tell mom. I didn't like 101C hitchhiking.
- Q. Do you know if Kathy used any narcotics?
- A. Her and I used to split a joint. Just before she left, she got a concussion. She told mom she tripped over a guys foot at a football game. She had three barbituates at 101B. She passed out and hit her head on the bed in 101B sister's house. She got a concussion and hit her head. She had a bad trip. She wasn't hooked or anything. She dropped speed a couple of times. It was mainly just marijuana and hash.
- Q. You mentioned briefly that she ran away and went down to Olympia and returned. Had she ever gone to the Olympia area before this that you know of?
- A. She never said anything about it to me. She would tell me everything.

Q. Other than this one individual calling, you don't know if she had any other acquaintances in that area?

A. No, I don't think so. I'm pretty sure.

Q. Do you know if **101C** was acquainted with anyone from this area who was previously stationed at Ft. Lewis, Washington or attended Evergreen College?

A. Not that I know of.

6. If more than one firearm is involved, the identification required by Section B, items 11 through 15, must be provided for each firearm. The identification of the firearms transferred in a transaction which covers more than one weapon may be on a separate sheet of paper, which must be attached to the form covering the transaction.

7. The transferor (seller) of the firearm is responsible for determining the lawfulness of the transaction and for keeping proper records of the transaction. The Thurston County Sheriff's Office has arrested a William E. Cosden Jr. age 55 for the crime of Murder of **101C** [REDACTED] of Seattle, Wash. The crime is 28 yrs old , alleged to have occurred the evening of Nov. 23, 1973 , in Thurston County, Wash..She was last seen hitchhiking south from 91st and Aurora Ave., Seattle, Wash., enroute to Rocaway , Oregon , intending to see relatives. She was reported as runaway the following morning.

The arrest is possible due to DNA technology testing that confirmed suspicion.

The cause of death was believed to have been by knife or strangulation. Her body was found by Camp Margaret McKennet caretakers, Capitol Forrest on Dec. 6th, 1973, approx. 10 miles SW of Olympia, Wash.. The victim was not immediately identified by law enforcement It took a combination of law enforcement informational sharing and media coverage to alert a Seattle Police Officer to look into the clothing description and suggest a match.

101C would have turned **101C** [REDACTED] that next month. We are informed that this is the oldest murder case made by DNA testing in this state. We have no statute of limitations on murder in the state, and our memories and attention have a long span.





This release is a follow-up to the one issued earlier today in regards to the 1973 murder of **101C** of Seattle. The suspect, William E. Cosden, Jr., age 55, was arrested this morning by sheriff's detectives and is currently in the Thurston County Jail on murder charges.

101C was last seen by friends on November 25th, 1973, hitchhiking south from 91st and Aurora Ave. in Seattle. It is believed she was on her way to visit relatives in Oregon at the time, however her family reported her as a runaway. On December 6th, 1973, her body was located by caretakers at Camp Margaret McKenny in the Capitol Forest, which is approximately 10 miles southwest of Olympia. The victim was not immediately identified. After several days, with the use of the media and law enforcement information sharing, the victim was identified as **101C**. Cause of death was classified as either by strangulation or sharp-edged instrument.

Due to information obtained by the Sheriff's Office, William Cosden became a person of interest early on and eventually became a suspect in the death of **101C**. In 1986, based upon additional investigative information, a search warrant was obtained for Cosden's blood, hair and saliva. Thurston County detectives went to the McNeil Island Penitentiary and served the search warrant. The materials collected from that warrant were placed within the Sheriff's Office evidence system. In 2001, the Sheriff's Office submitted these items, as well as items

collected from the victim's body, to the Washington State Patrol Crime Lab for possible DNA analysis. The crime lab has determined that evidence recovered from **101C** is linked to William Cosden, Jr. It is believed this is the oldest DNA murder case in Washington State history so far.

Sheriff's detectives will continue to conduct follow-up investigation into this matter. Further information will be released via the court process.
